Calvin Chesnut, 34, of New York, was sentenced to five years. The other defendants were sentenced to two, three, four and five years.

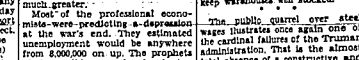

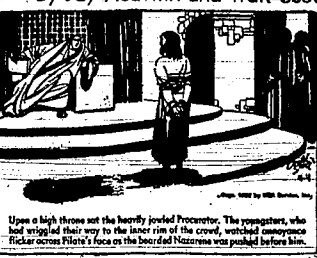

Meanwhile, it would be a good idea for mothers, and if possible, fathers, to take a few lessons in shopwork that will enlighten them in such matters as balky toasters, blown fuses and the like. That would help greatly and leave only the complicated tasks for the experts, who take to be called in to put a washer on a leaking faucet, help the school to help you in this.



### Extension for Proposed Gas Line Is Seen

EDMONTON, Alta., April 4.—(U.S. News)—Transmontana company plans eventually to extend its proposed Peace River gas line to Calgary. President Frank McMahon said Thursday. He made the disclosure in Calgary as oil industry leaders saw a possible break in Alberta's no-export policy on bringing a new source of development in northern Alberta and British Columbia.

McMahon said the gas resources of northwestern Alberta and northeastern British Columbia are sufficient to warrant construction of the 100,000-mile pipeline to Vancouver and the Pacific northwest states. "As reserves increase, we contemplate extension of the line to California," McMahon said. McMahon's confidence in the availability of supply contrasted with disappointing votes in the northwestern United States at the limited amount of gas earmarked for export.
