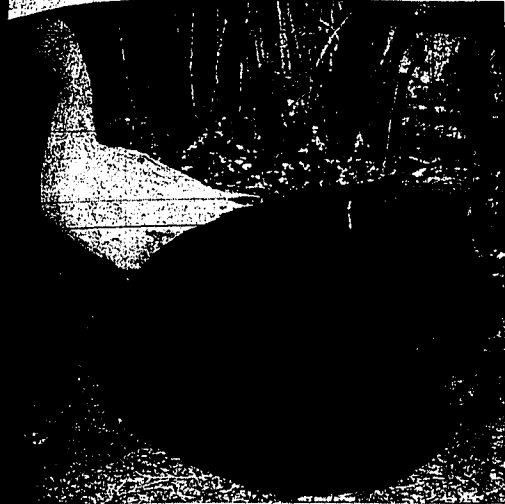

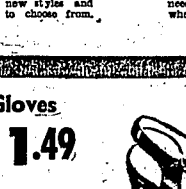

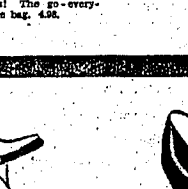

WASHINGTON—Eisenhower-for-President strategy now has been mapped definitely for the coming year. It is the product of a personal political conference with the general by his hullo-boos commanders in the field out of the country. It is the product of heavy money taken charge, and the days of amateur work, Madison Square Garden rallies and "The People's Choice" have passed.

Eisenhower will remain abroad until a few weeks before the Republican primary in Chicago on July 7. The New Hampshire and Minnesota primary results revealed that a disaffection from his liability, his absence from the United States during the presidential campaign is a liability. His backers no longer want him to return.

ALOOO—In absentia, he can continue to remain silent or vague on specific issues. Moreover, he can remain aloof from and above the factional feuds involving the Taft, Stassen and MacArthur candidacies. He will not have to make commitments to the "old guard" of the so-called "progressive" wing of the party.

As a silent and remote partner in the venture, "Ike" can disclaim or repudiate any embarrassing promises that have been made. He can also disclaim any responsibility for the success or failure of his over-the-hill campaign.

Should he win the nomination, he will be in a position to make a clean break with his political and personal enemies. He can avoid the usual and inevitable Republicanism by posing as the most untrammeled man to enter the White House in modern times.

REGULAR—Nevertheless, in order to win over hard-boiled party men secretly sympathetic to Senator Taft, Eisenhower will have to appear in public. Millions of copies of his recent letter, in which he expressed his belief in the value of the party, will be distributed to the backers who they will do the most good.

It is essential to weaken Taft's present hold on the already has had that effect, according to the military man's headquarters. Eisenhower will appear in public. 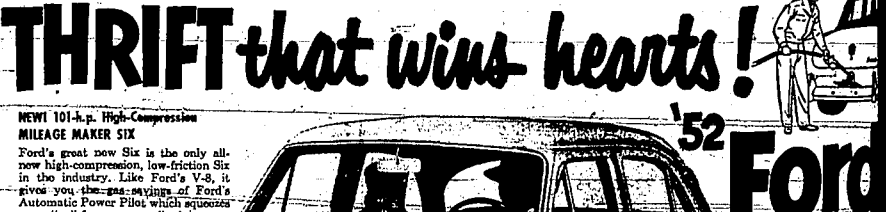

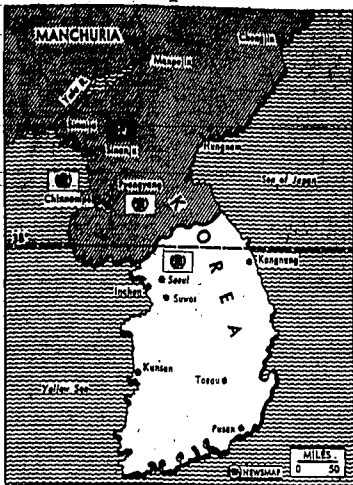

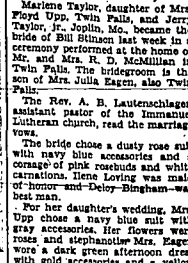

U. P. Extends Safety Net to Stop Wrecks

OMAHA, Neb., March 25 (U. P.)—Union Pacific railroad says it plans installation of \$2,078,000 worth of automatic sub-signaling equipment of 257 miles of its line between Ogden, Utah, and Omaha.

In a news release Monday the road said the equipment is designed to duplicate in each locomotive the signal lights along the right-of-way.

The signaling devices are to be operative on 25 miles of the road between Omaha and Valley, Neb., 176 miles between Ogden and Green River, Wyo., and 64 miles between Laramie and Cheyenne, Wyo.

The interstate commerce commission investigating the Nov. 12 rail collision on the U. P. line near Evanson, Wyo., in which 17 persons died and 132 were injured, recommended that the automatic signal system be installed on the Ogden-Green River section. It already is in use on large portions of the U. P. net.

Union Pacific said the system will be completed in 1937 and put the safety device into effect on the entire 900 miles between Omaha and Ogden.

Filer Resident to Go to Annapolis

FILER, March 25—Carl H. Murray, Jr., son of Mrs. Franklin G. Wolfe, has been appointed to the U. S. naval academy at Annapolis, Md., by Sen. Herman Walker.

A freshman at the University of Idaho, Murray is enrolled in the naval reserve officers training corps. His extra-curricular activities include tennis, soccer, golf club, baseball and swimming.

Murray's father, the late Carl H. Murray, was a graduate of the University of Idaho. He was killed in an airplane crash in 1923 while serving in the United States air force.

Weather Delaying Red Cross Drive

SHOESHONE, March 25—Weather conditions in District and North Shoshone have delayed the 1936 Red Cross drive in those areas but the drive in Shoshone is well under way, Charles Hansen, county chairman, announces.

6 People Die As Big Fires Hit L. A. Area

LOS ANGELES, March 25 (U. P.)—Three huge fires swept through buildings in the Los Angeles area early today and last night, gutting an office building and demolishing an exclusive country club and a downtown hotel where six people were killed.

A spectacular blaze raged through five floors of the St. George hotel at 3 a. m. (PST) before all fire companies could bring it under control.

Police reported six persons died in the flames. One person leaped from the top floor of the six-story building into a net, but was not injured.

Spreads Rapidly

The fire started on the second floor, destroying that floor and the third and damaging other upper floors. The blaze spread so fast it trapped many tenants on upper floors and they had to be removed by ladders.

Fire Chief John H. Alderson said the hotel fire "is the worst as far as fatalities is concerned, during the past 12 years since I've been chief."

\$400,000 Damage

Two block away, flames gutted a business and storage building a few hours earlier. Damage was estimated at \$400,000. Several thousand persons jammed adjoining streets, attracted by smoke and embers swirling hundreds of feet in the air.

In-west Los Angeles, fire caused an estimated \$200,000 damage in the exclusive Bel-Air country club early today. Eight fire companies battled the flames for more than an hour.
