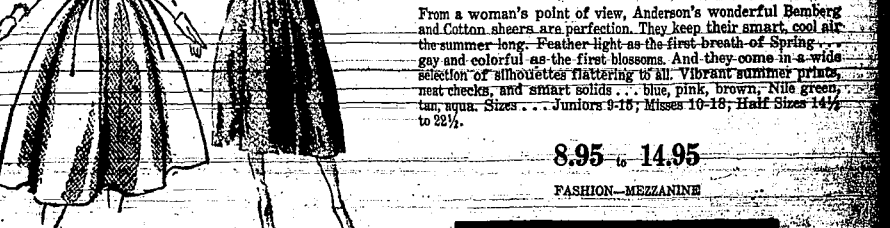

Expert Forecasts Low Number of Beet Leafhoppers for Southcentral Region

The above information on current beet leafhopper conditions in southern Idaho is derived from the following studies: (1) Beet leafhopper populations in the summer breeding areas during the fall of 1935; (2) survival of beet leafhoppers under winter conditions during the fall of 1935 and winter of 1935-36; (3) the survival of beet leafhoppers in the winter of 1935-36; (4) the survival of beet leafhoppers in the winter of 1935-36; (5) the survival of beet leafhoppers in the winter of 1935-36; (6) the survival of beet leafhoppers in the winter of 1935-36.

"September surveys in 1935 disclosed the largest overwintered acreage of Russian thistle since 1926 for southwestern Idaho and the second largest acreage of Russian thistle since 1940. Most of the Russian thistle acreage was west of the Snake River valley.

"Germination of winter annual mustards over most of southcentral Idaho occurred soon after the summer weed-host plants had dried, while in southcentral Idaho there was little germination during the fall of 1935. Fall-germinated plants made little growth during the cold winter.

Plants and mated soon in March resulting in additional germination of winter annuals and gave good germination of Russian thistle and, somewhat, the important summer hosts. Warm weather in April was favorable for the growth of the spring weed hosts, and at the present time they are in good condition in southwestern Idaho but sparse and small in southcentral Idaho.

"The fall and winter of 1935-36 at the Twin Falls station was 10.3 degrees Fahrenheit below normal temperature from Oct. 15 to March 31, with nearly normal precipitation. All of these months were below normal in temperature, which resulted in low leafhopper survival.

"For a more complete understanding of this statement on current beet leafhopper conditions in southern Idaho, the following general information is furnished regarding the habits of the insect during the course of the year covered by this and the statement to follow later:

"The best leafhopper is a fall-loving, dry-climate insect. In southern Idaho the beet leafhoppers pass the winter in the adult stage. Females are fertilized in the fall and live until spring, but males die during the winter.

"Egg-laying normally begins in March and adults of the first or spring generation appear in May or June. This generation is produced on spring weed hosts, chiefly mustards. Under favorable conditions

the seeds of these weeds germinate in the fall but occasionally additional germination occurs in the spring. The fall-germinated plants remain alive throughout the winter, and complete their growth the following spring. These weed hosts have become established on idle, waste, and overgrazed lands.

"They mature and dry about the time the spring-germination leafhopper reaches the adult, or winged, stage, and when weather conditions are favorable for flight, the leafhopper moves to their summer hosts. They travel with the wind and infect practically all of the host plants in their path. It is during this spring movement that the culture of the host plants is affected.

"The state department announced it was taking new steps to warn American citizens of the risks of travel in iron curtain countries. The department said that hereafter all American passports will be stamped as follows:

"This passport is not valid for travel to Albania, Bulgaria, China, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Poland, Rumania, or the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, unless specifically endorsed under authority of the department of state as being valid for such travel.

American travel previously had been banned to Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia and Hungary, where American citizens have been subjected to recent extraordinary risks by the communists.

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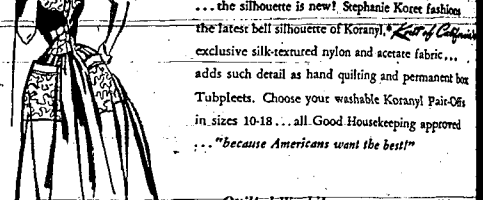
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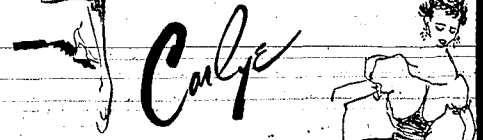

Rise Noted in Job Offerings. In Twin Falls

Employment opportunities in Twin Falls and throughout the state continued their upward trend in the week, R. B. Cutler, Twin Falls employment and security agency manager, reports. State Office of the agency had 1,200 job openings on file April 24. The figure is an increase of 125 over the number of openings on file the previous Saturday, Cutler said.

