Red PWs Holding American General As Camp Hostage

SEOUL, Korea, (Friday) May 9 (UPI)—Rebellious communists held inside the Kojido prison camp where an American general is being held as a hostage, the army announced today. The commander of the camp where 30 persons including a killed in action pilot, was grabbed by the communists and taken to the compound gate with another officer. His companion was killed.

The army said notes were received in Dodd's handwriting which indicated he was not harmed. The communists ignored demands for his release.

The general, Gen. James A. Van Fleet, was captured by the communists after the army had been informed of his capture. The general was taken to the camp where he was held as a hostage.

Allied Planes Make Biggest Raid in Korea

SEOUL, Korea, May 8 (UPI)—Allied planes in the biggest single attack of the Korean war today annihilated two square miles in the ancient walled town of Gwan, a major communist supply and communications center in the North Korean capital at Pyongyang.

Four flights of fifth air force and marine fighter-bombers struck at dawn with 12,000 gallons of flaming napalm. Other planes swooped across the blazing target area, firing and dropping thousands of tons of bombs.

Blazing shambles followed the attack. The town was reduced to a mass of rubble. The attack was the largest since the war began in July 1950.

Truce Parley N Blocks

SEOUL, Korea, May 8 (UPI)—Communist agents rejected a truce parley in the hills of Korea today by refusing to discuss the terms of a proposed armistice.

The parley was held in a mountainous area near the border between North and South Korea. The communist side refused to discuss the terms of a proposed armistice, which included a 400-mile-wide buffer zone and a 400-mile-wide demilitarized zone.

BOZEMAN, May 8 (UPI)—Highway 101, which was closed for several weeks because of a landslide, is now open for traffic between Bozeman and Helena, Mont.

Buildings Wrecked, Debris Scattered by Wind Storms

Giant whirlwinds accompanying thunderstorms which swept through most of Magic Valley Wednesday afternoon left a trail of debris unbroken in recent years. Barn-roofs were lifted high in the air and scattered piecemeal over wide areas, at least one house was raised off its foundation. Other buildings were wrecked.

Most heavily hit areas were in the east section of Twin Falls and the area around Murtaugh.

Region Buses Are Halted in Driver Strike

SEATTLE, May 8 (UPI)—Operations of Greyhound lines into the Pacific Northwest were tied up today by a strike of Pacific Northwest bus drivers and mechanics who walked off their jobs in a job dispute.

The latest walkout added three more states—Washington, Idaho and Montana—to the seven already affected by a strike of Pacific Northwest bus employees and raised the number of bus company workers on strike in the Pacific coast region to nearly 6,000.

BOZEMAN, May 8 (UPI)—One Magic Valley school district was denied a bond for a new high school, and another was approved by the Idaho State board of education here yesterday.

The board rejected a \$120,000 bond issue for the Blue school district for a new high school. The board explained the denial was because of the district's financial condition and the fact that the district had not met the requirements for a bond issue.

Hope Noted in Wire Walkout

WASHINGTON, May 8 (UPI)—A faint ray of hope shined today for the government-sponsored negotiations to end the 35-day-old telegraph strike.

Informal sources said the Western Union Telegraph company and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers are still in pole position. But the union has agreed to a 10% wage increase and a 40-hour work week.

