IN A RUT IN KOREA

Nine months ago United Nations negotiators set down with communist spokesmen to begin truce talks in the Korean war. Probably no such talks have ever taken so long, or proved so unproductive.

Our negotiators indicate appear to have been talking in the hope that unproductive talks are better than no talks at all. Whether this is really so is a question—and our companions in the U. N. ought now to examine the fact.

Realistically we have to accept the fact that we are in a potentially dangerous position. We cannot calmly assume that stalemate negotiations are to our advantage, any more than stalemated military operations are necessarily good for us.

It would be pretty foolhardy at this stage to predict glibly that a settlement is in early prospect. It is impossible to say that a settlement is to be achieved, then what have we gained by this painful process of talking with the Reds?

They have reduced the fighting to a minimum and thus cut casualties sharply. Yet that very gain carries within it the seeds of danger.

For during this conversation the communists have been busy with a very intensive air war. They have improved their anti-aircraft emplacements, augmented their regular artillery and constructed defenses in depth. In other words, they have gone far toward making it impossible for us to get any closer to them before the U. N.'s successful smashes in the spring of 1951.

Naturally we have not been idle in the field either. But it was the U. N. force that held the edge when truce talks began, and there is no longer any assurance we still would have it. Very likely the fine fighting trim we were in at that time is a thing of the past.

The Reds needed to negotiate when the talks began. Today they continue them because the maneuver keeps us in the hole. We can see no great advantage in talking—yet the alternative of resuming full war seems worse, especially under the altered circumstances of combat.

Possibly the current course of continuing apparently fruitless talks is still the wisest. But it is so, we ought to realize it is not a matter of continuing to talk, but of continuing to talk after exhaustive top-level review of the whole Korean problem.

As it stands now, we simply are drifting along in a negative style, provoking, from day to day. We need a strategy that suggests more than that we are just in a rut and trying to make the best of it.

Too much is at stake in Korea to allow the Reds to be playing a waiting game in the field, however competent they may be. If the Korean war was worth fighting, it is worth the attention of our top men today, so that we may determine anew where we should try to go.

HERE'S A NEW IDEA

A new "lease-purchase" plan for construction of government buildings is being urged on congress by Jess Larson, head of general services administration, the government's homekeeping agency.

The big idea is to let private industry put up buildings for the government, but the government would pay rent, but the rent payments would be applied to the purchase of the buildings. In other words, a private citizen buys his own home on the installment plan.

Under some circumstances, Larson figures that the government's payment on a new building would be less than it now pays in rent. Also, the government would save in that it would not have to make any big capital investment.

Buildings would be built to government specifications. Investors would have guaranteed tenants and proposed deals would yield about 3 per cent return on investment during lease-purchase periods of up to 25 years.

There are now about \$2,500,000,000 worth of government buildings authorized, but only about \$500,000,000 has been appropriated so far.

Though the government has a backlog of work construction of government buildings in the depression, for the past 14 years the freeze has been on due-to-war-and-defense requirements.

The new lease-purchase plan is offered in an effort to get new federal buildings in places like Denver and Tacoma, which have structures put up back in the 1880's.

DIPLOMATIC—General Eisenhower's spokesmen, including Senators Lodge, Duff and Carlson, met this morning to discuss the nomination of a Republican candidate, with a soft, diplomatic answer.

Safety Expert Says Maryland Pays More Taxes for Crashes

BAITIMORE, May 5—Highway accidents added \$12.5 million to the viable tax bill of the average Maryland family of four in 1931, the Maryland State Safety conference was told here by Paul H. Blaisdell, public safety director of the Association of Casualty and Surety companies.

Blaisdell said that the individual driver or citizen seldom thinks of the economic cost of traffic accidents as a drain on his own purse rather as a statistic that apply to the man "at the other end of the street." Blaisdell said: "At present-day values, the loss from traffic accidents in the state of Maryland for the year 1931 was \$1,775,000. We can give this information to the press and have it featured on the front page. With most people it will not be a grant of surprise.

"Suppose it could be done this way—that if the state of Maryland, on the first day of each May, sent out a supplemental tax bill to cover the cost of traffic accidents for the preceding year. The bill would have gone out today.

"For every man, woman and child in Maryland an additional tax of \$22.95. For a family of four, another tax bill of \$89.36. Everyone would have to pay—the rich, the poor, the great, the small. Now traffic accidents have 'come home' to the individual, regardless of whether or not he or his loved ones have been involved."

To those who might object that "there is no such tax bill," Blaisdell had this to add: "Ladies and gentlemen, you've already paid it—in wage loss, medical expense, hospital expense, overhead cost of insurance and property damage due to traffic

accidents. And when we put the cost stamp on the motor, we have not allowed one penny for the incalculable suffering of those who were injured, those who died or those who were left to grieve."

Blaisdell told the safety conference delegates that although the normal tendency in dealing with matters "deleterious" to the public good is to act boldly and decisively "in problems relating to the proper use of our highways we are often less 'too tolerant' and much too forgiving."

He said these qualities are displayed by the jury which refuses to convict on clear evidence of driving while under the influence of liquor, and "in the calm with which we overlook violations of traffic laws while we would not condone petty larceny."

Whatever has been accomplished in highway safety, he declared, is the result of specific action. "If we still need injections of more action," he added, "it must follow that the law must be enforced."

His measure, "intended to obviate the potato situation, is expected to draw support from other sides that produce the wide range of products covered by it. Crowsen of engaged onions, peaches, strawberries, etc. are backing his proposal, Budge said today.

The Idahoan expects to testify in a few days before the house banking and currency committee on his bill. If this group fails to adopt it, he says he then will seek to amend the legislation on the house floor. Although this is a difficult maneuver, Budge says that "we might just be able to do it."

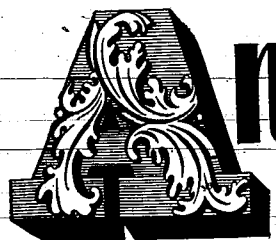
