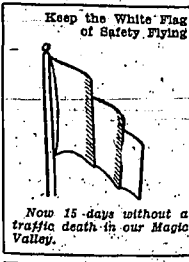

Premium on U.S. Postcard Buying To End Saturday

WASHINGTON, March 17—The law requiring buyers of U.S. postal cards to pay 10 per cent extra for lots of 50 or more cards will go out of existence next Saturday.

The law went into effect Jan. 1 when the postage postage rate was raised from 1 to 2 cents. It had been evaded widely by commercial interests which bought the cards in lots of 49.

The way it worked, 49 government-printed cards cost 88 cents but 50 cards cost \$1.05. Its sponsor, Representative Hagen, R-Minn., explained the penalty on quantity purchases was intended to curtail government competition with private postcard shops which turn out picture postcards.

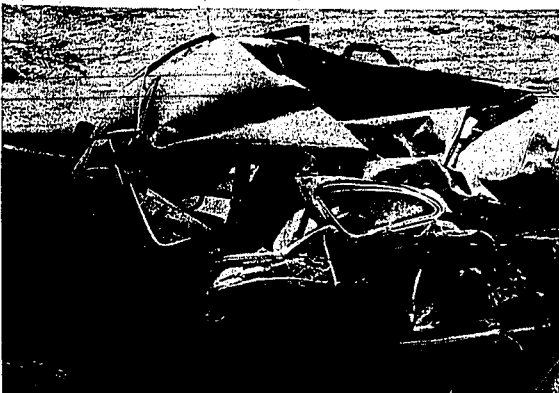