No 'Educational Surveys' in T. F. Checks Disclose

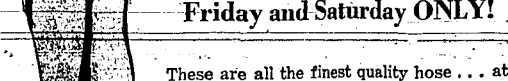

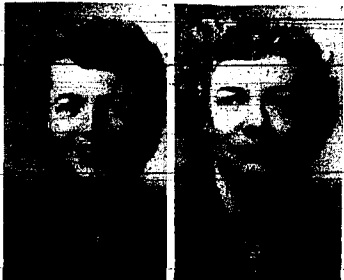
Annual Report Issued on '51 Cotton Crop

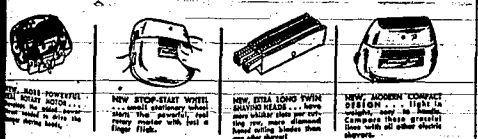

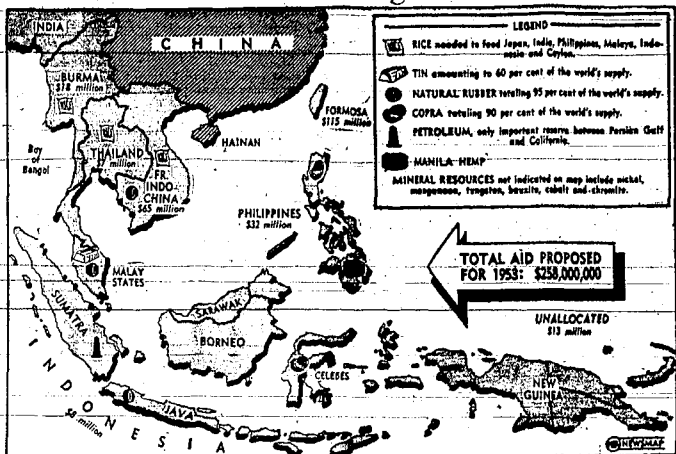

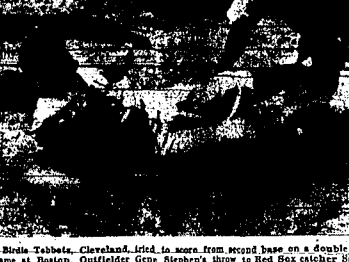

Many Tests Already Finished In Preparation for Palisades

BOISE, May 8.—Construction of the Palisades dam, the most economical structure possible at the Palisades dam site, has been aided by exhaustive tests and examinations in the bureau of reclamation central laboratories at Denver, Colo., the regional office reported today.

—Very detail of the huge earth-fill structure, integral of its type ever designed by the bureau—has been subject to intensive study by bureau laboratory design engineers—Hiers and technicians.

To verify design features and to make certain the site selected is fitted for the structure, the laboratory tests on earth and rock samples, experimented with scale models of the outlet works, sliding gate, together with reduced excavation and test concrete.

The difference in elevation between the level of outlet works at Palisades is to be some 200 feet. This head exceeds by some 100 feet that at any other bureau structure using a sliding-gate outlet.

—Early in the design several complex questions to the design engineers, such calling for a definite answer to answer these questions the design engineers called on the bureau's hydraulic laboratory.

—Early in the design scale models revealed that if water could be made to pass smoothly across the sliding-gate guide, cavitation would be greatly reduced.

—The model tests showed that cavitation was reduced enough so that no longer remained an obstacle to using sliding gate.

—Hydraulic laboratory engineers also discovered that the width of the outlet could be decreased to less than one foot, thus eliminating a large amount of space, enough so that the outlet would not be a serious threat.

—Present Palisades design now trail for the incorporation of eight 7½-foot sliding gates, among the largest in bureau design history, into the outlet system's valves.

—Although Palisades dam will be an earth-fill structure, more than 100,000 cubic yards of concrete will be used, most of it in the spillway and tunnel lining. Two-thirds of the total amount will line three tunnels, 20 feet in diameter. From one of these, later, will branch four power conduits, each 10 feet in diameter.

—The 114,000 kilowatt Palisades power plant.

—Twenty-one tons of sand and gravel were shipped from the vicinity of the dam site to the bureau's central laboratories to determine the material's suitability for the concrete.

—The satisfactory concrete aggregate in sand laboratory studies conducted by the manufacturer and Idaho State University.

Some 35 miles southeast of Pyongyang, the North Korean capital, Sean had been building up supplies and war goods trucks and tanks for more than a month.

The latest evaluation of air maps determined the rich plain was ready for picking. Four wings of flying Saucers, Thunderbolts and Mustangs were given the job of attacking the two-square-mile area.

By mid-afternoon Sean was hit as target to find Communist supplies and equipment were in flames and the machines on the sides of surrounding mountains.

Just before dawn, Col. Lee Chase had led his ace fighter-bomber group of P-80 pilots to drop high explosives on anti-aircraft installations razing the vital supply area.

Back again over Sean, Chase threw our two-crew jet into a vertical bank. I had a full view picture.

Over the wings tips of the jet flashed the ancient, peacock city walls of Sean, the distant view of the balloons rising in the Panmunjom truce site. Now you could see the devastation below.

Skimming through the pill-village ground fire were the "Flying Tigers," headed by Maj. Jack E. Wilson, Benton City, Wash. They were among a group of P-80's carrying main bombs.

Behold Wilson's group came the "black panthers," led by Maj. James F. Crutchfield, Motta Lake, Wash. followed in turn by the "head hunters," led by Maj. Arthur B. Faunce, Fairbury, N. D.

Hugging the ground in Indian file, they streaked toward the target. Brilliant flashes of mushrooming fire blossomed on buildings, trucks and supply piles.

