Top Court Takes Seizure Case Under Adversement; Murray Bisters Industry

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—The supreme court took under advisement today the historic question of the legality of President Truman's seizure of the steel industry.

Because the far-reaching issue involved, it appeared likely that it would be some time before the tribunal hands down its decision. The ruling might not come for some weeks.

The court took the case under advisement after hearing seven hours of oral arguments by attorneys for the government, the steel industry, the CIO Steel Workers union and three railroad brotherhoods.

At issue is the extent of the President's constitutional authority. No Specific Authority Acting Attorney-General Philip B. Perlman in final arguments for the government, told the high court the seizure was permitted by constitutional and statutory authority.

Perlman, again questioned sharply by the justices, considered the constitutionality of the seizure under other legal procedures if they were forced by the seizure, he said, to do so.

Claimed Neutral John H. Wrenzel, former Democratic presidential nominee, argued for the industry that Mr. Truman's seizure was illegal and unconstitutional. He called the seizure a "violation of the constitution."

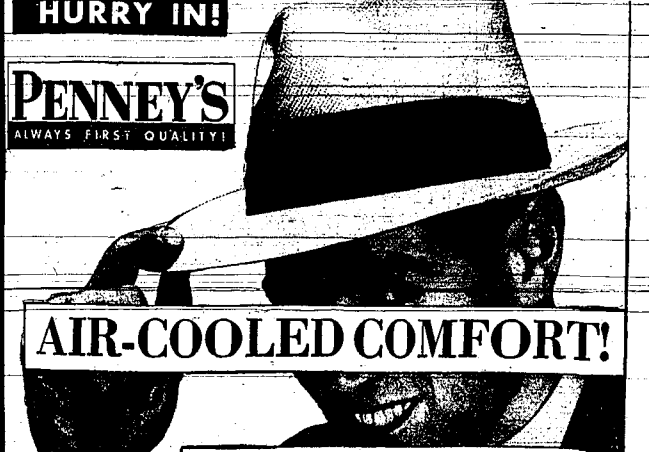

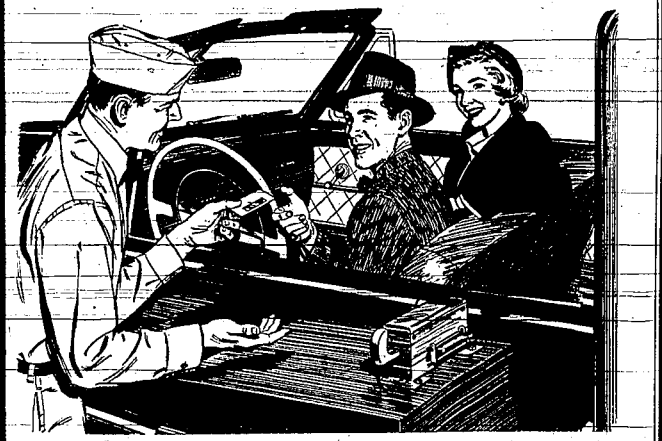

More than ever before in our history, young men and women are going to college. Few high school students have any other idea. There are several reasons for this, and some do not apply to every child. One of the reasons is that the candidates for college education: Many employers insist on a college education for their employees who will be in the administrative offices. All young people who want to engage in some form of writing are advised by their school guidance teachers to go to college. There are strong suggestions that young men who show promise of usefulness by gaining high marks in college will be exempt from the draft, or will easily obtain officer commissions.

There is in the matter of social pressure. Graduation from a college adds to the claim of being a somebody.

The young person graduating from high school needs to think over his reasons for going to college and assure himself that he has the wish, backed by the ability to apply himself to his purpose. First, what about the ability?—A wish and a dream will not carry a student through college. Unless the wish is rooted in strength of ability it will add the student's time, give him a burden of failure and leave him in a worse state than at the beginning.

One boy stated that he intended to go to college and enter the diplomatic service. His school record was excellent. He was asked for his career, quote the contrary.

but he insisted, and was admitted only to be out at the end of the first semester.

College is a place for serious study, not for triflers. The student who manages to enter but who has no serious purpose will leave at the end of the first semester, or will be expelled, even if he manages to be graduated a social blank. The purpose of a college education is to fit the student for earnest work, for self-education to wisdom and his community, his time, his country.

Those of ability, of purpose to those that admit about going to college because their country needs them in every department of life. Those who have not the kind of ability study demands should know that all education is not found in college, nor in books. It is lived usefully, with open eyes and ears, open mind and hands. It is the wonderful fields of education for those who seek them. Many a highly successful man and woman have proved this to be so.

Boys and girls—should consider all these reasons. Their purpose in going to college and the guidance teachers should help them examine their equipment for their chosen course lest they waste what ability they possess.

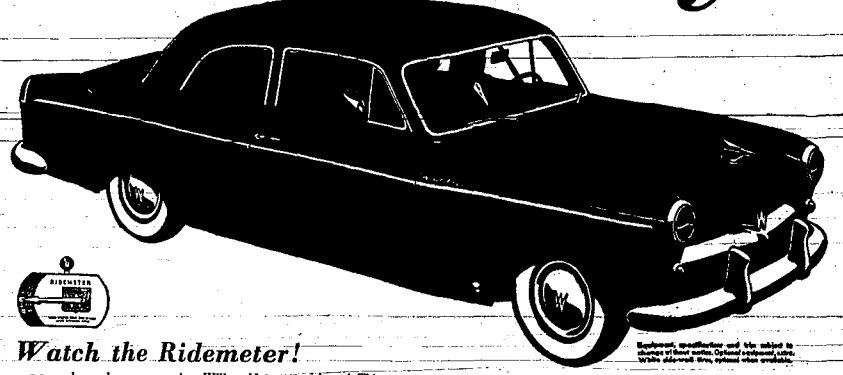

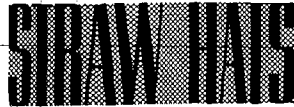
