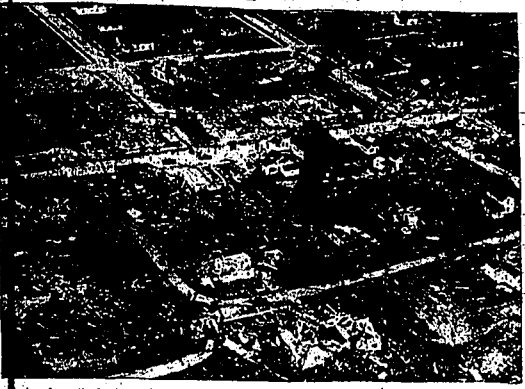

Blood "Shot" Proves Fatal At University

SEATTLE, March 24 (AP)—An 18-year-old college student died yesterday of an infection of bacterial-contaminated blood, given during a performance of the play "Blood" by research by University of Washington.

The victim, James Stanley Leonard, a freshman at Seattle university, was one of 40 volunteers participating in the play, which is better ways to preserve whole blood.

He died three days after the injection.

Blood Contaminated

Dr. Robert H. Williams, head of the university's department of bacteriology, said the blood became contaminated "by some phenomenon" after it had been refrigerated.

"The only way we can explain the death of the student is that the bacteria was able to grow in some manner while the blood was at room temperature and in the body temperature."

Would Repeat Test

Both Dr. Williams and Dr. Clementine F. Finch, associate professor of medicine in charge of hematology at the university, said they would participate in the same experiment tomorrow.

They said the bacteria had not been identified, but they believed it to be a saprophytic *Klebsiella* organism living on dead or decaying organic matter, which would grow at body temperature but thrives when chilled. It produces shock and high fever.

Special Jaunt Is Completed By McArthur

NEW YORK, March 24 (AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur returned today from a visit to his Little Rock, Ark., birthplace which he observed with some emotion, but in the shadows are deepening.

The chartered DC-4 plane carrying the general and a party of 10 others, including his wife and son, Arthur, touched down at LaGrange field at 2:20 p. m. after a 10-hour, 40-minute trip from Manila.

Capital Air Lines officials said the general's safety was not endangered and he and his group stayed aboard while mechanics corrected the trouble.

MacArthur delivered a sentimental, non-political speech to a quiet audience of 1,000 persons at McArthur park in Little Rock in the afternoon.

The day before, however, he had finished his first trip to America, with the full force of his oratory in a strongly worded address to the situation.

He warned that the nation's leadership was "preparing us for a war with Europe and a military state" at home.

But the general spoke so tenderly yesterday as he spoke to his son that his voice-veered. His speech was filled with reminiscences.

TV Report to Fix Way for Ike Bid

PARIS, March 24 (AP)—A television report to the American people April 2 by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower will clear the way for his return to the United States in May for three speeches on foreign, domestic and defense policies.

Sources close to the general said today the general's television report will declare that west Europe now is strong enough to stand up to Russia, but it is no longer "indispensable" in his present role as supreme commander of North Atlantic treaty forces.

Eisenhower's headquarters called a closed meeting of newsmen and photographers today to discuss "shootings" of the television pictures of the report, closing his first year in the NATO post.

The sources are convinced that Eisenhower will ask President Truman about April 27 for release from his post and return to the U. S. about May 15 to make known his stand on domestic and international trends.

This a fellow who a little dog that understands Turkish, French, Greek, Arabic and English and barks in all of the five languages.

The little dog's name is Butchie, and she is the pride and joy of her owner, Mrs. A. J. Greenwald, 200 1/2 N. 2nd St. in this city.

It figured she could get a column out of Ed. Too. No newspaperman knows Turkey better than he does. She was born in Damascus, Syria, and she speaks five languages: Turkish, Arabic, French, Greek, and English. She is the only dog in the world who can speak five languages.

The Greenwalds are spending their leave with Theresa's family in Henderson, Ky., and I asked them on her first trip to America, was making out.

"She barks with a southern accent already," Theresa said. "And how she loves barbecue. As soon as the barbecue is put on the stove she never leaves the kitchen until it's done and she gets first helping. You know, Henry, when we first got to Henderson, she wouldn't eat a bite. She just curled up in a corner and looked as if she were ready to die. We had all the rest look at her and they couldn't do anything for her. She got weaker and weaker and we didn't know what to do. Then one day the boys brought home a little Maltese cat they'd found in a tree. Butchie took one look at the cat and went over and licked her head. From that minute on Butchie was as happy as a pig. Remember how our house in Istanbul was filled with cats and Butchie was the only dog? Well, Butchie thought she was a cat, and so on as she saw a cat she was happy again, glad to be among her own kind. They eat out of the same bowl, sleep curled up together, and play in the woods together."

