## Top Court Blocks Boost in Steelworkers' Wages; First Peace Parley Fails

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—The supreme court today blocked President Truman's plan to give 650,000 steelworkers a pay raise of 10 percent, and an administration drive to end the great dispute by an industry-union agreement failed for the time being.

The President, administering industry and union leaders to the cabinet room of the White House in the morning, warned that he would raise wages Monday unless an agreement was reached "now."

But the supreme court quickly stepped in, issuing an order freezing wages and working conditions until it could hear arguments on the great issue—whether Truman exceeded his powers in raising the steel industry's wages.

The steelworkers' union, which has been on strike since last August, is demanding a 10 percent raise and for nearly four hours tonight. President Truman's plan to raise wages was blocked by the supreme court.

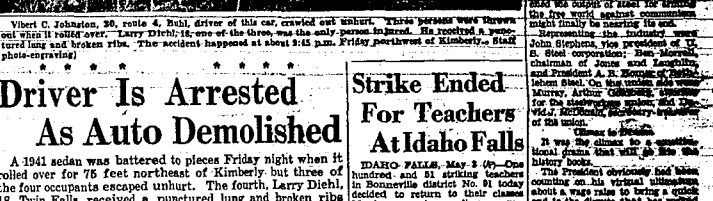

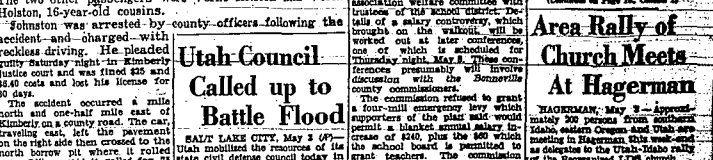

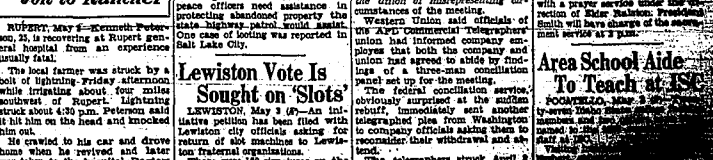

### Burley OK's Assessments For District

BURLEY, May 3—No protests were voiced at a Tuesday meeting on the assessment roll for the Burley improvement district number three and an ordinance confirming the roll was approved.

### British Plane Ushers in Age Of Jet Travel

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, May 3.—The British jetliner Comet streaked over the middle of the world with a speed to a new ush-er-ing landing in Johannesburg today.

The 474-mile flight brought South Africa less than 24 hours from London and ushered in the jet age of commercial air travel.

Thousands of spectators lined the Palmietfontein airfield to see the Douglas DC-3 Havilland craft, which whizzed away from the misty spring weather of London Friday at 2 p.m. Eastern time (7 a.m. MST) and whizzed down in the South African sunburn here at 1:33 p.m. (6:33 a.m. MST).

The official landing time was clocked five minutes later, when checks were filed beneath the Comet's wheels, still two minutes ahead of the scheduled landing time of 1:40 p.m.

Elapsed time for the flight—from London to Johannesburg, via Cape Town, Lebanon, Khartoum, Sudan, Addis Ababa, Uganda, and Livingstonia, Rhodesia—was 23 hours, 56 minutes. That's about two-thirds of the time consumed by regular commercial flights on the London to Johannesburg route.

The British Overseas Airways corporation, the operators, said the flying time was 17 hours 10 minutes, "if you don't try to break records."

A DOD spokesman said they try to fly on schedule.

Jesus was not a religious preacher on fact, not fancy. He never showed himself to be "glorified" by groups of Jews.

When Christ had his long hidden trial and long hidden death, he was not glorified by a group of Jews, but by the people of the world.

When Christ made his first visit to the temple in Jerusalem, he found himself dressed in priestly robes and honored by the people defiling the robes of prayer, such spiritual desolation.

### Court Blocks Pay Hike for Steelworkers

By a few close days' work, the steelworkers in their marble court a mile away from the White House.

Here, in brief, are the details of this momentous day:

1. Truman calls leaders of the industry and union to the White House at 9 a. m. "I sent you for action," he said, "and gentlemen, I want it." A strict settlement was reached, and it would raise wages in the industry on Monday morning or as soon as we can get ready. Then he told the two parties to bargain—and walked out.

2. The supreme court was meeting, meanwhile, to hear pleas from the administration and the industry that it quickly decide the great issue—whether Truman's seizure of the steel industry was constitutional. ### Pruett Traces Star Patterns During Month

A fine combination of the brightest of the planets, Venus and Jupiter, will appear only one-third degree apart Monday morning. However, as they will rise only about half an hour before the sun, they will not be seen easily by the unaided eye unless the air near the horizon is unusually clear.

Telescopes and field glasses will spot them easily and follow them after a trial. They will rise about 15 degrees north of east. Mercury, now like a bright star, will rise almost 90 degrees around 12 minutes before the other two.

For the other prominent celestial objects, observe around 8:30 p. m. The moon, now increasing toward the full phase, is well up in the south Sunday evening. If you are favored with clear skies, note the position among the stars Sunday night, then notice how much it moves eastward from night to night.

Tuesday evening it will be very close to the yellow planet Saturn; Wednesday, near the bright star Spica; and on Thursday, a little below the red planet Mars.

This well-known red dipper of stars is nearly overhead six months ago at this same hour. It was low above the northern horizon. This change is due to the earth's annual revolution around the sun.

**Orange Star Prominent**  
Very high in the east southeast, a bright star, orange Arcturus, is prominent. Tracking the left from the star, viewers will find five fainter stars. With Arcturus they trace the form of a red cross almost like the kite, the cross almost lying on its side. It is a large figure and all of it soon will be above the sky line, with Deneb at the left end. A line of three stars, all about equally bright, forms the cross arm, now in a vertical position.

**Regulus Overhead**  
Only a few degrees from the zenith—and toward the southwest—is the bright Regulus, the brilliant star in the sickle and at the end of its handle. The curved line of fainter stars forming the sickle extends northward from Regulus.

High in the west, Castor and Pollux, the psychological twins, stand side by side. Pollux is the left star of the pair and more orange than his brother. Lower and farther south, Procyon is seen. High in the

### Dry Land Farmers Sink Wells To Water Fields in New Area

**AMERICAN FALLS, May 3**—Dry land farmers in Pleasant Valley west of the Snake river from American Falls believe they are entering a new era in farm irrigation.

Albert Burgmeister, Pleasant Valley farmer, said a deep well on his farm is being drilled. This is the last of four wells to be completed in the area for irrigation.

"The deepest well, 340 feet," is located on Fred Tiede's farm. William Funk reports a 220-foot well and the one belonging to John Reed 214 water at 195 feet.

Burgmeister said drillers have reached a depth of 125 feet and he expects to find water flow in a few days using a smaller water flow than that anticipated from the new wells. Burgmeister said he has been experimenting for two years with a small sprinkler system on alfalfa pasture. Finding it satisfactory, he decided to install a larger system. Nearby farmers, noting the results of his experiment, believe in the future of such systems in Pleasant Valley. There is no ditch irrigation in the valley.

The wells have required little or no casing since they have been sunk in almost solid lava rock.
