Plane Wrecks Kill 12 Fliers

Two air force bomber crashes killed 12 airmen at training fields in the southwest Wednesday. Both crashes were caused by engine failures soon after takeoff.
The first plane to crash was a B-29 bomber that plowed to earth and burned while trying to return to Davis-Monthan field near Tucson, Ariz. All eight crewmen died. The plane crashed at 2:30 p. m. MST.
An hour and 15 minutes later, a B-47 Stratofortress six-engine bomber plummeted down on a runway at Kirtland air force base, Albuquerque, N. M. Three of the four men aboard were killed and the other died later.
And near Hughton, Kan., a Braniff airliner made an emergency landing in a wheat field Wednesday after one of its four engines failed. One of the 46 passengers aboard was injured slightly when she fell from a rope ladder jumping from the plane for the passengers to leave.
Planes destroyed the airliner. It was en route from Denver to Oklahoma City.

Gooding High School Chooses Legislators for YMCA Parley

GOODING, March 27—A duly elected senator and representative have been chosen by the student body of Gooding high school to attend the fifth annual session of the Idaho YMCA youth legislature at Boise April 4 and 5.

Elected to serve as senator was Art Koenig and chosen to serve in the house of representatives was Paul Tester. Alternates named were Henry Robinson and Neva Bright. The alternates will attend all sessions but will not serve in any of the official duties.

The purpose of the program is to give to Idaho high school young people a better understanding of the method by which public policy is determined, how laws and government is set up.

The Gooding delegation has prepared, with the assistance of Rep. William Fyfe, an amendment to the driver training permit law.

The group attended a pre-legislative conference for district 2 at the College of Idaho at Caldwell in February. There they elected officers, received instructions on preparing bills to be presented to the legislature and other duties.

The YMCA youth and government program is designed to give practical experience in the theory and practice of the American democratic way of making laws and determining public policy. Legislators are inducted into office, presented with a certificate of election and will hear an address by the governor of Idaho. They will organize to receive and consider bills which, if passed, are signed by the youth governor. The youth legislature follows at the College of Idaho in two days—the procedures of the Idaho state legislature.

Committee meetings will be held by the legislators, luncheons will be given for them, there will be a governor's ball and banquet, and other entertainment. Legislators will return to their communities and report to their constituents and to the community on their activities.

Conviction of Reds Called 'Injustice'

BALTIMORE, Md., March 27 (AP)—A communist historian and scholar testifying at the communist conspiracy trial here, referred back yesterday to the conviction of top communist leaders in New York as a "notable miscarriage of justice."

Dr. Herbert Aptheker, writer, teacher and editor, also told the court he believed "justice will come, and not too late, either."

Aptheker, who lectures at the Jefferson school of social sciences in New York, devoted most of his time on the witness stand to an exposition of the communist party principles and policies.

He cited numerous quotations ranging from the writings of Karl Marx to William Z. Foster, designed to show that the Communist party does not advocate violence. He said it was the essence of communist philosophy that the "social revolution is impossible without the will of the majority of the people."

"Realizing that the success of the attack depended on the rapid neutralization of the bunker, he fearlessly and with complete disregard for his own safety charged forward through the deadly barrage in a single-handed assault, accurately throwing hand grenades into the apertures."

Varela now is employed by the Bunting Tractor company. He and his wife reside in Twin Falls. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph R. Varela, Burley.

