Massachusetts Armored Car Robbery Wins High Place in Gigantic Crimes

The robbery of an armored car in Danvers, Mass., today will take a high spot among the nation's biggest in American criminal history.

It is far from the biggest, in overall value, but for cash lootings it probably stands second only to the \$1.5 million express robbery in Boston, Jan. 19, 1960.

Robberies, burglaries and other thefts have involved millions of dollars in cash, bonds, jewelry, postage stamps and other sundry goods in the United States since 1950.

But infant 1952 already has two of the biggest "hot" pulled off in the past year.

On Feb. 27, \$1,000,000 in jewelry, cash and securities were taken from a safe in a Danvers, Mass., store.

MANTUA, March 26—The fall of Bataan and the beginning of the infamous World War II death march by 35,000 American and Filipino troops will be observed April 9 with the unveiling of a memorial marker on the Bataan peninsula. 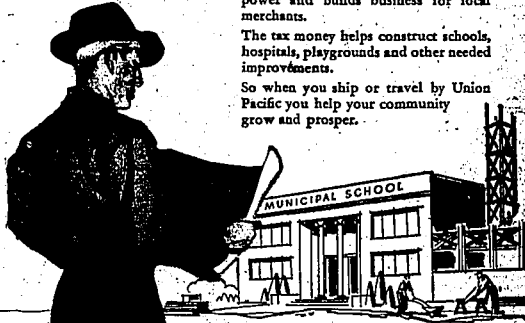

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP)—John Foster Dulles said today he is not ready to throw his support to any GOP presidential candidate. He indicated he will wage a vigorous campaign on foreign policy issues for the Republican nomination.

Dulles resigned yesterday as a special adviser to Secretary of State Dean Acheson, ending long participation in the main Japanese peace treaty.

Relations Cordial He said in an interview today he will remain available for consultation with Acheson or President Truman "if it seems that there is occasion for it." He emphasized he is leaving the government on cordial personal terms with both officials, and his departure was not the result of any backstage feud.

But he also made clear he is looking forward to an opportunity to speak out, as a Republican, on his foreign policy differences with the administration.

"He" Aid Seen Dulles might campaign for the nomination of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower as the Republican standard-bearer, Dulles was chief policy adviser to Gen. Thomas E. Dewey during the 1948 campaign, and Dewey is backing Eisenhower.

But in reply to any direct question, "do you favor any particular presidential candidate?" Dulles replied that he is taking "no position" on the intra-party race for the present.

He added that he will not "purport to speak for anybody" in his forthcoming foreign policy speeches.

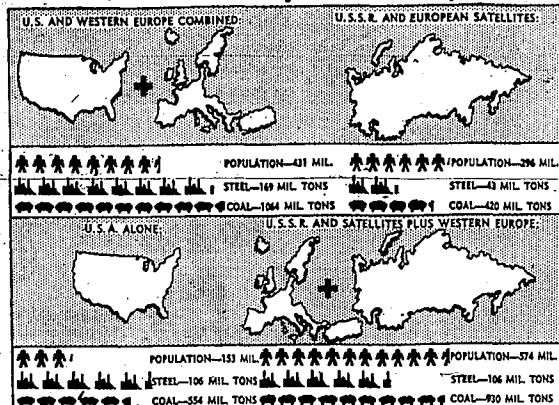

What's Happened to Predicted 1952 Shortages? Survey Made

Editor's note: Top government officials directly involved in the shortages predicted in many fields, and the reasons why they have happened and what has happened and what is being done to prevent a recurrence of the situation in three disastereous fields which were predicted in our survey of the big "pinch" on the civilian economy.

The survey of the first six months of 1952 would see a scarcity of consumer durable goods and the materials to make them; shortage of labor and great inflationary pressure on prices. This would be so, they said, because the rearmament program would be going full blast.

Stores are well-stocked with refrigerators, washing machines, radios, televisions and other household appliances. The government is turning loose more steel, copper and aluminum to make these and other goods, such as automobiles.

Employment generally is high, but there is serious unemployment in Detroit and in some other industrial (particularly textile) centers. The consumer price index, which jumped about 11 per cent above pre-war levels, is leveling off. Some prices are still being called, touching off some congressional demands for decontrol.

Average wholesale prices are lower than a year ago. So-called "soft-spots" have cropped up in the economy. Government economists, however, see no danger of a serious recession or a depression. They point out the defense spending, now running at an annual rate of about \$47,000,000,000, is scheduled to hit \$50,000,000,000 next year. This, they say, will create new jobs, swell paychecks and keep business activity stimulated in most lines.

In the more immediate future, a steel strike of much length could change the materials situation rapidly. And a substantial steel wage and price increase may, economists believe, would give another inflationary boost to wages and prices in general.

