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# Former Bellevue Couple Finds New Home in Far Distant Aleutian Islands

During World War II the Japanese invaded the island, killed the greater part of the men and women and took the rest to a prison camp at Omu, Japan. At the end of five years imprisonment the survivors remaining alive were returned to their native island.

One of these women, broken in health and old before her time, teaching a small class to do the work she also knows so well. She hopes that by doing this the art will not become extinct. Mrs. Kinney is one of that class. The rest are natives.

Mrs. Kinney states that while her vision has always been normal, she is able to work at basket weaving for only short intervals. She sent a nest of three baskets made by her teacher to her mother recently. On the mainland-of-Alaska these baskets would wholesale be \$125 and the retail price would be \$200.

In the center of the small island town is a church. The round dome on its top marks it as Russian. White crosses may be seen along the roadway and in yards on all sides of it. According to the belief of these people, burial may be made anywhere within sight of the church.

Kinney orders supplies for a year at a time for themselves and the islanders. The dock is six miles from the town. He has taken an old radio set left by Air Force personnel and has worked it over. Now he is able to communicate with the mainland. A six-hour hour is held periodically for inhabitants of all of the islands and the mainland.

Messages are relayed from the Adak navy base. Kinney also communicates with the United States with his short wave set. The Kinneys in Bellevue have received several messages. Reception is best on Atka Island at 7 p.m., which is 11 p.m. mountain standard time.

Recently the Kinneys communicated with Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Myers, a Bellevue couple who are now located at Tanadome on the island of Alaska. Myers reported they had had 74 below zero for a week and 40 below the week before.

Mr. and Mrs. Kinney and their son are planning a trip to Halyey next June.

to give permanent waves, which, she says, does much to keep their appearance neat.

For the first year the Kinneys were on island of Atka a dozen men of the army air forces were stationed there to guide planes in that vicinity. During their stay mail was brought in regularly by plane. Since the soldiers have gone, mail is brought in by boat and never is too regular. When the airbase was discontinued and the personnel left, they presented "Their Foster Mother" with a milkster and a steel kitchenware set to show their appreciation of the many meals she had cooked for them.

At present Mrs. Kinney is learning a handicraft which no other white woman has ever known nor perhaps will ever know. The story of this handicraft dates back for centuries. On one of the most westerly islands of the Aleutians is the island of Atka, just across the international date line.

Native women of this island expressed their artistic natures by taking the roots and grasses of the island and weaving them into baskets ranging in size from an inch in diameter to ones measuring seven inches across. The finished work looks and feels like fine linen. On

## Firm Reports Plans on Gas

SPOKANE, March 20 (AP)—Trans-Northwest Gas, Inc. has unwrapped natural gas in the northwest. It includes an agreement with West-coast Transmission company which wants to invest the fuel.

Trans-Northwest said yesterday it would buy gas from Westcoast near Owyhee, E. O., and then serve communities in eastern Washington with a capacity 100,000,000 cubic feet of gas a day.

Westcoast then would serve western Washington. Trans-Northwest said its plans also calls for serving northern Idaho but details will be announced later.

The plan was revealed in an application filed with the federal power commission for a certificate of public convenience and necessity to bring natural gas to the northwest from Canada. Three other companies want to import the fuel to the region. The FPC will hold a hearing on the application in Washington, D. O., April 8.

## Defense Leaders Eye Power Plan

BOISE, March 20 (AP)—Plans to coordinate the power plans of four Pacific northwest states in event of an emergency were discussed here Wednesday by civil defense officials. Col. Philip Doddridge, Idaho civil defense director, said the meeting was held for "common ground thinking" of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana officials.

Doddridge said Wednesday's meeting would be followed up by a session of power coordinators of the four states in an effort to work out a power diversion plan among private companies.

BOISE, March 20 (AP)—A spiritual renaissance and retention of the free enterprise system were urged by Salt Lake City Mayor East J. Glavin "to preserve the nation's legacy of freedom."

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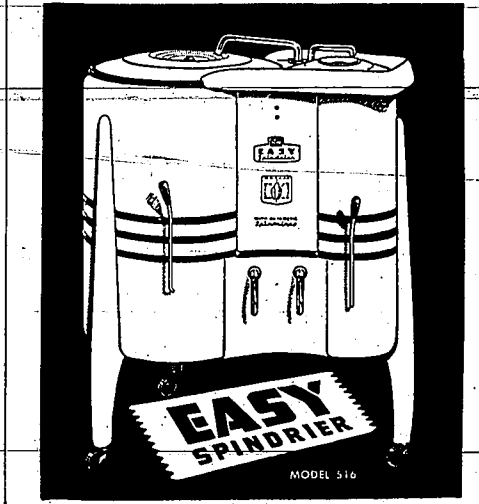

WASHINGTON—The political adventures sustained by Tucker's National Whirligig has had a deep and definite effect on political history. Expenditure for education, Governor Jordan said one-half goes to public schools, 40 per cent for institutions of higher education and 10 per cent for administration, vocational and industrial training and similar purposes.