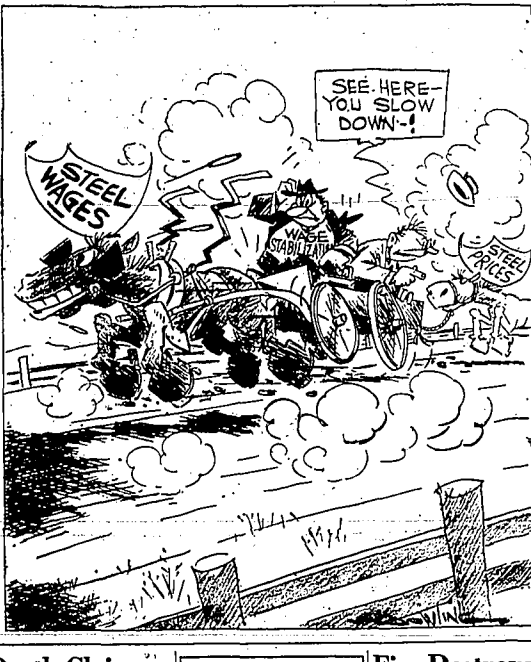

WASHINGTON, March 27 (UP)—The navy has started training crews for its robot weapons warships, the first two of which will be ready about 1954.

School Building Program in Valley to Exceed \$4,000,000 by End of This Year

(From Page One)

Budget cuts have made each succeeding bond issue higher.

In Blaine county the bond issue for the year 1934-35 is a considerable indication it will pass. It will provide \$250,000 for a new central high school building, and necessary remodeling and repairs to other county school buildings.

Estimated cost for the high school building is \$705,000. It will house all 10th, 11th and 12th grade students in the county, and will contain the three present high schools.

Present high schools in both Tupper and Hayburn are overcrowded with the construction of a new central high school, each could be used satisfactorily as junior high schools, school officials maintain.

Grades six through nine will be handled at Paul, Hayburn, Aecquia and Blaine each school will have the opportunity to maintain its identity in athletics and other sports of school competition. Tentative plans call for the construction of four new classrooms at Aecquia, the remodeling of the heating facilities for elementary school children, and provision of lavatory facilities for elementary school children. Estimated cost for this work has been set at \$16,000.

Both the elementary and present high school buildings at Hayburn will be used for the new high school. Plans also call for an estimated cost of \$18,000, also will be done on the Hayburn school.

At present some of the grades are being taught in the high school building. The present high school pupils are transferred to a central high school, the congested condition will be relieved. Educators will be relieved when the bond issue is passed. Other work, at an estimated cost of \$18,000, also will be done on the Hayburn school.

Plans also call for an all purpose room at the Prerabing school. This room will be added to the present building at a cost of \$18,000. Minor remodeling, at a cost of \$19,000, is planned for the Tupper junior high school so the building will be suitable for elementary grades.

Hansen's proposed program calls for a new gymnasium building to be 80 by 150 feet and will be done on the southwest corner of the main building. It will have a full basement in which a cafeteria, shop and dressing rooms will be included. The present gymnasium will be enlarged and the present gymnasium will be used for grade school use and small gatherings. The present cafeteria will be used as a home economics room.

Members of the Hansen school board expect to meet with the state reorganization board soon to complete the plan for the bond issue. After the meeting a date will be set for the election.

Last year the Hansen school was moved to the community, enlarged and made into four classrooms for the first three

grades. The basement houses a play room, restrooms and shop classrooms. The work was completed at the beginning of school last fall.

Blaine county's school problem has not reached a school building stage and there is no indication it will at this time. Presently the school trustees have ordered the transfer of Blaine high school pupils to Halley and the transfer of Gannett elementary school pupils from Halley to Blaine.

The state department of education has recommended the erection of a new grade school at Blaine and another grade school at Halley. The department urged that the new school in Halley provide facilities for a hot lunch program and sufficient playground area. It also recommended that a centralized all-grade school be provided at Carey with facilities for home-making and music departments.

Blaine county's board does not anticipate building program at this time because of high construction costs. The school levy for the coming year, as passed by the voters, is 26 mills.

Halley's grade school was erected in 1931 and classes are crowded. About the only change in the outward appearance of the building since it was erected is the installation of a roof over the bell and installation of a fire escape.

Blaine's school was built in 1934 but it has been enlarged since then. The only modern school in the county is at Ketchum, erected in 1933 and 1935. Cent schools have had two fires since 1920 and the Chico school recently was moved to Carey to provide more space for classrooms.

