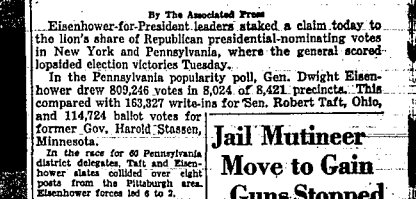

PUC Debates On Pleas for Import of Gas

BOISE, April 27 (AP)—The Idaho public utilities commission today took under advisement an application from Trans-Northwest Gas company, the asking permission to import natural gas into Idaho's seven northern-most counties.

During testimony presented at yesterday's hearing, W. L. Hawkins, representing Trans-Northwest, told public utility commissioners "that under the terms of the agreement now in effect, it would have to pay more for its gas later."

He told the commission plans are going forward to import gas from Alberta, Canada, into Washington. If Idaho can't be included in the general plan of construction now, the increased cost of laying new pipe lines later will increase gas costs.

Charles Horvath, Wallace, representing Northwest Natural Gas, Inc., asked the PUC to set any decision until after a scheduled hearing on the matter by Canadian authorities in June. He pointed out that since no export license had been granted by Canadian authorities, any action taken by the PUC now might be wasted.

Confident of Okay
Burl Hagadone, Coeur d'Alene, appearing on behalf of Trans-Northwest, said he was confident the Canadian government was going to grant the export license. He said that a recent order of the Supreme Court stalling the PUC had not followed normal procedure in a previous hearing in which Trans-Northwest had been granted the right to import gas into southern Idaho and had appealed the PUC decision to the supreme court. The court then ordered the rehearing.

WASHINGTON, April 23—The atomic energy commission has announced it is negotiating with two commercial firms to continue jointly-financed research aimed at bringing atomic power into industrial use.

The proposal was made by Dow Chemical company and Detroit Edison company—one of the largest industrial and power firms in the world.

The commission said its own work in this field—much of it already under way or scheduled—may run as high as \$750,000.

The study will involve both reactors and chemical separation processes but will not provide a final reactor design, the AEC said.

First With Program

The Dow-Edison group is the first to present its program. The AEC said it will give full consideration to other proposals as soon as the latter submit reports.

The three other groups are: Monsanto and Union Electric, St. Louis; Commonwealth Edison and Public Service of Northern Illinois, Chicago; and Pacific Gas and Electric and Bechtel corporation, San Francisco.

Levy Request Is Denied by Cassia Board

BURLEY, April 22—Following considerable discussion with the board of county commissioners by members of the Cassia and PTA representatives Friday, the county commissioners said that if further funds are needed for education the money will have to be raised through the two-mill county board of education levy rather than through any part of the five-mill emergency levy authorized by the legislature for county commissioners.

Although the legality of the county board levy was questioned in the district court here two years ago, the commissioners pointed out that because of the amendment to this particular law at the last session of legislature, there probably would be no legal question involved.

Salaries Revised

With the fund derived from the two-mill county board of education levy, Superintendent W. H. Wigley said Monday the school board will be able to appropriate enough funds for teachers and principals salaries to represent an increase of \$230 for the school year of 1952-1953.

Wigley reported, however, showing the valuation per average daily attendance in the various counties of Blaine, Valley, and Cassia is at the bottom of the list. He said Valuation per average daily attendance in Blaine county is \$7,290; Lincoln, \$6,653; Gooding, \$6,022; Twin Falls, \$4,656; Jerome, \$3,842; Minidoka, \$3,182 and Cassia is \$2,038.

Comparison of expenditures per child in average daily attendance in last year in the various counties showed Cassia county again at the bottom of the list. Expenditures per child in average daily attendance in Blaine county were \$226, Lincoln, \$222; Gooding, \$180; Twin Falls, \$172; Jerome, \$175; Minidoka, \$150, and Cassia, \$122.

The school board earlier this month asked the commissioners to grant the three-mill emergency levy to raise teachers salaries.

In the best possible conditions, he said, the most favorable period began on April 20 and will last through May, dropping somewhat through June and July. Poor reception is anticipated in August.

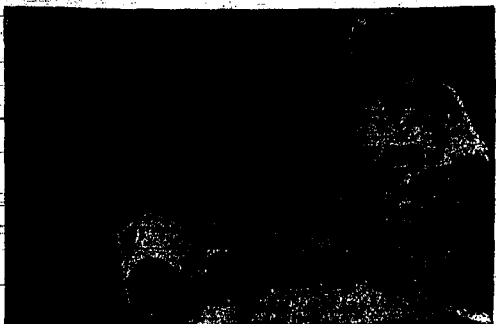

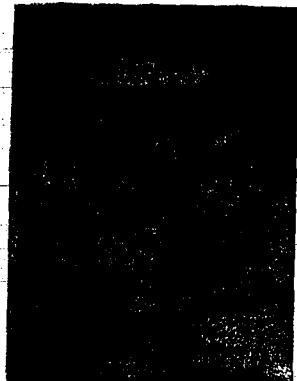

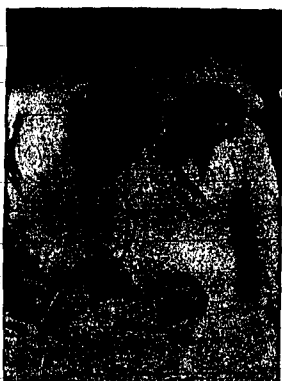
