Sawyer Asks Congress for Airport Cash

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer asked Congress Saturday for authority to make federal grants during the year beginning July 1 for work on 140 airport projects to cost about \$2,500,000.

The federal government will provide approximately half the cost of each and local sponsors the rest.

Early Start Urged

Sawyer said in a letter to Congress the projects should be undertaken in the coming year, or in the year beginning July 1, 1964, if not possible earlier.

The projects proposed by the civil aeronautics administration include:

Idaho Falls municipal—\$163,575, acquire land, extend runway and taxiway, extend runway lighting.

Coeur d'Alene state—\$1,200,000, 800, strengthen runways by reurfacing.

Nevada

Reno—Municipal airport, \$50,000, acquisition of land and paving of one runway.

Las Vegas—McCarran field, \$25,000, stage construction of terminal building.

Bend—City airport, \$237,765, acquisition of land.

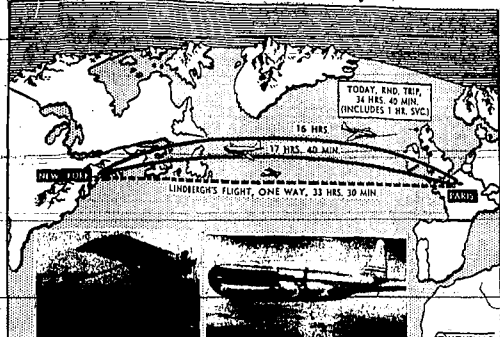

Mrs. Hayes Says Fate of Nation Will Depend on Citizenship of Youngsters

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 13.—The fate of the United States will depend on the "quality of citizenship" that is instilled in the minds and hearts of its children in this period of cold wars, mobilized defense, economic depression, emotional tension and political dissension, Mrs. John P. Hayes, Twin Falls, Ida., president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, said here today.

Mrs. Hayes denounced the 49th annual convention of the parent-teacher organization, which she represented, in her presidential address to the Citizens' Council of "His Future," at the opening general assembly.

She announced that the National Congress has expanded its program on citizenship because "we believe the qualities of character and citizenship generated in a good home carry over into school, where the good school can further extend them to the citizen in the community."

"The world is in process of change here and elsewhere and we will depend on the children which we work to preserve our heritage of individual freedom and democracy in our children," she said, "and we will depend on the children to carry on the principles of individual justice, integrity and brotherhood."

She said that "for the future of our children, peace will be paramount," and that "we will insist that peace among nations is possible if the people care enough to mobilize for peace as ardently as we mobilize for war."

She prefaced a statement that parent-teacher organizations now are "about to cancel a convention" with the conjecture that the slender but untangling thread of love for a child can be used to weave a world of peace, so strong that it can contain the elements of lasting peace for all the world.

While said the National Congress of Parents and Teachers has been working for nearly a year on plans for an international conference of representatives of parent-teacher organizations—in Chicago, under joint sponsorship of the Canadian Home and School and Parent-Teacher Federation.

"Such a conference," she said, "may be the means of drawing together many nations and people in a new International Association of Parents and Teachers to replace the International Federation of Home and School, which discontinued with the last World War."

She said work for the emotional stability to today's children, without forgetting that parents and teachers need to sustain their own morale before they can give children their best. "It is a part of the parent-teacher program—for civility, defense, which includes also knowing how to protect our families and neighborhood in case of attack."

Mrs. Hayes summarized in what she called a brief statement, the "basic truths of parent-teacher organization philosophy" as follows:

"1. That society is improvable through improvement of the individual and through intelligent group action.

"2. That every normal child born has the potentialities for useful, constructive citizenship.

"3. That the home and family are the essential core of democratic living and the foundation for individual freedom, strength and moral integrity.

"4. That education adequate for the time must be provided for all of the children of all the people."

"5. That education is a partnership shared by home, school and community."

"6. That what is right and desirable for the most privileged child is right and desirable for all children."

Mrs. Hayes touched on situations and conditions in which, she said, citizens need to share responsibility. One of these she described as "the tragic lack of integrity recently revealed in competitive athletics and in professional and business hours."

"The public that demands a winning team," Mrs. Hayes added, "needs to compare the value of a program of sound physical education for every child in school with the value of competitive athletics for the few."

"The average citizen needs also to realize that healthy personalities are developed only in a healthy society and that success in school depends on a child's total environment. If a generation ago learned more of the value of the nation and the world as he lived in an environment undisturbed by the impact of mass media, thirty years ago our boys and girls depended on school and home for their education. Today, motion pictures, comic books, radio, and television content dramatically for his attention. The fantastic curiosity of screen celebrities and headline emphasis on crime and criminal actions consume a great share of the normal curiosity before he has opportunity to study the deeds of statesmen, men and historians."

"The competition of modern mass media would have overwhelmed the school of two generations ago. The modern school offers some competition for these untuned teachers."