The Halley high school building was erected in 1908 and in 1920 a gymnasium and auditorium were added. In 1928 it was enlarged again with the present auditorium.

Gooding's new, block-long elementary school has been completed Feb. 10, 1935. The building replaced a 40-year old stone and brick structure that had been condemned as a fire hazard. The new building contains 20 classrooms, an auditorium which is used for the hot lunch program, gymnasium, library, office and teachers' and nurses' rooms.

The bond election for the school was passed Jan. 17, 1934, and construction was started the following March 14. Actually, the building was completed on Jan. 19, 1935, but it was not presented to the public until Feb. 10, 1935.

The new school in Gooding contains all modern improvements.

Jermyn's school was completed in July, 1935, at a cost of \$425,000. It took three elections before the bond issue was passed. The question was defeated in 1927 and 1928. After the school was built the classrooms were overcrowded and some classes were in session for only half days. School officials now claim that Jermyn's facilities are sufficient for the community's needs.

Construction of the new school in Cassford was started last fall but has not been progressing too rapidly because of the severe winter. The bond issue passed by the voters was for \$110,000 and cost of the building has been set at \$101,721. Part of the money raised in the bond election will be used to purchase land adjoining the school.

The new building will house grades one through seven. District work is nearly finished. Building in the shape of an L, the building will house eight classrooms, a library, teachers room, lavatories and heating system. The playground will be in the inside.

First grade rooms in the high school building will be used for the home economics department being planned for next year. The main part of the old school building will be moved across the street and converted into teachers apartments. The old building was erected in 1916. There are 150 children in the old building but the new ones, when it opens in the fall, will house 215 pupils.

The \$155,000 bond issue for Richfield's new school was passed last July 10. The contract was let to the Buhl Planning mill and sub-let to the Calhoun Construction company. The Calhoun Construction company indicated it could not go through with construction.

The proposed school will have six classrooms, a music room and a science room. There also will be a combination gymnasium and auditorium and a fully equipped kitchen and dining room for the home economics class and the hot lunch program. The present high school in the combination high school and elementary school will be used by grade school pupils. The north side of the building will be developed as a playground area for grade school pupils.

Filer, with its one-story junior high school to be built east of the present high school, is planning a modern educational plant. The bond issue passed by the voters totals \$400,000. When completed, the new school will house 350 pupils. The new addition will house six general classrooms, an industrial education department, a home economics department, auditorium, music department, health rooms, rest rooms, a home economics department and the necessary grounds. The auditorium will seat 850 persons.

Note and other objectionable features of the industrial arts and music departments will be kept from the general classrooms by sound proofing. One of the main features of the new school will be the large expanse of windows to provide more cheerful classrooms with adequate light. The auditorium is planned for maximum efficiency of sound conditioning and seating arrangements.

The old high school will be renovated to include a cafeteria, library, science laboratories and classrooms. The library will be sound-proofed.

At Hollister the building and grounds will be repaired and improved. The two classrooms will be moved across the street from the Hollister school while the lights in the school building will be replaced and the windows encased in steel frames. Other improvements will be made to the auditorium and classrooms.

A new sewage disposal unit will be installed at the Maroa school, new floors and stairways will be constructed and all windows will be replaced with steel frame windows. The front part will be leveled and resurfaced and the Washington school will be moved to Maroa for physical and health education.

At the Central elementary school in Filer the old furnace room will be reconstructed. The building equipped with modern lights and the entire building improved to house upper grade pupils. The Foster Hill school will be moved to the Central school site for health and physical education.

Board Orders Dissolving of Bank Empire

WASHINGTON, March 27 (AP)—The board of governors of the federal reserve system today ordered the \$700,000,000 Chemical banking empire dissolved. The vote was 3 to 2. Chairman William C. McChesney Martin, Jr. announced the decision and said the west coast banking combine known as Trans-America Corporation has a little more than two years to comply with the board's instructions.

Trans-America is expected to appeal the decision to the courts.