He stressed the dollar-competition to education from such humanitarian costs as public assistance, public health care, old age situations, veterans welfare and others which closely reflect the higher cost of living through increases in the necessities of life.

He contrasted state support of higher education, its only source, with public schools where the state bolsters support from other levels of government.

Part of the trouble in financing schools was blamed by the governor on the state's unwillingness to keep pace with the rising costs of operation.

Governor Jordan described steps leading to the selection of a committee of six, representing education, labor, business, agriculture, women and taxpayers groups, to determine a reasonable and adequate school program for him to take to the legislature's next session.

He said he is concerned deeply with the problem of public schools not meeting those elsewhere, with the number of teachers migrating to better-paying states and the high cost of training teachers in Idaho to teach elsewhere.

He reported some progress in boosting salaries for teachers but said salary levels must be raised to hold the best teachers, now being lured to other states.

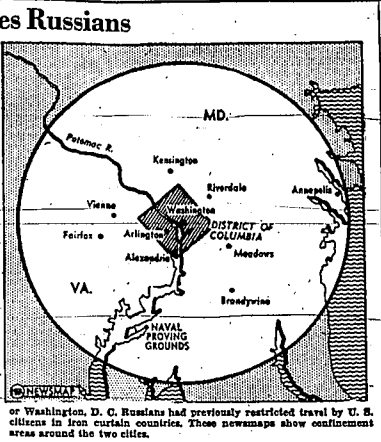
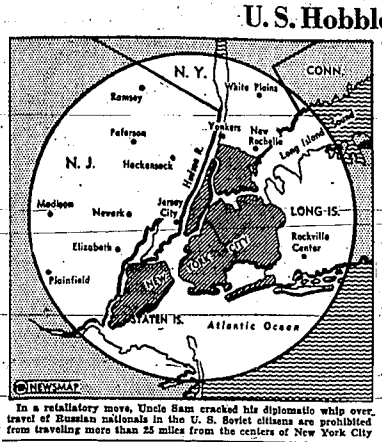

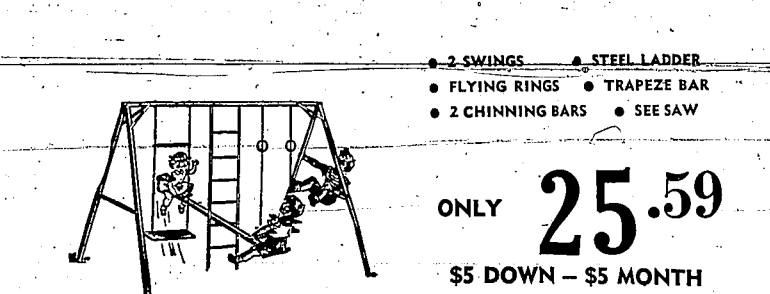

### Truman Pals Become Ired At Indecision

WASHINGTON, March 20 (AP)—Some of President Truman's closest friends in the Democratic party are "perplexed and annoyed" at being kept in the dark regarding his political plans, a highly placed Democrat said today.

This source said the baffling situation is being caused by the Democratic National Convention, which is expected to be held in St. Louis in August. Chairman Frank P. McClellan said he believed Mr. Truman would not run again if a "satisfactory" Korean armistice is reached.

"No Easy" Sign  
Coming on the heels of the President's withdrawal from the California primary, McClellan's statement at a news conference in Key West, Fla., yesterday was interpreted generally here as a sign that Mr. Truman will not seek reelection.

But uncertainty persisted among pro-Truman Democrats who might want to get into the race themselves or keep their own fences in repair by working for other candidates.

Questions Authority  
A second high Democratic source, who has believed consistently that Mr. Truman would accept renomination, agreed McClellan's statement would be interpreted as "authorized" but wondered if it should be so regarded.

One of these Democrats suggested that Mr. Truman's silence is helping the campaign of Sen. Ernest Gruening, D. Tenn., who is not a White House favorite.

Erstover, who upset Mr. Truman in the New Hampshire primary, is now campaigning in Wisconsin, where his single date of convention delegate candidates faces divided opposition.

Two pro-Truman slates are in the contest for Wisconsin's 28 delegates.

### Woman Identifies Six Accused Reds

BALTIMORE, Md., March 20 (AP)—A government witness at the trial of six defendants on communist conspiracy charges identified all six defendants yesterday as leaders in the Maryland district of the party. The identification was made by Mrs. Mary Markward, Chestersbrook, Va., housewife, who said she worked for the FBI as an undercover agent in the Communist party from 1943 to late in 1949. Mrs. Markward said she observed the defendants charged with conspiracy to advocate overthrow of the government by force, Mr. "party" leaders at various communist meetings during that period.

