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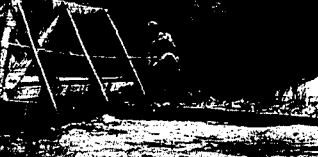

**Hospital Day Program Is Arranged for 30 Students Planning Medicine Study**

A special hospital-day program for 30 area students who plan to enter the medical fields was given Monday by the hospital guild at Magic Valley Memorial hospital.

The program centered around informative talks designed to give the senior students an outline of the opportunities in the medical fields. Speakers were Mrs. Ed Navin, medical floor supervisor at Magic Valley Memorial hospital; Dr. Wallace Bond, chief of staff, and Dr. Malcolm Sawyer.

Nurses Needed

Dr. Bond stressed the need for nurses, pointing out that modern surgery has increased the need greatly. He told the students a nurse is given respect above all callings.

Later in the program Dr. Bond reported that a plan is being developed at the state level for cooperation between states with advanced medical schools and those without. He said the plan recognizes that sparsely settled states such as Idaho, Nevada, New Mexico and Wyoming, cannot afford special schools of medicine, dentistry or veterinary.

Under the plan, the states which have them would reserve a certain number of places each year for students from the other states.

New Plan Prepared

When all details are worked out, the plan will be presented to the people and legislatures of the various states. The plan is an outgrowth of the conferences of western governors, he said.

Dr. Bond also urged the students to obtain a well-merited education in their community as well as skilled in their profession.

Dr. Sawyer emphasized the preparation needed in the medical fields. After three to four years of pre-medical schooling, another four years of medical study follow, he told them.

"Since Idaho has no medical school it is necessary for the pre-medical student to obtain entrance to a pre-medicine school or one of the few remaining state schools that accept out-of-state students," he pointed out.

Internship Required

At least one year of internship is required before the graduate can begin general practice and then, if he wants to specialize, another three to four years of training are necessary, according to Dr. Sawyer.

Dr. Sawyer also discussed "hospital specialties" such as pathology and radiology and the field of industrial medicine.

Mrs. Navin spoke of the advantages of present-day nursing and briefly outlined the requirements for training.

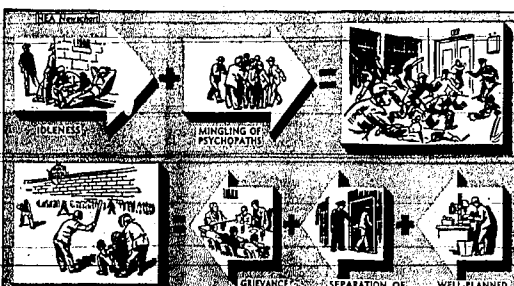
After his graduation, he continued his newspaper career here, later moving to Washington about 15 years ago. He has been associate editor of the Washington Post for many years.

**HONOLULU, May 6** (UP)—Two adventure-hungry girls who traveled 6,000 miles to Guam, as stowaways in a sleek B-29 Superfortress, are being flown to California—and an accounting at the end of their air voyage.

The girls, Jerie McDaniel, 26, Walnut Grove, Calif., and Maxine Alice, 29, "Tacoma," Wash., arrived at Hickam field Monday morning in an air force plane and left later in the day for Travis airbase, Calif. Aided by Men.

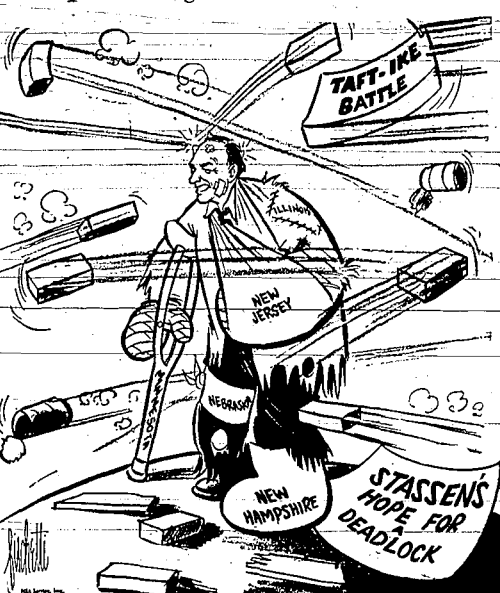

### Top Court to Rule on U. S. Power Fight

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP)—The supreme court has agreed to decide whether the federal government or private industry should build a power plant in North Carolina. The case may resolve one phase of the public-private power controversy.

In other actions in a high court opinion day the high tribunal:

1. Agreed to the Wrenner v. Federal Post Inspector case—plaintiff where food is being prepared for shipment across state lines.
2. Allowed to stand without review a decision by the Kentucky court of appeals that the Kentucky State Democrat and the Paducah Central Labor union must pay \$10,000 damages because of publication of an advertisement calling an employer unfair.

The power plant controversy involves Secretary of Interior Charles Johnston. He had appealed a decision by the U. S. circuit court in Richmond that court support a federal power commission license issued to the Virginia Electric and Power company, a private corporation, for building a hydro-electric development on the Roanoke river in North Carolina.

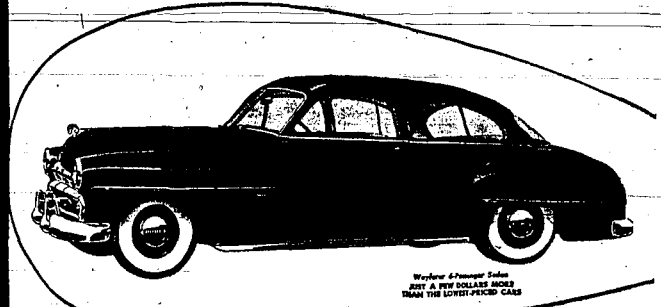

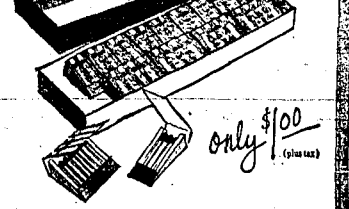

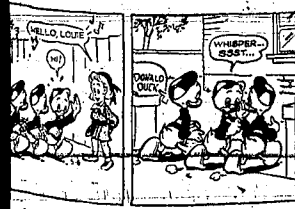

### U. N. Planes Smash North Korea Lines

SEOUL, Korea, May 6 (AP)—Hundreds of silver planes bombed North Korea, a North Korean rail junction, a concentrated, day-long saturation attack today.

"There'll really be a major revision of red rail schedules tonight," a fifth air force spokesman said.

The full strength of four fighter-bomber wings joined in the attack. Saboteurs guarded the area while the fighter-bombers roared on repeated attacks on the vital railway link, 25 miles north of the North Korean capital, Posenyang.

The concentrated attack on heavy-duty rail schedules preceded by round-the-clock raids on the major communist railroad linking Hanchun with the Manchurian border.

From Hanchun the rail lines fork to supply either end of the 155-mile front.

Fighter-bomber concentrated Monday on the main line of track between Kunu and Hanchun. Flies reported they tore up rails in 20 spots. Kunu is a junction point 20 miles north of Hanchun. Hanchun is 60 air miles south of the Manchurian border.

Monday night a formation of Superforts, in Gwinn, using electronic bombing techniques, rained down on high explosives on a rail bridge at Hanchun.