Resisting Competition
The board's order, when published later this week, will say Trans-America has tended to restrain competition among banks in five western states.

The order requires Trans-America to get rid of all the bank stock holdings in those states, except the Bank of America—the largest bank in the west.

Trans-America has 90 days, from the time it receives formal notification of the board's decision, to make plans to put the banks' stocks into "new and different hands." After that, it has two years to complete the dissolution.

Violates Laws
Violation of the Clayton anti-trust act through stock ownership by other control of 48 banks with 607 offices in California, Oregon, Nevada, Arizona and the state of Washington was complained of.

The Clayton act forbids a holding company to acquire two or more operating companies when such control would lessen competition among enterprises involved.

Veterinarians Use Two-Way Radio to Save Time, Animals in Magic Valley

A two-way radio system developed to save mileage, time and livestock has been placed in service at the Twin Falls Veterinary hospital by Dr. I. M. Jackson and Dr. D. A. Jackson. The radio is believed to be the first used for this purpose in Idaho and possibly in the western states.

Dr. I. M. Jackson believes the radio, which can be used on calls to the office and between cars of himself and his brother, will cut mileage one-third and permit more and faster service on emergency calls, thus saving considerable livestock.

The radio installation was completed last week. Mrs. Rae M. Rieger, bookkeeper for the hospital, serves as radio dispatcher. She estimates she takes between 50 and 60 calls daily. As in the case with radios in taxi cabs and police cars, the federal communications commission issues a license. The hospital is on a separate wave length from police and taxi radios.

There are many advantages of the radio arrangement. Mrs. Rieger points out the doctors often receive several calls in the same area, making it a time-consuming project to go to Hazelton, Gooding, or Murtaugh, return to the office, then go back to the same area for a call which may have come in while the doctors were in the area.

Use of radio permits the doctors to call ahead to the office while they are returning from a call in this way they can have instruments or medicines prepared or ready when they arrive on route to another case. The radio permits the doctors to consult each other when in different areas. Sometimes a case requires the services of more than one veterinarian and one can call the other on the radio.

A more even distribution of calls is made possible through the use of the radio. Dr. I. M. Jackson points out that instant care often is necessary in certain cases, and with the radio, the doctor can leave routine calls and handle the emergency. Veterinarians usually travel considerable distances. There is one other veterinarian in Twin Falls, one each in Buhl, Jerome and Gooding. As a result, the Jacksons treat animals as far away as Gooding, Hazelton and Murtaugh.

The radio setup is not quite at its maximum efficiency. A 40-foot elevator aerial is being used now and the cars have been contacted at Wendell and Hazelton. Eventually, it is hoped a 20-foot aerial will enable the doctors to be contacted about 50 miles away.

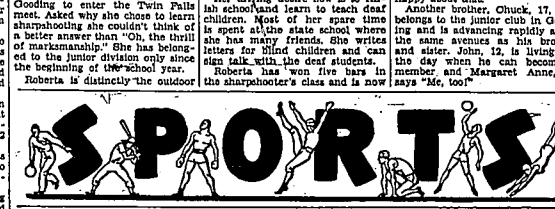

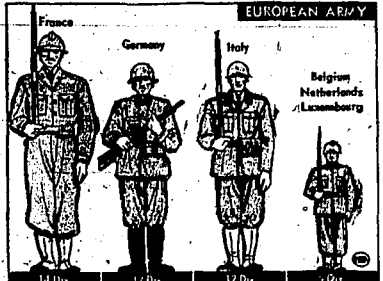

Special Levy Is Asked for Hikes in Pay

BURLEY, March 27—A resolution requesting Cassia county commissioners to meet to study a "special levy" to raise teachers salaries to a closer level with salaries provided for teachers in other counties in this area was approved at a special meeting of the Cassia county school board here today.

This special meeting was called in response to a previous request of the Cassia county education association that teachers salaries in Cassia county be made comparable to salaries throughout the state. At a meeting held by the association March 13, teachers asked that steps be taken to bring salaries in Cassia county up to a level with salaries of surrounding counties.

