Check Shows Prices Cut in New Catalogs

CHICAGO, March 30 (AP)—Spring catalogs of the nation's four leading mail order houses show price reductions of 6 to 27 per cent on a wide variety of merchandise from hosiery to heating systems.

The biggest cuts were listed in the Montgomery Ward catalog. It showed women's hose and cotton nightgowns down as much as 27 per cent. A 16-cubic foot home refrigerator was cut from \$139.95 to \$284.45 and numerous small appliances carried 14 per cent reductions.

Sears, Roebuck and company slashed prices as much as 27 per cent on 1,000 items. The 246-page catalog listed 800 new items including a folding hot unit, a safety swim vest and a room air conditioner.

The sharpest reductions were on home furnishings, light fixtures and other aluminum cooking ware. Also reduced were shoes, summer furniture, yard goods, luggage, fragrances, heating systems and electric ranges.

Streams Subdue Defiant Convicts

TRENTON, N. J., March 31 (AP)—Firemen poured pressurized water into a cell block today to bring down a half dozen defiant convicts who refused to obey prison authorities asked for a "truce" today.

The 14 were holding 14 inmates as hostages. They had defied guards to "come in and get out of the cell."

The men were summoned and they poured water through the barred windows at the rate of 3,000 gallons a minute.

Dripping wet and thoroughly agitated, the convicts were taken to the water by William P. Carly, supervising the water barrage from the prison yard. For a period of 15 minutes the men turned off their hoses pending an unconditional surrender.

26 Counties Gain U.S. Disaster Aid

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—The agriculture department designated 26 Colorado counties and two each in Utah and Montana as disaster loss areas.

The action makes it possible for farmers who sustained crop or livestock losses from drought and conditions to receive loans from farmers home administration.

The department has prolonged drought for two successive years in the Colorado counties has damaged pastures and villages. Drought in the area seriously dry conditions last summer coupled with early snow later hit hard on the farms in the Duchesne and Uintah counties. Heavy snows all last winter hampered Montana livestock feeders in Fallon and Carter counties.

USAF Leaders Die In Plane Accident

OMAHA, Neb., March 31 (AP)—Brig. Gen. Jesse D. Austin, Demosco, Wis., and Capt. Lynn Thompson, 4th Air Command, and Lt. Col. Edwin R. Bush, Burbank, Calif., of the same office, were killed early today when a B-29 bomber crashed at O'Hara air base near here.

Three others were injured when the plane returning from a routine flight to Burbank, overtook the field and smashed to the ground on a Wichita farm. One of the engines of the twin-engine craft apparently was dead.

Austin was not married. He had been in the service since 1928. During World War II he served in England. Since then, he took part in the Berlin airlift and had seen duty in Korea, where he was awarded the Legion of merit.

Former Senator Passes in Maine

AUBURN, Me., March 31 (AP)—Former Sen. Wallace H. White, 74, an expert on congressional shipping legislation and majority leader in the Republican-controlled 80th congress, died in his sleep early today.

He had been ill several months with a recurrence of a heart ailment that had plagued him for years.

He retired in 1949 after 16 years in the senate and 14 in the house.

Referred to as "Whitey" in congressional circles, he wrote the nation's first radio law—White represented the United States at several international conferences.

Truman Is Looking Forward To "Elder Statesman" Role

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—President Truman is looking forward to becoming an "elder statesman."

He already has made fairly definite plans for a post-World War II career of lecturing and writing on public affairs. It was learned today.

But Maj.-Gen. Harry H. Vaughan and some of the other presidential cronies who have been dubbed "the Missouri gang" soon may be casting about for gainful employment in private life.

—Associate staff Mr. Truman has no present intention of running for the senate in Missouri, as he has hinted he might like to do.

But they said he would be very pleased if congress would enact long-pending legislation to make all foreign-born presidential candidates eligible for gainful employment in private life.

Jonathan Daniels, the President's friend and biographer, spent Sunday morning with the Trumans at the White House. He said Mr. Truman was happy about his approaching retirement and "more relaxed than I have seen him in many months."

Mr. Truman had confided his future plans to Daniels, but pledged him to silence.

One informed guess is that Mr. Truman may lecture at some big university, as William Howard Taft did after leaving the White House. Mr. Truman has indicated in the past that he would like to deliver a series of lectures on his first-hand experiences in American politics, under the general subject of "The craft worker to President."

Vanuxem, the President's portering military aide who has been the target of congressional "five percenters" investigations, is expected to retire from the army about the time Mr. Truman leaves office—or sooner if he is offered a good job. He was in the lumber business before he joined Mr. Truman's staff many years ago.

Results Close in Reich Local Vote

MUNICH, Germany, March 31 (AP)—The social democrats, bitter opponents of West German rearmament, held a narrow edge over Christian democrats today on the basis of early incomplete returns from yesterday's Bavarian local elections.

The partial results still gave a substantial overall majority to Adenauer's forces along with other groups supporting rearmament.

However, the elections were fought largely on local issues and were not considered a referendum test for Adenauer's army policy.

The communists appeared to have won a stiff battle in the balloting, held to pick about 60,000 mayors, town councilors and other officials in more than 7,000 cities, towns and villages of the largest of West Germany's nine states.

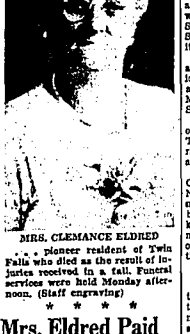
Cash Grants for School Reported

Farewell Tour of Europe Halted by Eisenhower Aides

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—General Eisenhower may make a flying farewell tour in the next six weeks to the capitals of the United States' European allies. Officers at SHAPE said today "it is a possibility."

Guessing here is that Eisenhower, a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, will resign his allied command sometime in late May and return to the United States.

The general has not been in some of the capitals of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization since he expired in Europe more than a year ago to take over as commander. On a trip early this month to Greece and Turkey, the newest NATO members, Eisenhower requested in Athens: "I hope to come back in the spring." He also is known to have promised government leaders in some other nations of the alliance that he would visit them soon.
