Michigan Accord May Set Pattern In Phone Dispute

TWIN FALLS, April 11 (AP)—Michigan Bell Telephone company and the CIO Communications workers announced today a 12 1/2 cent hourly pay increase to end a five-day strike. President Joseph Boire said the terms "could serve as a pattern" to settle the national telephone industry.

The Michigan agreement was the first break in the telephone tieup involving 43 states, at a time when long-distance lines already were overclouded by a nationwide walk-out of 30,000 Western Union telegraphers.

Boire announced in Washington that the Michigan settlement could be the key to end telephone disputes everywhere if the American Telephone and Telegraph company would make it one.

Approval Needed
Under the agreement, employees making less than \$4 a week will get 13 cents, plus a national 11 cent increase if approved by the WGB. Those making \$4 and over will get 47 cents.

Missouri's Federal Industrial Relations Director Clyde M. Mills ordered his field offices to take all-out efforts to settle strikes in Bell systems in Ohio, New Jersey, northern California and Pennsylvania.

Also announced today are 15,000 Western Electric company employees who insist and distribute their own picket lines. The W. E. picket lines would stay in place until the strike is reached.

Strat Weaver, head of the striking Western Electric picket line, said the Michigan terms, saying the wage increases were "a drop in the bucket" and that the company was "trying to outwit us," is a hot summer for the U. S. stand against the strike.

BOISE, April 11 (AP)—Motorists 15 to 24 years of age were involved in 15 to 24 percent of the accidents reported in Idaho last year, according to a report by the Idaho State Police.

The report, which is the first of its kind in Idaho, shows that the 15 to 24 age group is the most dangerous group of drivers in the state.

The report also shows that the 25 to 34 age group is the next most dangerous group of drivers in the state.

The report is based on a study of 10,000 accidents reported in Idaho last year.

White House Says Return Set for June

WASHINGTON, April 11 (AP)—The White House announced today Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's resignation as supreme allied commander effective June 1—a schedule that will give him 36 days to campaign before the Republican national convention meets in Chicago July 7.

Eisenhower's first public appearance before the public as a candidate for Republican presidential nomination probably will be June 4 in his home town, Abilene, Kans. On that date ceremonies are scheduled in connection with the Eisenhower inauguration.

Eisenhower's resignation request April 2 was met by Secretary of State Robert A. Taft, who advised President Truman. The general also wrote directly to Mr. Truman and received a handwritten reply from the President.

White House Secretary Joseph Short said this exchange was "personal and very cordial," but the letters would not be published.

Eisenhower also directly advised the standing group of the North Atlantic treaty organization which was his letter to the group was presented at 11 a. m. today by Gen. Curtis M. Bradley, chairman of the U. S. Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Eisenhower "threw the staff" and which his request for retirement should be announced by Mr. Truman. His letter to the board of education did not deal with the understanding with which the agreement was announced in December, 1931.

AEC Reports Plan to Build Fifth A Plant

WASHINGTON, April 11 (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission announced today it plans to build a fifth atomic explosives plant to cost about \$10,000,000.

The new plant will be a uranium enrichment plant, which will be built on the one built during the war at Oak Ridge, Tenn., and the \$500,000 one which will be built near Paducah, Ky. It probably will be built in the Ohio Valley.

The "new Jefferson" plant will be part of the \$100,000,000 program announced by President Truman last January.

The AEC said details of the project will be made available to the public as soon as possible.

 - (c) a coupling mechanism on the upper portion of the center housing, of the form employed in Ford 8N tractors manufactured prior to November 22, 1949; and Ford Motor Company and Dearborn Motors Corporation must affix a notice on any long coupling pins, manufactured by them, to the effect that the pin is sold only for replacement on 8N tractors made by Ford prior to November 22, 1949.

This notice will continue to be affixed until October 25, 1966.

3. The Ford Motor Company and Dearborn Motors Corporation shall have a period of time, expiring not later than December 31, 1952 in which to make these changes.
4. All other claims and counter claims are dismissed and withdrawn on their merits.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 11 (AP)—Sen. Felix Kefauver, Tennessee, came to Oregon Thursday in his campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination and promised full development of the nation's resources.

"He told a Democratic rally, 'Our natural resources are a heritage of all our people. We must not let them go to waste because of the dangers of creeping socialism,'" he said.

"But I say to you unequivocally," he added, "that 'creeping socialism' is our opponent here, TVA, rural electrification, the St. Lawrence seaway and hydro-electric projects."

"He said we have called social gains of Democratic programs including rural electrification, low-cost housing, farm stabilization and farm control."

"We need to get on with the world that when people—as a nation—bother themselves about the welfare of each individual and make government an instrument of the people will there be no end to the social gains which can be made."

"The solution here for only one day, said he would return to Oregon to conduct an active campaign before the May 16 primary."

"You have great natural resources," he said in reference to the northwest which supply great quantities of public power."

"He described freight rates of the area as 'discriminatory' and a 'barrier' and said 'we must continue the effort' to equalize them."

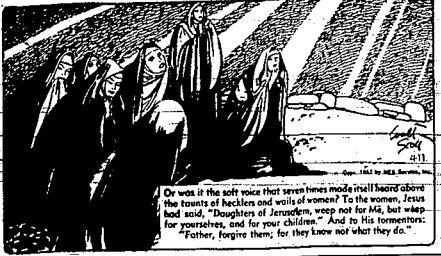