Last year's prediction of big shortages by "how have not materialized because of a combination of circumstances.

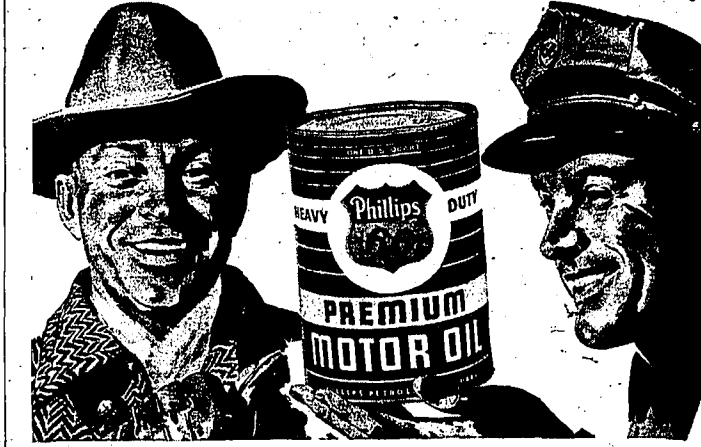

Dworshak Details His Reason For Supporting Alternate Site

WASHINGTON, March 26 (Special)—An announcement detailing his reasons for supporting the proposed Mountain Sheep dam in preference to Hells canyon has been released by Sen. Henry Dworshak, R. Ida.

The senator announced his decision Saturday and said he would back the alternate project in the house hearings on Hells canyon this week.

"We can't take Idaho out of the Columbia river basin and that means we have to think about flood control. A series of low-head dams on the Snake won't eliminate floods like 1948 which are again threatening this year."

While conceding that Hells canyon may be a future requirement, Dworshak said present economy requirements make it "utterly indefensible at this time to undertake to build a huge project like Hells canyon which could not produce power for at least six years."

Outlining his specific views, the senator explained:

1. Mountain Sheep would control not only the Snake but part of the Salmon river runoff through a diversion tunnel carrying Salmon water into the Snake above the damsite.
2. "Because Hells canyon is depending only on Snake river water, it would be a constant threat to the prior use of water in the upper valley. (This is the chief point on which opponents have attacked the bigger project.)"
3. Mountain Sheep flood control storage would be as large as that of Hells Canyon—3,000,000 acre feet—plus an additional 500,000 acre feet capacity of Salmon flood storage. The Salmon watershed produced twice as much as the Snake runoff in the 1958 high water year, Dworshak points out.

Trips and Visits Listed at Heyburn

HEYBURN, March 26 (Special)—The governor department are justified in demanding additional power for national defense at this time, it would appear, far more logical to permit development of the low-head private dams on the Snake river and then subsequent development of a dam at Mountain Sheep which would serve to increase output of power in lower basin states.

Hells canyon is the best of downstream sites because it would not block the salmon run in the Salmon river—only a low diversion dam would bar the fish in contrast with the higher dam required at Nes Perce or other alternate sites below the mouth of the Salmon.

As a final "psychological" factor, Dworshak believes a smaller project to be built by the corps of engineers stands a better chance of congressional approval than a project of this size. Perhaps with one eye on the interest returned from the sale of power from engineering-hull dams (whereas reclamation projects are repaid only to the extent of principal), congress has been more hesitant in granting approval to emergency power dams than to reclamation dams.

Expert Gives Recommendations on Use Of Crops in Control of Noxious Weeds

With the spring planting season at hand, Harry Gault, county weed bureau supervisor, urges farmers and farm owners to consider cropping plans from the standpoint of weed control.

"With the variety of control methods now available, there is little or no excuse for noxious weeds being allowed to seed or spread to clean ground," Gault points out. He refers to weed regulations of D. A. Stubbfield, commissioner of agriculture, as authorized by the state legislature last year, and effective Aug. 10, 1951.

The regulations forbid the use or sale of whole seed of white top, bind weed, Canada thistle or knapweed in feeds. Regulations further prohibit the feeding of livestock on any infested feed within 48 hours of movement of the livestock by the owner.

County commissioners are authorized to set the dates for cutting or burning of infested hay. Where the hay is to be sold off the infested fields, farms or ranches, the dates of cutting or burning are set. The commissioner of agriculture or his agents may inspect feed or seed offered for sale on any premises.

All commercial combines, threshing machines and portable seed grinders must have attached to them a card from the department of agriculture stating that the equipment must be cleaned before it traves an infested farm, field or ranch.

Gault's office, located in the courthouse, has equipment to run samples in accordance with the state law. Farmers in doubt as to purity of feed and materials are urged to have the samples checked prior to purchase or use. The service is free.

