**Kefauver Calls for Full Power Development in Columbia Basin**

POCATELLO, April 12 (AP)—Sen. Estes Kefauver Friday called for full development of power resources in the Pacific northwest as it would "greatly enrich the production in this section of the country." The Democratic presidential hopeful identified himself as a long-time supporter of the Tennessee valley authority and said he has favored a Columbia valley plan. Speaking before more than 1,000 persons here, he said three-fourths of the power potential in the Pacific northwest remained undeveloped.

Touching on the power problem which is being solved in Boise, earlier in the day, the Tennessee said "every area has its own problems of water irrigation and reclamation."

Although he referred often to Palmdale dam, construction of which is scheduled to start this summer, Kefauver did not mention the controversial Hells canyon proposal.

Kefauver said his Pacific northwest trip is the first since he left the White House in 1949. He said he had been in Boise for a certain period in which to accept it. He said if they reject it, the military should "call the truce off and demand what action to take. Kefauver said he favored pursuit of the reds across the Columbia river into Manchuria.

**A DANGEROUS SHOWDOWN**

When the staid and conservative New York Times is inclined to string along with the socialistic policies of the present national administration, in fact, in exception to presidential action, it's significant indeed. And when it expressed itself as follows, regarding President Truman's seizure of the steel industry, it is no surprise to assume the New York Times was alarmed:

"It is obvious that if this order stands up in the federal courts we shall have entered a new era in which the 'implied powers' of the presidency go very far indeed. If the President can take over the steel industry, set the wages it shall pay and govern its right to pay for its members and interests, it is not to creditors, he can on course do the same thing in the case of any other industry whose product bulks large in the national economy or is of importance to the national defense. In this case it will no longer be necessary for the President to seek congressional authority in matters of this kind. The President, any President, will have established a precedent which will give executive order a status and a very substantial extent we shall all be living under a new regime of government by executive decree."

Every American who has any serious regard for his country's future, particularly if he is in a position to vote, should read this and it is supposed to guarantee him, should ponder well the warning which the New York Times expresses in its usual dignified terms.

This "new era" in presidential power, "stands up in the federal courts" has far more significance than the average reader may realize. As the Times puts it, "the implied powers" might go "very far indeed."

It also stands to reason that if President Truman, or any other President, can assume control over anything "referred" to him by executive order, he may also refer to him by executive order, then the average citizen, whatever his little business may be, doesn't have a prayer, as many of them already have, of knowing when the business of the government is necessary to them to take issue with any of the government's whims.

So it should not be very difficult for any of us to understand why the New York Times meant when it added "... and to a very substantial extent we shall all be living under a new regime of government by executive decree."

That's just another way of describing a political dictatorship under which a President could control the destinies of every last American in the United States if he so desired.

There's no mystery as to what motivated President Truman in talking sides with labor in the latter's fight with the steel industry. For weeks, before and since the president announced he would seek a declaration of emergency, he has been peddling some such political maneuver as that which is now taking place. He would have us believe that the President would make a grandstand play to labor as a last desperate hope for the present administration to survive the forthcoming election. He would have us believe that the President would make an appeal to the greatest possible number of votes, and he would.

The fact that the wage increase demanded by labor and approved by the wage stabilization board was a violation of the anti-inflation act is of no concern to the President.

Indeed, Mr. Truman went all the way to give the steel industry a special privilege with his special statements that "the steel companies are reckless and unscrupulous in their demands for a special preferred treatment, not available to any other industry."

It is to be noted that the steel industry was well able to absorb most of the wage increase out of its profits, and that it attempted to portray as "being bigger and bigger."

"By the same old trademark trick which Mr. Truman, the New Dealers and the master planners have been playing for years. They reveal to our imagined property and point repeatedly to mounting profits but they say nothing about what is left after the payment of federal taxes which meantime have mounted up to such a point that they have to be paid out of the coming year's head of net earnings. Even when the household is in a position where the taxes are making more and more of the net earnings."

It is generally such great industries as steel most operate as to make great profits. Otherwise how can they hope to remain solvent under the ever-increasing tax load.

Industry's answer to Mr. Truman is that he calls for a "positive-benefit" tax-waiting deduction. It is to be noted that the steel industry, the New York Times has just published a report on 1935-1936 showing a 1400 per cent increase in its profits in the United States, showing that "higher taxes and higher operating costs were reducing net income after taxes, cutting the return on net assets and trimming the profit margin on sales."

But all that does not interest Mr. Truman. He would rather tell us that the steel industry is "reckless and unscrupulous" in its demands for a special preferred treatment than to admit that it is making more and more of the net earnings.

Messing, the courts to which the steel companies have appealed, appear to be stalling. And the pressure is on in only one direction. Unless the steel companies can muster enough strength to fight both labor and government, they would seem to have little realistic chance under this "new era" of government by executive decree.

Sen. Edward Martin of Pennsylvania has predicted the possible result of the steel companies' appeal to the supreme court. He said, "The steel industry will be the first step toward nationalization of the steel industry."

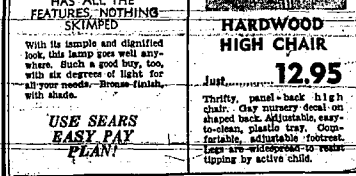
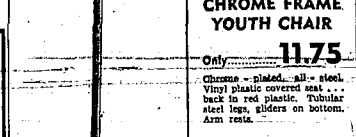

BURLEY, April 12—Orland Bates, Burley accountant, flared increased taxes as a menace to the Kiwanis club Wednesday at the National hotel.

He said that from his office alone, he has seen 100 tax returns totaling \$200,000,000, \$72,800,000 for social security and \$120,000,000 for state taxes. He said that on the unemployment tax alone \$40,000,000 is paid to the government.

He said the National Chamber of Commerce reports the 1949 average today stands at \$200,000,000, or \$5,000 per family in the United States, and that on this amount, we are paying interest at the rate of \$1,000,000,000.

Mr. Bates said that the government has \$72,000,000,000 unexpended money.

He said the current expense fund of \$5,000,000,000 is \$200,000,000 in 1950 and compared to the general fund of \$10,000,000,000 in 1950. He also compared the city assessment of \$1.10 per \$100 valuation in 1949 against \$1.20 per \$100 valuation in 1950 and \$1.30 per \$100 valuation in 1951.

He said that the increase in county school fund receipts in 1949 was \$1,200,000, compared to \$1,033,000 in 1950.

"There are the good potatoes going to the market," Mrs. De Marcus wanted to know. "Why send the culls to us?" Hillier said he was forwarding the letter to all Idaho spud shippers to advise them of consumer reaction created by ORE selling prices and the lowering of grading standards.

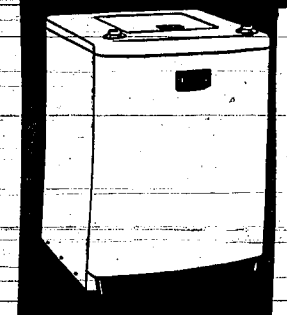