### Volcano in Ocean Is Starting Action

MANILA, Philippines, March 20 (AP)—A 99-year-old submarine volcano off the coast of northern Luzon, which erupted and spewed 10,000 feet into the air today and today, is threatening to erupt again. Geologists warned that the submarine volcano, which rises 200 feet out of the sea 63 miles northeast of the main island of Luzon, could erupt at its top any time, sending a tidal wave toward Luzon. Civil officials and coastguard boats are prepared to leave on a moment's notice.

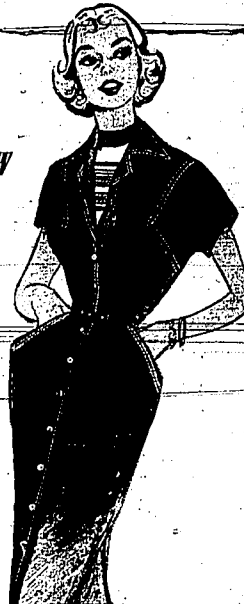

The tests were designed to determine the physical and psychological effects of being made "weightless" under certain conditions of extreme altitude flight, a possible hazard that would face man in the regions of free space.

### Special Farm Day Plan Set For April 17

TWIN FALLS, March 17—Jack Farrar, Twin Falls, has been named director of ceremonies of the April 17 farm-in-a-day program, Emory Shellenberger, general chairman, announced Thursday. Farrar will have general charge of the "noon" program which will feature national leaders in agriculture and soil conservation and special entertainment. Gov. Len Jordan and Sen. Henry Dworshak have accepted invitations to speak on the program, which will be held at the John Herrmann farm in the Hunt area.

Shellenberger also announced that the Idaho Power company will provide the electricity for the day. The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company will install at least one trunk line to the field day grounds.

Jack Kennedy, chairman of seeds and fertilizers for the Herrmann farm, reports that only top seed will be planted in cultivating each and pasture crops on the farm. He said all seed used at the field day will be certified or registered. Planting rates and mixtures, he said, will follow recommendations of the Jerome technicians of the soil conservation service. The seedlings are to be based on Herrmann's planned crop rotation and the capabilities of his 128 acres of desert land.

Seeding plans for Herrmann's farm call for the following plantings: Grain, 24.3 acres; beans, 17.4 acres; potatoes, 9.9 acres; peas, 21.8 acres; alfalfa, 16.7 acres; pasture mixtures, 18.6 acres; crushed wheatgrass, 4.8 acres.

The north side soil conservation district will furnish 100 pounds of Manchar broad smut and 50 pounds of created wheatgrass seed. The remainder of the seed used in the demonstrations will come from Jerome seed dealers.

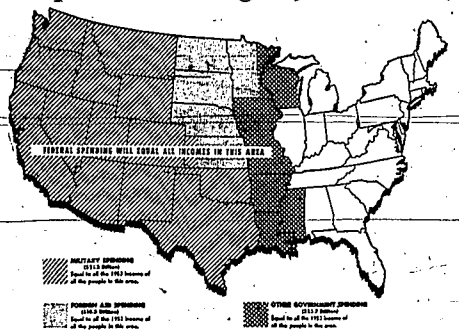

The U. S. Chamber of Commerce has distributed this example of the cost of government as proposed in President Truman's \$35,400,000,000 budget for fiscal year 1953. The chamber explained its estimate is based on U. S. Department of commerce figures on income payments to individuals in each state. Those figures include all the money going to individuals in the form of wages, salaries, interest, rents and dividends. The figures do not include corporate incomes as such, but it does include that part of corporate incomes distributed as dividends to stockholders. Figures used are for 1950, the latest available, the chamber explained, plus 15 per cent as "1953 incomes undoubtedly will be at a higher level."

### Added Blows Are Forecast

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., March 20—A soil conservation expert has warned farmers and ranchers in the nation's old dust-bowl areas they can expect additional heavy dust storms in the next six weeks. However, said Regional Soil Conservation Chief O. G. Laker, "the picture is not all black and I'm not too pessimistic yet."

"Sure we're going to have some flying dirt," he said, "but it is no worse than a heavy rain which washes the silt off the land. It's just more dramatic."

Laker's comments came on the heels of a wind storm which swept across southern New Mexico and the Texas panhandle, blowing dust 20,000 feet into the air and at times blocking highways in the area.

The conservationist pointed out that "conditions are favorable for blowing." A prolonged drought has hit the area—and Laker said signs all indicate the farmers can expect their third wheat crop failure in a row.—The crop failures have kept...