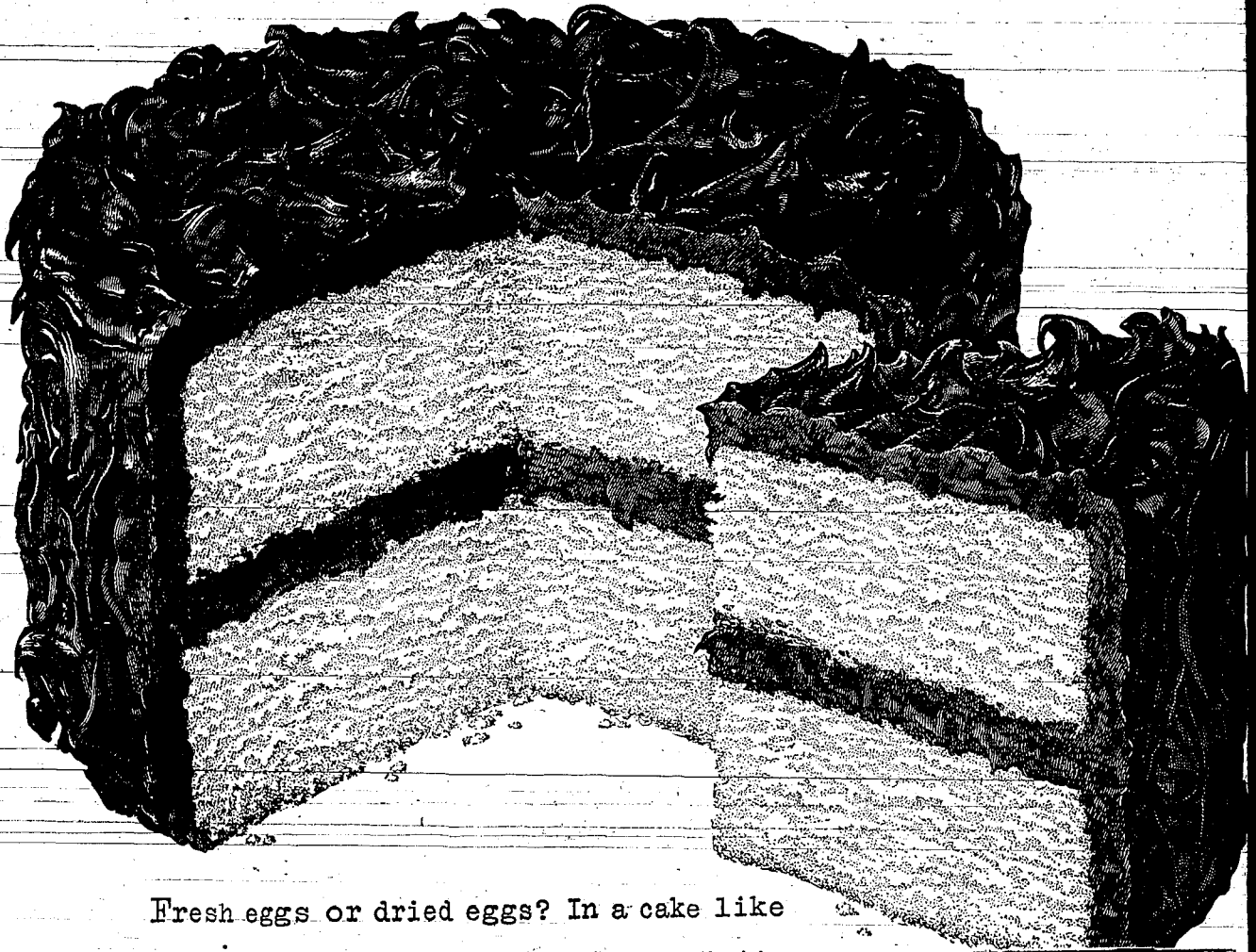

Test Slated on Bees' Help in Alfalfa Fields

MOSCOW, May 8 (AP)—The University of Idaho agricultural experiment station is going to try to find out whether honeybees help southern Idaho alfalfa seed industry.

It's generally agreed that they are dependable pollinizers for the small clovers and red clover, but there's a difference of opinion as to their effectiveness in alfalfa, said Richard W. Barr, entomologist.

In some parts of the west they are the principal pollinizers, while in others wild bees do the work.

Dr. W. F. Barr, assistant entomologist, will be in charge of an experiment in which colonies of honeybees will be brought to selected fields.

The bees will be under constant observation, and some will be dyed so their migrations and flower preferences can be checked. Traps will be installed on the colonies to pollen brought back by the bees can be identified.
