Twins Kept Pledge Not to Marry While Mother Lived; They're 73 and Single

TUCSON, Ariz., March 29—Years ago Dan and Dave Gillis, identical twins, promised their mother they would never marry as long as she lived. Two years ago, their mother died at the age of 70 and the Gillis twins are still single.

For the past 10 years they've been getting their mail at the general delivery window at the Mountain Home postoffice. But they're receiving their mail through a lot of postoffices—in Colorado, Wyoming and Idaho since they started work as cowboys in 1906.

Dan still works at his trade. He's employed by Davidson brothers, Prairie in Elmore county, and takes cattle into Hole national forest from June to November. Dave gave up that so-called life two years ago because of asthma. He works now as a cook at a ranch house near Inkom. Because of Dave's asthma, they have spent the winter here.

The Gillis twins were born July 10, 1878, in Mount City, Mo. Now, as they near the 74-year mark, both hear and see well and have full crops of black hair. Grandparents on both sides of their family lived to be 90, 85, 90 or 100.

Although the law social security payments, they don't think the old age pension is worth taking. They say they couldn't live on it alone and anyway, they'd rather work. And they aren't interested in piling up any money in a bank because they have no living relatives.

Both say they have never had an argument. They dance, have similar tastes. Like any long-time bachelor, they wash, iron, sew and cook.

The twins have been healthy until Dave got asthma two years ago. Dan says the only time he ever needed a doctor was when he was struck by lightning and had recovered before the doctor arrived.

When Dan and Dave were young men, they say girls were scarce in the west. They met girls but never stayed in any one place long enough to do any serious courting. And by the time they'd return to a town, the girls they knew had been married. "But it's leap year and they aren't living under a pledge to remain single anymore. As they put it: "Any old inside who want to get married, we're still willing; we never gave up the idea."

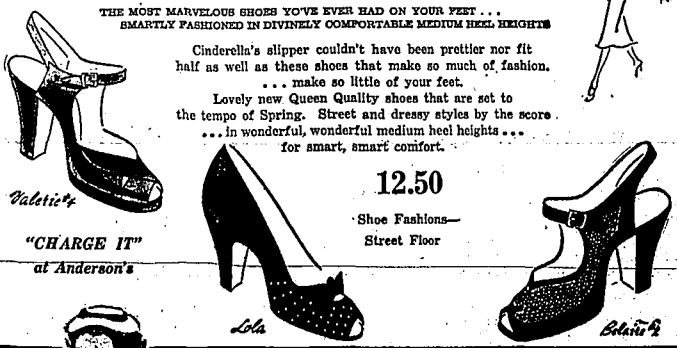

Repairs Being Made to Water Lock at Magic Reservoir Dam

SHOESHONE, March 29—Repairs on a water release lock at Magic dam were started this week by J. F. West of the Hardie-Tines Manufacturing company, Birmingham, Ala. A crack in the control of the needle valve in one of the gates is broken and West was brought to the dam to repair it.
There are two water gates at the dam and water is other junctions perfectly, the one with the broken rack will operate only at full capacity. The valve is so constructed that water pressure keeps it open and it is closed by filling it with water.

Resident Objects to Retirement For Teachers Who Didn't Pay

Editor, Times-News: The records in the state auditor's office show that approximately 50 of the teachers who are drawing retirement pay did not pay one cent into the retirement fund for a month or are getting around \$50 a month.

I take an estimated average of \$100 a month. This makes \$3,000 a year. These persons can have a social security card (teachers do) and besides extra earnings, they can earn social security retirement. I believe that the state should deduct from payments, I believe, many of the 50 teachers in question own property and may pay income taxes but no lien is put on their property as in case of old age assistance.

I believe in justice, not classes. These persons quit teaching in the first year of teaching retirement on the 10 years teaching and therefore under the law, paid nothing into the fund but used all of their years teaching in Idaho to secure these benefits.

Cut in Potato Output Noted For Past Year

IDAHO FALLS, March 28 (AP)—Idaho produced 9,000,000 bushels fewer potatoes during the past season than in the preceding year, the production and marketing administration said today.

In his annual summary, Allan Henry, manager of the PMA market news office here, said also that "quality was not as good as was expected, principally because of an extended dry spell during the late summer."

Idaho's total production for the 1931 growing season was estimated at 37,500,000 bushels. That compared with 1930 yield of 46,500,000 bushels and the 10-year average of 37,370,000.

The marketing season was termed unpredictable. Briak demand caused potato prices to climb during the fall months, with quotations rising \$2.20 to \$4.00 for 100 pounds of U. S. No. 1 tubers.

In mid-January the office of price stabilization stamped on ceilings prices, resulting in strong profits from growers.

"Bulk buying from the grower became vicious as supplies became short," Henry's report said. Some industry spokesmen said black marketing was noticeable.

The report predicted that by April 10 virtually the entire 1931 crop will be marketed.

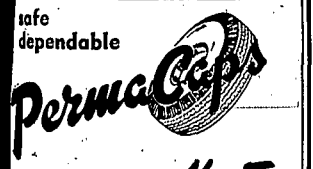

Any serviceman can vote in Idaho if he maintains his residence here and it is over the age of 21. County Clerk T. W. Stivers said Saturday that the same provisions apply to employees of the government maintaining residence here and employed overseas.

Either of these two categories should write to the county clerk's office at the courthouse for absentee registration and a ballot. The registration form is on the outside of the ballot envelope which remains sealed when it is returned to the county clerk until it is delivered to the proper precinct on election day.

Applicants should give their local address and, if they have a rural address, a clear description of the address so the clerk can determine the proper precinct. The voter doesn't know his precinct number. The ballots must be delivered by the clerk to the proper precinct.

Ballots should be requested in sufficient time to be mailed by the clerk to the voter, then returned to the clerk and delivered to the precinct on election day. It is not necessary to register for the general election if the voter has registered for the primary election.

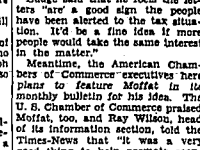

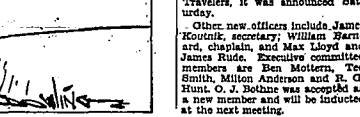

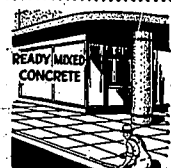

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Pruett Gives Globe Shape Explanation

Not only in the realm of the immaterial, but in the realm of the material order, but also in the world of small things—even the infinitesimally minute, this tendency is universal.

Everyone knows the sun and moon are round. Almost as many realize that the earth is a globe. Those who use astronomical telescopes know that the principal planets also are spherical. But descending from the clouds, they find that the drops in the leavies and soap bubbles floating in the breeze invariably assume the globe shape.

The writer recently encountered a striking example of this principle. A yellow luncheon napkin, the spoke of rich-red fruit juice had fallen likely no larger in volume than a pin point. The globe of the napkin was so charming a magnifying glass was brought into use. Under the magnifying glass, the globe became a most beautiful ruddy sphere, a world in miniature.

Strangely enough, why do not floating soap bubbles and dew drops assume a cubical form and why are planets not flat disks as some of the ancients thought our world to be?

The answer to these questions is that the surface tension forces of the surface of a small as possible.
