BUSINESS-EDUCATION DAY

Business-Education day, observed in Twin Falls this past week, brought about an understanding which should have been achieved years ago, not only in this vicinity, but throughout the country.

As a result of the teachers and business men getting together to provide a better understanding of each other's activities, the way may have been paved for better public relationships all around.

Primarily, Business-Education day had its inception with the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce. It was hoped that through this meeting with the teachers, the business men would have an opportunity to familiarize local educational forces with their problems.

There is no doubt that Business-Education day in Twin Falls served that purpose to a large extent, because the teachers listened attentively to all the problems confronting business today—winding profits, greater risks, mounting taxation, troublesome regulations, government interference, and all the other things that are serving to make business more difficult and complex under present conditions.

Perhaps the most surprising fact called to the teachers' attention was that the average business nowadays is operating within the narrow margin of approximately 3 per cent profit after the payment of all taxes, including state and federal levies on income. In most instances where the question was put to the teachers beforehand, they estimated that the average business man's "take home profit" after all taxes had been paid, would average from 9 to 12 per cent.

There was another point which it was hoped would be accomplished as a result of Business-Education day—a greater understanding of the American way of life, including its free enterprise system.

Obviously, too much emphasis could not be placed upon the importance of the youngsters in our schools being fully inspired with the fundamental principles of real Americanism, particularly at a time when socialism, communism and collectivistic thinking are making inroads into the social and economic structure of our country.

Outside of the cents themselves, it was as a result of this day that the teachers were in the best position to exercise the proper influence over these children, and in that respect it was suggested that our educators were entrusted with a great responsibility.

The discussion between the teachers and business men covered all the different phases of this responsibility in giving proper guidance to an up-coming generation of young Americans... a love for free freedom and individualism, in contrast to ever-increasing government control, and a full appreciation for such virtues as individual initiative and self reliance.

All were pretty much agreed that these were the things to be desired and perpetuated and that they had many hopes of preserving our free democracy.

But there was a surprising development, which in some instances took precedent, when the teachers and business men entered into their group discussions.

It was understandable why the business men and the people as a whole should be expecting the teachers to assume this great responsibility, but it was not to be expected that these same business men and the people as a whole had not given the teachers the support and respect they think their professions deserve.

When we elaborate the teachers were quite frank in admitting they had developed an inferiority complex because of their low salary schedules. They feel, they explained, that because their salaries are paid out of taxes, the public frowns on paying them commensurate with their training, ability and the new responsibilities they are being expected to shoulder.

Some of these teachers even expressed themselves as feeling that Chambers of Commerce and business generally are opposed to education. They admitted that this charge is too general a conclusion on their part, but that opposition to increased taxation for their benefit nevertheless put the teachers on the defensive, and left them pretty much alone to work out their own salvation.

The teachers, we believe, have a real point in this respect, which obviously suggests a serious need for further business-education relationships.

Maybe the teachers on the one hand haven't made any serious attempt to present their problems, either individually or collectively, to Chambers of Commerce and business men.

Perhaps the Chambers of Commerce and the business houses have not been fully aware of this feeling among the teachers, and just now are coming to the realization that closer relations must exist between business, education, religion and all the other forces of our society to keep this country of ours intact.

In any event, let's hope that as a follow-up to Business-Education day in Twin Falls, the teachers and business men in the near future get together again in the near future with the kind of follow-up that will give this entire program real meaning.

"What is the Matter?"

Every hour's news broadcast and every day's newspaper headlines ought to "prompt" every well-minded American to ask "What is the Matter?" It is obvious that something is fundamentally wrong in American life and we had better find out soon exactly what it is, as soon as we find out what it is, what is wrong we must correct that wrong at all cost, before it destroys us. This was the motto of the Founding Fathers and again and again Rev. Blackstone by the seven young men and women who sat in the school auditorium on "Fulfilling the Aims of the Constitution" were most refreshing experience, for three reasons:



1. Their concern for the future of our country was obviously sincere. They offered themselves as a part of the solution of our national problem. Many an adult in America has long lacked that quality of sincerity.

2. Their concern for our country's future was childlike intelligence. They saw clearly that it is religion, selfishness and irresponsibility which has brought our American way of life into great peril. One speaker said, "You can't keep freedom without character."

noble faith and so they also lacked integrity of character. What happened?

The great blueprint was laid aside. What had formerly been built so well was allowed to fall into disrepair. Much of the remodeling which was done not only weakened the old, it also disfigured it. How could anyone describe more accurately what has happened in American government?

The important question is "What can we do now?" There are four answers:

1. We can be sincerely sorry for the selfishness, irreligion and irresponsibility which has so terribly weakened our American way of life.
2. We can return to our churches. After all, the churches of our land are the custodians of the moral and spiritual heritage of our race. There is no one who does not need regularly the challenge, guidance, inspiration and insight which Christian churches provide.
3. From our churches we can go out into our community and our country day after day with nobler vision and faith, and spirit and purpose.
4. We can help where we are needed, to right what is wrong, to straighten what is weak, to improve what is unimproved, to supply what is required.

Idaho Potatoes Are Plentiful In Washington; Check Shows

WASHINGTON, March 22 (Special)—Idaho potatoes that were under the counter in Washington stores last week are plentiful now, a check of retail grocers shows.

Wholesalers said they are still not getting all they could sell but retailers from the corner store to the super-markets denied any shortage.

"Last week we had to buy onions to get Idaho's but every produce house in town is offering Idaho's now," a grocery proprietor declared. "I have all the fancy, individually wrapped potatoes you want to buy for 10 cents each and 50-pound sacks of No. 1 at 41 1/2."

Nobody, including OPS officials, knew what had caused the sudden change, but some speculated that the apprehension of 15 price violators in New York last Friday might have altered the situation. The violators, all discovered in raids on

wholesalers, were chiefly the "discount" sales.

Local OPS enforcement officers said no violations have been discovered in Washington, despite the "in-sider" reports by retailers.

A spokesman for Charles W. Heilmuller, one of Washington's largest wholesalers shipping carloads direct from Idaho, said one carload arrived Monday and one was expected from Blackfoot.

"Since the establishment of price ceilings, he said the firm had been averaging only one carload a week. "We needed three or four to take care of the demand."

The OPS thought the slight loosening of the wholesale market was enough to cut the demand. "But we certainly wouldn't call it a flooded market now," officials warned.

Another factor in the local situation was believed to be the im-

next arrival of Florida new potatoes. Wholesalers said no quantities have reached the north yet, but are expected to start coming in within a few weeks.