Referring to grains, Gault says cereal crops and corn can be sprayed for control of noxious weeds. The grain will not mature ahead of Canada thistle or other noxious weeds, so infested grain crops will require either spraying or cutting to prevent seed formation. He states spraying will kill new seedling of legumes are successful where good care is given, according to Gault. In these cases, early varieties of grain should be planted, sprayed, harvested and the legume seeded.

Early varieties of grain recommended by the weed bureau supervisor are Idaho wheat, Gem barley, Overland oats and canning varieties of corn. Will resistant alfalfa varieties, such as Ranger and Buffalo, should be planted.

On the matter of peas, Gault says early plants and early varieties which will mature before noxious weeds go to seed. He recommends planting of peas extremely early on ground which has been tilled recently. This will cut weed growth back as much as possible.

Gault recommends use of Alaska pea varieties, the panca of which vary with the seed granules. He suggests the varieties be checked before planting.

Turning to beans, Gault said they are highly susceptible to spray applications and their long growing season allows noxious weeds to produce seed. In seasons where seed growth is not delayed by cold weather, it is usually possible to make a good spray application before beans are planted, according to Gault. This type of spray is especially true with white top, Russian knapweed and morning glory. Canada thistle will probably require clipping, he points out.

To avoid bean injury, Gault says the ground must be both irrigated and plowed after spraying. As a special case, he lists spraying May 25, followed by watering, plowing and planting between June 3 and 10.

The weed bureau supervisor warns that waiting and plowing must not be left out. He says natural rainfall is insufficient and the use of a disc or field cultivator will not replace plowing. 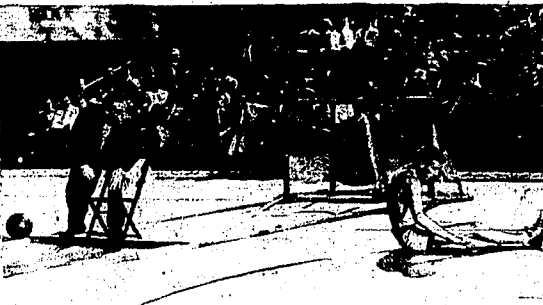

Local Meeting Maps Plans for State Dairy Month Observance

Idaho dairy leaders met in Twin Falls Tuesday to make plans for the observance of dairy month in June. U. J. Simmons, Twin Falls, is state chairman for the observance.

Attending the session were Simmons, W. L. Hendrix, Boise, president of the Idaho Dairyman's association; Chris Lillegard, Meridian, director of the Idaho Dairyman's association; Albert Johnson, Burley, IDA director; Marion Parrott, Caldwell, district chairman for the Idaho Dairyman's association; Bull Magie-Valley chairman. Unable to attend were Arvid J. Johnson, Coeur d'Alene, north Idaho district chairman; Leonard Mainwaring, Idaho Falls, east Idaho chairman; and Robert McKinnin, Pocatello, southeast Idaho chairman.

Simmons points out that farm income from the dairy business is \$38,000,000 annually, eighty per cent of the total volume is exported, he notes. The total volume of dairy products was used in the form of milk compared with the present 63 per cent.

Hendrix, Lillegard and Jaegels, who just returned from the annual meeting of the American Dairy association at Chicago, reported consumption of milk is increasing. Before the war, 28 per cent of dairy products was used in the form of milk compared with the present 63 per cent.

The 1932 June dairy month slogan is "good eating for all ages." Industry chose this theme to emphasize knowledge of nutrition research, which indicates that children, persons 45 and over, need dairy foods, just as do infants and growing youngsters.

"Just as children need a good supply of calcium to build strong bones, so do older folks need calcium to prevent their bones from becoming brittle and their shoulders drooped," Simmons said.

"Dairy foods are the most economical source of meeting the requirements of good dieting," he said. "On a calorie basis and on an earning power basis, dairy foods are cheaper."

The average industrial worker today can earn the price of 72 quarts of milk in one hour, in 1940 one hour's work bought only 37 quarts of milk.

The purpose of the 1932 campaign is:

1. To dramatize the many uses of dairy foods for health, economy, and good eating for all ages.
2. Promote a better public understanding and appreciation of the dairy industry and its products.

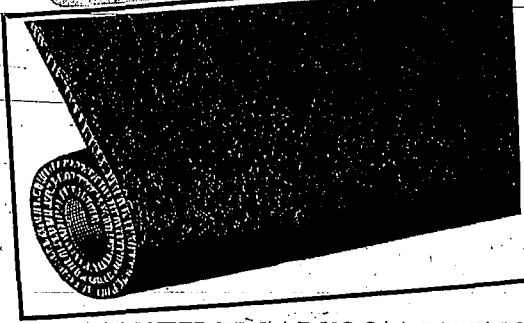