The increase was confined to the southern sections of the state. Few openings were reported on file in the panhandle and north central areas.

Farm Jobs Highest
Agriculture showed the greatest rise in number of job openings on file. Continuing clear, warm weather was responsible for an increase of 72 over the April 15 level to make a total of 400 agricultural openings on file Saturday.

Most non-agricultural industry groups also showed some gain. However, fewer openings were on file in mining, lumbering and trade.

Some of the higher levels, mostly roads and rail maintenance, continue to hamper logging activities. Some farmers in southeastern Idaho are still unable to work their fields because of water left by the rapidly melting snow.

Shortages Noted
Many areas of the state continue to report shortages of general farm hands, auto mechanics and domestic workers. Shortages in the south central area reported a total of 156 job openings on file April 26. Agricultural job openings climbed to 27 with all local offices called for general farm hands.

Gooding continues to need registered nurses, irrigators and farm hands. The Twin Falls office reports it can place almost anyone wishing work. Currently needed are farm hands, irrigators, laborers, welders, auto mechanics, dishwashers, waitresses, cooks, sales persons, stenographers, butchers and pressmen.

Ruppert reports a need for tractor operators and irrigators to work on the north side pumping plant.

Boyle Ponders on Outlook for Japan Now It Is Independent

By HAY BOYLE
TWIN FALLS, May 1 (AP) — So many of us here will be from the days when we fought for Japan, and we are now sleeping on the bones of Japanese. No Japanese soldier ever fired at me. I have always had a soft spot for the boys in a Pacific ditch who were shot a little brown man would creep up and aim his throat.

I invested it in comfort in the late summer of 1945. It was the most dry-footed amphibious landing ever made. I was with a bunch of Okinawa-trained marines and they were taking a landing in Tokyo bay. The Japanese already had waved the white flag, but here our positions were on the island. And somebody doled the island night to be secured against the possibility that the Japs might pull a trick and try to sink the U. S. Navy. So, "cutting" and "marking" the beach, the marines landed off toward the island. The first object that came in sight was a bare-toothed old Japanese woman

plowing the beach with a basket of clams. She heard the buzzing motors, turned—and there were the U. S. marines rushing across the waves straight toward her, guns loaded. The old woman put her basket of clams on her head and ran for dear life. I never will forget her amazing feat.

"This is Japan!" said the marine next to me as we waded ashore. I guess it was quite a letdown for a man who'd fought on Okinawa. Well, we went into Yokohama, Tokyo, looked down in awe from the towers of the battleship Missouri as Gen. Douglas MacArthur signed the surrender terms.

The Japanese were furious, frightened, or unaccountably polite then. They were sure what their conquerors might do. But on the third day we got star in a hotel in Tokyo, the room boys started bringing us

brussets, flowers. Just an old Japanese custom, but rather uninviting until you understand it. I went to Japan again in 1950 shortly after the outbreak of the Korean war. The Japanese were as polite as ever, but no longer frightened. They had learned how to deal with our occupation forces — patiently.

There had been considerable bribery-through-maintenance of Americans by highly placed Japanese. There had been considerable profiteering through-around-the-weight by a number of Americans, suddenly cutting higher on the hog than they ever had at home.

But, by and large, it must have been one of the highest-military occupations in history. The Japanese accepted it with such grace and dignity that their really wasn't much to make an hour over. They never lost their polite smile. A lot of friendships have been

made between Americans and Japanese over there in the last seven years. Some are solid, and will last a long time, because it is easier for different human beings to understand each other than differing nations.

But Japan will seem strange now to one who never knew her before the last war. The subtle change of power will be there. The little slant is free, loose in a wide world again, for better or for worse.

All that will be the same, will be the same, in Japan that never changes.

I suppose one of the first things we'll have to do is go back to calling Emperor Hirohito by his proper title: "The Emperor." Occupation troops always cheerfully referred to him as "Charley."

Somewhat "Charley" had a friendly sound. I hope the echo lasts.