I asked Ed and Theresa if they didn't think that Butchie didn't, every once in a while, miss Istanbul, the Park Hotel with its lovely view of the Bosphorus, the Golden Horn, and the Mosque of Suleiman the Magnificent. After all, as lovely as Henderson, Kentucky is, it isn't quite like the same as Istanbul.

"Even if Butchie wanted to go back, Papa would never let her," Ed said. "I'm quite sure Papa loves Butchie and that cat better than

New Effort for Cattle Disease Research Due

WASHINGTON, March 24 (AP)—A dangerous outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease among cattle in Canada is expected to start a new drive for a multimillion dollar laboratory to search for ways to stamp out the plague.

The Canadian outbreak is only 60 miles from the United States border. It may make it impossible to keep the disease from spreading to this country.

The virus is perhaps the most destructive of all animal diseases. It spreads quickly and causes heavy losses.

Research, spurred five years ago when the disease broke out in Mexico, steps were taken to intensify research on it. Little scientific work had been done in this country because it has been relatively free of the infection, the time being in 1929.

Appearance of the disease in Mexico led American livestock leaders to realize that modern transportation increased opportunities of transmitting the disease and that this country should get better prepared to defend its nine-billion-dollar livestock industry.

Opposed by Congress, the agriculture department, congress authorized the government to establish a modern research laboratory. The lawmakers instructed that it be located on an island, to avoid the possibility of its becoming the feed-bed for a domestic outbreak.

The much coveted quiet investigating and dicking, the department came up with an option for a laboratory site on Prudhoe island, a part of Rhode Island, in Narragansett bay.

Success. Noted. Meanwhile, success was coming to a joint Mexico-United States program for stamping out the disease in Mexico. It now appears this country will reopen its borders to Mexican livestock late this summer.

Just as the department was getting set to start the construction of the island, congress called a halt. The lawmakers were under such pressure to cut nonmilitary spending inasmuch as the disease was being brought under control in Mexico they decided against going ahead.

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Experts Note Russian Gain In Airplanes

LONDON, March 24 (AP)—Soviet Russia already has more than twice as many "modern, jet-line" warplanes as the United States hopes to have at the end of its current air rearmament program in 1954, according to two British aviation experts.

Charles W. Cain and Denny J. Yoder, aviation technological experts, in their book "Military Aircraft of the USSR" put present air strength at 20,000 planes.

The U. S. plans an airforce of approximately 10,000 planes by 1954. However, the authors of the newly published book said the operating efficiency and quality of the Soviet warplanes are open to question.

They described in detail a number of Russian planes, many of them jet-powered. They believe that on the basis of an unidentified Russian jet fighter seen over the Russian zone of Germany last year the Soviets may have improved on the MIG-15, which has shown success in Korea.

The book listed brief sketches of the Soviet satellite power's air forces which included Russian-built fighters and medium bombers.

One little-known Russian warplane was said to be developed after the German Messerschmitt 102 with a twin-jet bullet-like nose and underslung engines. Another was a Soviet jet with a radar nose the authors said probably was an all-weather night interceptor. The third plane was said to be an MIG-15 with a radar nose.

OUR RESOURCES

As the report shows, our assets had reached a total of \$1,193,972 by December 31, 1951. This is an increase of 16% over the previous year... more evidence of Idaho Mutual's ever-increasing popularity, size and dependability.

OUR LIQUIDITY

A very important point in the financial analysis of the Idaho Mutual Benefit Association is the proof of funds to meet emergencies. Idaho Mutual's cash, bonds, and Federal-insured savings and loan shares, which are liquid assets, amounted to \$1,138,471, or 95% of the total assets. Insurance rating authorities declare that this strong position gives excellent assurance that Idaho Mutual has the necessary funds to meet contingencies promptly. Note that our reserves for the payment of claims total more than \$1,000,000.

OUR SOLVENCY

Comparison of total assets with all liabilities and reserves shows that at the start of 1952 the Idaho Mutual Benefit Association had more than \$112 of assets for each \$100 of liabilities—this is a very favorable margin of safety and is typical of Idaho Mutual's overall financial strength and responsibility.