School Supt. Burrill Wrightley said the school board has levied the maximum under law and the only way to meet the increase asked by teachers is through the three-mill levy by the commissioners. According to Wrightley, the board uses approximately 75 per cent of its budget for teachers salaries while the national average is 70 per cent.

The superintendent said a three-mill levy would increase teachers salaries approximately \$300 over last year. Comparing teachers salaries in this county to those of other counties, Wrightley said "The Cassia teacher, with maximum experience and two-year's training, earns \$400 less than the average teacher in Twin Falls, Gooding, Kimberly, Wendell, Duni and Middletown. With four year training, they receive \$435 less and with a master's degree, \$187 less."

"The beginning teacher in Cassia county, with two years experience," he said, "makes \$485 less than in other areas and a beginning teacher with a degree receives \$425 less. The beginning teacher with a masters degree receives \$340 less."

Wrightley stated that the three-mill levy will increase taxes on the average home approximately \$2.50 and, on an 80-acre irrigated farm with improvements approximately \$12.

DDT Threats For Mosquito Losing Force
 WASHINGTON, March 27 (AP)—Don't run for the DDT when the mosquitoes start buzzing this summer—they may like it. Agriculture department entomologists said today recent tests in Florida and California show the pest is now "definitely resistant" to DDT, which once was deadly poison to them. They said that while mosquitoes are not yet noticeably resistant to DDT, which once was deadly poison to them, they are now building up immunity to it given time. The new poisons include Lindane, chlordane and DDT. The experts pointed out that DDT has been used extensively in the two test areas since it was first available in 1945. The resistance build-up has been gradual but is speeded up when insecticides are used on mosquito larvae—that is, by spraying swamps and other breeding grounds. When large-scale mosquito control campaigns are directed against mosquitoes, the entomologists explained, most of the insecticide-susceptible mosquitoes are killed. "This greatly increases the chances for resistant mosquitoes to build up rapidly a resistant mosquito population," the entomologists explained. The experts suggested that the answer may be more dependence on permanent control methods, instead of spraying with insecticides. Per-

Warily Eye Steel Pay Rift

Costs resulted principally from declines in food prices, generally free of government controls. Wholesale prices, reflected several weeks or months later in retail prices, have started to edge higher in recent weeks after months of slow but steady decline.

The big price uncertainty is steel. At the present dispute between the industry and the CIO Steel Workers union is settled with a major increase in steel wages and prices, many economists are convinced the effect will be a general rise in many wages and prices. The steel industry, could start the inflationary spiral all over again.

Average weekly earnings in all manufacturing industries jumped from \$58.85 in June, 1950, to \$67.50 last December. But inflation and higher taxes have taken a bit out of the buying power of each dollar. Just before Korea, the dollar was worth 58.8 cents compared to its 1952-53 purchasing power. Last December it was worth only 52.8 cents.

Most of the 11 per cent retail price rise after Korea came in the last half of 1950. Throughout 1951, the rise was 4.2 per cent or less than one-half of one per cent a month. There has been no overall increase this year.

The last report by the labor department's bureau of labor statistics showed the cost of living had dropped six-tenths of one per cent in the month ended Feb. 15. This was the first price drop since last July and the sharpest since December, 1949. It resulted in a wage cut of 1 cent an hour for 1,150,000 railroad workers. The price decline was featured by a 2.1 per cent cut in retail food prices, the biggest since February, 1949.

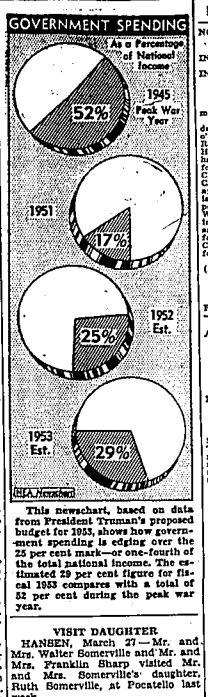