"If the youth of today finds in his school education the least experience necessary for tasks of citizenship, it will be because parents and teachers can convert the power of mass media to constructive educational ends to a greater degree than we have thus far achieved."

Mrs. Hayes said highly specialized, specialized education is essential for most youth and that citizens must realize that "an adequate education in a healthy society for the 6-year-old of today is the strongest objective we can build for our country in 1964."

She dedicated the convention to "the task of finding specific ways" in which PTA members can:

"1. Find prevailing trends in the world to discover what is basic for preservation of individual freedom, justice, law and order as expressed in the bill of rights.

"2. Examine prevailing situations in homes, schools and communities

that influence well-being of children and youth—and help in order their prospects for future success:

"3. Develop plans of action to improve and enrich home and family living, enhance the quality of public school education and strengthen its support; and to exert our influence in the community to strengthen those institutions, agencies and standards of conduct that may contribute to the citizenship of our youth and eliminate unfavorable elements in community environment."

Mrs. Hayes said it has been the objective of the PTA to help devise a pattern of community conduct to enhance opportunities of youth for "realize growth of able, fruitful and satisfactory citizenship."

Group Urges Revision for Airport Plan

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Airports should be oblong rather than square, and have single or parallel runways instead of the space-consuming crossed runways now so prevalent, says the President's airport commission.

The commission, in a report to President Truman, said the single runway principle can be applied to new airports and existing airports by rectangular areas.

It said the results would be simplified traffic control, economy of navigational aids, more effective use of radar, less airport acreage, room for expansion, protected runway extensions and smaller paved areas.

The commission visited the White House to report on a three-month study, requested by Truman, of airport location and use in light of the Elizabeth River air-disaster.

Commission Chairman James H. Doolittle said his most important recommendation was that airports be made a part of community master plans, completely integrated with passenger, express, freight and postal transportation needs.

Meat Supply Hike Is Due; USDA Averts

WASHINGTON, May 10.—If all goes well, Americans will have nearly a third more beef by 1955. Consumers also an average of 217 pounds of beef and veal last year. The agriculture department says that in three years the average should be around 81 pounds.

The department's "meat and cattle production for years has moved up and down in what it calls "cattle cycles." The nation is now in the midst of a cycle upswing. These cycles are influenced by such things as price, supplies of livestock feed, conditions of pasture and consumer demand.

Three Cycles Three such cycles have been noted during the past 20 years. The first began in 1927, with cattle numbers starting an upswing under influence of general improvement in economic conditions. It reached a peak in 1934. Low farm prices and drought which ruined many pastures brought an end to the expansion.

After dropping off, cattle numbers started a new upswing in 1935. Improved farm prices, coupled with an increase in feed supplies, encouraged a new expansion. It was stopped in 1942, when the government started a program to limit the number of cattle on farms and a record number sent to market for slaughter.

There came the war in Korea. Demand for meat increased 50 per cent. A new cattle cycle was started in 1945. Tight feed supplies plus farm complaints over price controls were given as factors.

Korea Boosted Demand The department believes if the present cycle follows the pattern of past cycles it will reach the peak in 1955 with a record number of beef cattle on farms and a record number sent to market for slaughter.

What is likely to happen after 1955? The department does not look beyond that date—at least for publication. Some of its experts do say, however, it is a question whether the nation could feed many more than 100,000,000 cattle without considerable improvement in range and pasture practices.

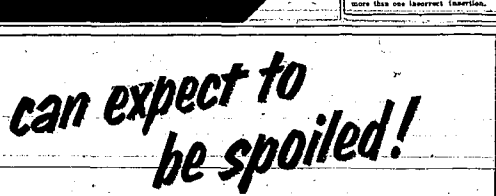

Power Firms Hope Plan on Line Blocked

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—Three western power companies have administered what they hope will be a second knockout blow to a transmission line the government wants to build in Oregon.

The battle, which is turning into an all-out war, is between the Bonneville power administration in Utah, the Oregon power administration in Oregon and Idaho, Montana and Utah power companies in those states.

Congressional appropriations committees serve as the arena for the fight over EPA's plan to build a power transmission line between Baker and LaGrande.

Won Last Year

Officials of the three companies opposed the project last year, and Congress denied funds for it. They appeared before the house appropriations committee early this year, and the house cut money for the project out of an appropriation for 1938.

They went before a senate appropriations subcommittee Thursday to fight EPA's request for restoration of \$1,173,000 to start construction of the line in the next biennial session July 1.

EPA says the 220,000-volt line is needed to carry surplus power to shortage areas in the northwest and estimates it would cost \$1,200,000.

R. E. Cole, Idaho Power company vice president, told the committee the project should be knocked out because:

"Existing facilities are completely adequate for the needs of the area and that proposed line would merely be a duplication of these facilities to no constructive end.

"The taxpayers of the nation cannot afford the cost of wasteful and unnecessary duplication, which ultimately will result in the destruction and removal from tax rolls of many happy-go-lucky investments.