The March 1 figure is only 43 per cent of the amount which was on hand at the same date last year.

Buttered, feed shortages have been noted—but most shepherds say end of the cold and snow generally would solve the problem.

"There should be plenty of hay once the storms quit," one shepherd said. "Many shepherds seeking hay the last two or three days are now finding plenty."

The temporary shortages resulted in a big price increase, however. Clyde M. Waddell, Emmet county agent, said hay prices averaged \$25 per ton of loose hay and \$30 for baled hay a week or 10 days ago now have climbed to \$28 and \$30 a ton.

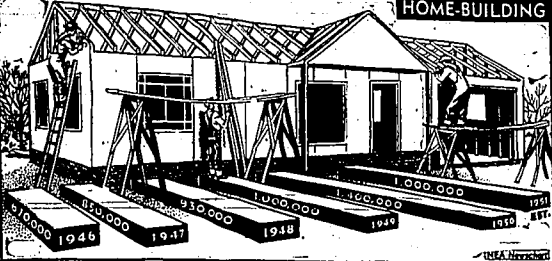

Fred Robins, local plant manager, speaking on prospects of 1952 milk prices, said milk prices reached parity sometime between last Dec. 15 and Jan. 15, 1952. He also said that with the United States population growing at the rate of approximately 7,000 per day and the dairy

He said the government is expected to make purchases again in 1952 for the armed forces and for the navy and the demand for grade A products is increasing. **New Electric Wristwatches Are Unveiled**  
 CHICAGO, March 20 (AP)—An electric wristwatch, hailed as keeping almost perfect time, was announced today. It has a little electric motor inside, yet is no bigger than a conventional wind-up watch. It has a battery which is a tiny, non-winding mechanism.

The battery delivers power at an absolutely constant rate. It takes only one-one hundred thousandth of a watt to run the watch. The watch was demonstrated at a press conference by Elgin National Watch company. Only a laboratory model has been made, said J. G. Shannon, Elgin president. Simultaneously in Paris, the L. P. Strain & Co. is making a similar watch.

Watch company announced an electric wristwatch, it differs in many mechanical and electrical respects, Shannon said. The two firms have exchanged information, but each did its own research separately. Keeps Better Time Shannon said the electric watch keeps better time than wind-up types. The electric watch will cost more, for some years at least, Shannon said, but price was not estimated. The first watches, possibly available within a year, will be for men, for the tiny motors aren't small enough yet for women's wrist-watches. The watch is anti-magnetic, can be fitted with a water-proof case.

IDAHO FALLS, March 20 (AP)—Control gates at Jackson Lake will be closed for a week, beginning Saturday. The result will be a lower flow of Snake river.

District Engineer Lynn Grandall said the closing was ordered by the U. S. bureau of reclamation so new headgates could be installed in the great feeder canal near Halse. Seven new steel gates will be installed, Grandall said, replacing rusted-out gates.

Jackson Lake now holds 500,000 acre-feet of water compared with 338,880 at the corresponding time in 1951, Grandall said. Snake river is flowing 3,500 second feet of water out of the lake.

Snow depth at Island park continues to gain and is now measured at 76 inches. Depth of snow at Moran was reported at 41 inches with 112 inches at Canyon lake, on the continental divide south of Yellowstone park.

## '51 Crashes Took 800 Years of Life; Younger Drivers Involved in Mishaps

In relation to the group's percentage of all drivers.

"Through driver education courses, a determined effort is being made to improve the tragic accident record of younger drivers." Only about 38 per cent of the nation's schools offer courses in driver education now, he noted.

Terminating high school driver education "one of the most significant long-range highway safety programs undertaken in recent years," Yost said such education offers one of the most encouraging answers to the growing problem of traffic accidents. When students are given the opportunity to become safe drivers through formal courses in high schools, he declared, their chances of avoiding fatal or serious accidents are usually three times better than those of boys and girls who are not school-trained drivers.

"When parents and a community pour thousands of dollars into the education of each student, it makes

sense to insist that the safe operation of a motor vehicle is one of the lessons each student learn," said Yost. "In modern America the youngster is destined to spend much of his or her later life behind the wheel of a car and there is an even chance of becoming involved in an accident before he or she dies. Driver education is not an educational 'fill' as some uninformed persons believe. It saves lives and prevents injuries.

...that schools in your community give driver education courses, be sure that your children enroll and thus help to safeguard their future against a tragic automobile accident. If your schools do not, find out why and demand that they do. It costs very little and the rewards are very great," he noted.

In 1951, 623,370 students completed driver education courses in American high schools, an increase of 100,000 over 1950. However, the 1951 driver training graduates comprised only about one per cent of the na-

tion's total driving population. Driver education can make its greatest contribution to highway safety, Yost said, when all high school students receive it.
