

TREATY WITH JAPAN

The Senate's thumping 9-to-10 ratification of the Japanese peace treaty represents the "greatest deliberative body in the world" in one of its more enlightened moods. These have not been too frequent in recent times.

It is a new departure in a new departure in peace pacts. It is not vindictive and punitive. It is designed to promote among the Japanese a wholesome growth of democracy, a sound, self-sustaining economy and a friendly partnership with the free nations in battle against communism.

Unquestionably the pact is not perfect. It represents a compromise that is not possible among all the peace-making powers. No country will be wholly satisfied. If any were, the others would be dissatisfied.

But this treaty was ably conceived and hammered out. Many tributes have already been paid to the principal architect, John Foster Dulles. Final congratulations are now in order.

It is a Republican, but a number of GOP senators were not by this fact shaken out-of-shape customary opposition to American foreign commitments of whatever sort. And they were joined by Democratic Senator McCarran of Nevada, who also finds it necessary to be against things that involve other governments.

Senators, the majority in both parties backed the treaty, and all efforts to attach crippling reservations or postpone action were beaten. It was widely recognized that this pact would do more to introduce elements of stability in the far east than anything that had occurred on the scene since World War II ended.

This is the first major treaty to be adopted without the participation of our erstwhile Russian allies. It is an indication that we need not wait forever to attempt the creation of order in these portions of the world where our strength is not yet fully developed.

As if to emphasize this lesson, the Senate recently ratified three accompanying security accords covering the Pacific areas. Two were mutual agreements between the United States and the Philippines, and the U. S. and Australia-New Zealand. The third was a pact between the United States and Japan, providing for the stationing of American troops in the Japanese Islands, and otherwise reinforcing the peace treaty.

The 1959 session of the 82nd congress is unlikely to be distinguished for much bold legislation, since election necessitated normally a two-year interval between lawmaking.

Supplying the Japanese, however, may well be the real high-water mark for Congress this season.

LITTLE RELIEF IN SIGHT

No matter who occupies the White House next January, we are not likely to enjoy any early reduction in taxes. From the most conservative to the most liberal candidate for President, we are hearing pessimism on that

Senator Russell of Georgia, newest entry in the presidential lists, is also the latest to discourage hope of a speedy tax cut. He does see some chance of a material slash in the budget, but believed tax relief must be de-

fined as a "realistic" measure.

None of the Democratic hopefuls talk of easing taxes. Their emphasis is on the burdens facing government.

On the Republican side, General Eisenhower's specific views on taxes are not known. It may be fairly assumed from his general statements that he favors some tax relief re-

lief when it is practical. But he is not a backer of foreign aid and rearmament, the two heaviest drains on the federal treasury; hence he is unlikely to consider as "practical" any tax trimming that would endanger those programs.

Senator Taft advocates tax cutting in his campaign tour. But he is trying to make it thoroughly understood that he does not pretend this goal could be quickly achieved. To questioners he declared the first order of business is to chop expenses, since they currently outrun revenues by several billions.

It would put the government into deficit, and thereby drive up interest rates still higher than ever. somewhere there must be a limit to this kind of paradise, even in the United States. Most politicians are reluctant to strain the country's credit to find that limit.

House Okays Flood, River Projects Bill

WASHINGTON, April 3 (AP)—A bill to provide \$429,000 for flood control and rivers and harbors work in Idaho was passed by the House without adding or subtracting a penny from recommendations of its appropriations committee.

The bill now goes to the Senate.

It carries some \$465,000 for a civil works bill which would control navigation—air and water—on the river system started July 1.

No Cut Made

It is the first time this year the house has failed to trim an appropriations bill recommended by its appropriations committee.

As it goes to the Senate the bill will be considered in the Senate's President Truman's budget requests for civil functions. This is the third time the Senate has been asked to consider the committee's recommendations in the committee's departmental appropriation bill thus far this year.

The bill provides \$429,000 for rivers and harbors projects; \$22,400 for flood control projects; \$600 for navigation; \$11,350,000 for dams; \$1,350,000 for irrigation; \$1,350,000 for the Panama canal; \$14,500,000 for the soldiers' home and \$4,000,000 for other purposes.

Projects Omitted

Many projects which President Truman had recommended were cut out of the bill by the committee.

Chief among them are The Dalles, \$1,500,000; Hells Canyon, \$1,500,000; Tule Lake reservoir, Kana, \$15,500,000; Chesham lock and dam, \$1,500,000; Hells Canyon dam, S. C., \$4,000,000; and Kenkuk, Ia., lock on the Mississippi river, \$2,200,000.

Some of these and other sharply-trimmed projects survived so they would not have to have the Senate add them back in. Others were left in the bill or increased the amounts allowed.

The Senate's bill has increased the house bill substantially.

Kaiser Steel Okays Boost In Pay Rate

OAKLAND, Calif., April 3 (UPI)—Kaiser Steel corporation has reached an agreement with the CIO United Steel Workers, giving \$7.00 an hour to hourly increases and other benefits.

President Henry Kaiser said his corporation signed the contract in "good faith" and that it will grant a "necessary and regular steel price adjustment."

The contract, which went into effect April 1, will remain in effect until the recommendations of the wage stabilization board, the controversial wartime recommendation of the steel industry, is made public. The contract has been in operation at Fontana since 1946.

The pact was regarded as the first break on a united employers' front which resulted in a three-month nationwide steel strike scheduled for April 8.

"We believe the course is in the best interest of Kaiser employees, its 16,000 stockholders, its suppliers, steel consumers—in the national economy," Kaiser said.

Negotiations with the steel workers concluded over a "prolonged period of time," he added.

Production Needed

We conclude that production should be increased during the defense period while price deliberations are continuing with the government.

"It had become apparent, even prior to the WSB recommendations, that the mounting costs of production were becoming prohibitive."

LAWRENCE, April 3 (UPI)—Flouridation of Lewiston's water has brought a "marked benefit" to the dental health of children living within the city limits, Dr. O. Young, director of dental health for the Idaho department of public health, reported.

"Fluoridation is a definite benefit to the dental health of Lewiston children."

"Lewiston has had centralized fluoridation for almost five years longer than any other city west of the Rocky Mountains," Dr. Young pointed out. "Because of this fact the dental services expected at Lewiston is of interest to the whole western area."






