





**Experts Think Food Business Is in Prospect**

May 21 (AP)—A group of business and government officials here today predicted that the food business is in a "prospective" state, but the economy is still in a "critical" period.

The group, which included representatives of the National Food Processors Association, the National Food Retailers Association, and the National Food Distributors Association, met for a day-long session at the University of Idaho.

The group's report, which is being prepared for the President's Council on Food Policy, says that the food business is in a "prospective" state because of the increasing demand for food products and the need for more efficient production methods.

The report also points out that the food business is facing a number of challenges, including rising costs of raw materials, increased competition from foreign producers, and the need for more government support.

Despite these challenges, the group believes that the food business has a bright future and that it is essential for the nation's economic well-being.

**Nation's Women Urged to Hold Inquest In Highway Deaths, Teach Prevention**

MINNEAPOLIS, May 21.—The women of the nation are urged to hold their own "inquest" into the accidental deaths of 39,000 American motorists last year, including 27,500 in highway tragedies, and then bring their own homes to teach their families by word and example how such accidents can be avoided.

The annual meeting of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, held at the Madison hotel here, was told by Mrs. H. Blaisdell, public safety director of the Association of Casualty and Surety companies, that "highway safety must have a new place in the home" if the high annual toll of death, injury and property damage in traffic accidents is to be reduced. The economic loss from highway accidents alone last year was \$2,500,000,000, he said, equal to a hidden tax of \$1108 on every man, woman and child in the United States. For a family of four this represented an additional tax drain of \$432 on its purse, even though no formal bill was submitted.

Blaisdell called upon the national women to use their leadership to help speed the day when "cranks of the highway" become the outcasts of the social hour. "We need them to 'roll up the carpet' since they have saved their past highway safety travels and must ask for a strict accounting of why death on the highways is still increasing. Campaigns against disease and social misdeeds, A. E. Blaisdell said. The national club women should find out what such an expenditure in time and resources has produced a better bill, he declared.

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We must catch up with our brilliant technical developments. If it is not too late, by tackling the sociological and psychological aspects of accident prevention in the future.

"Criming an 'arrested' Wisconsin law which over-banned the hoodless carriage from the roads as 'a device of the devil' the speaker said the highway casualty list might be a mere fraction of what it is today if, instead, the people years back had launched the first program to create an individual attitude for safe use of the motor vehicle.

"We like to think of ourselves as a generally law-abiding citizenry," Blaisdell declared, "but the news reporting of embezzlement, burglary and homicide," he said, "still, in 1961, over 15,000,000 Americans went to traffic court.

We must remember that laws do not constitute all the violation, only those who were caught. To convert this group alone to the habits of safe driving and safe walking is no job for a small but earnest band of safety evangelists.

In approaching traffic safety as a problem in the humanities, Blaisdell declared, "we must call a new group of scientists who will delve deeply into the study of why people do what they do, particularly in the familiar medium of modern highway traffic.

"We must know, before setting up the penalties, something about the mental stability of the would-be driver. Moreover, the fact that an individual was competent at age 16 is no sure indication of the same abilities at age 61. Better

original driver license examinations and periodic re-examinations for all drivers are a step in this direction.

Urging club women to support such laws and internally those elements of the highway safety program that touch directly the human side of the problem, Blaisdell said, "highway safety must have a new place in the home."

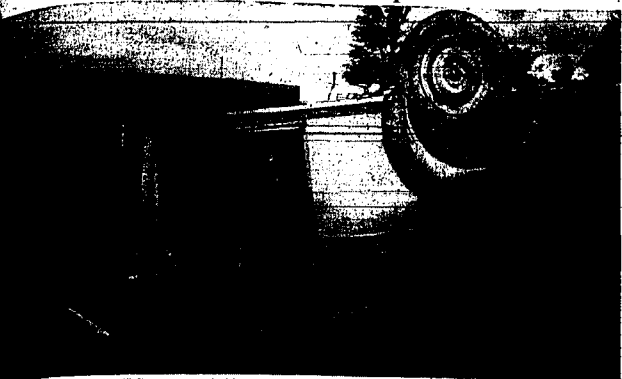

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### U.S. Socialists Eye Candidate For President

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—The Socialist party boldly has announced it will put up a presidential candidate again this year. The national convention takes place in Cleveland May 30-31.

The "Socialist Call" devoted less than a column to the convention announcement and the nomination of a couple of likely presidential nominees. Inside the paper was a full page discussion of what the Socialist party is up against, which is plenty. And what it should do, which is a matter of dispute.

The Socialist party is up against the fact that most of its voters have deserted it. The desertion began in 1946. Socialist Presidential Candidate Eugene V. Debs polled nearly 1,000,000 of about 15,000,000 votes cast in 1920.

Socialist Candidate Norman Thomas got nearly 900,000 votes in 1922 of 39,216,000 cast. Economic depression is both building food for socialists. Franklin D. 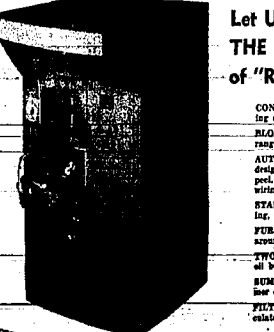

### England Ends As It Started In Red China

 Two hundred years have become an anti-war. The British are pulling out of China with no more than they had when they walked in. The curtain has been drawn—no more British—on the stage set in its time by colorful sea captains, privateers, the trader of the East India company, and many a scoundrel. The British have had to take one more lesson in the futility of trying to do good with the communists. A billion-dollar business once conducted by 10,000 men is closing up. The final decision of British interests to withdraw from China completely is a compromise on British-Chinese policy for the past three years. The outer began when the communists took over all mainland China from Chiang Kai-shek. But the British tried to keep the United States in the most serious rift between the two allies in many years.

British officials have a hard time determining who was right. Would the communists' position, on the same basis customarily followed with the revolutionary governments of Latin America, have helped, or might it have made a difference in China's attitude? It might have, it is thought at the time. But there is no evidence that it would have. Certainly British recognition, ignored by the Peiping regime, is a small but not unimportant factor in the British position. It has been strengthened by what has happened at one point where negotiations between the western powers and the Chinese have continued—Pamunjin.

### 2 U. S. Bishops Chosen by Pope

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—The apostolic delegates to the 21st International Synod of Bishops, the appointment of two new Roman Catholic bishops. They are the Most Rev. William E. Cousins, 50, bishop of Peoria, Ill., and the Very Rev. Max Robert J. Dwyer, bishop of Reno, Nev. The appointments were made by Pope XII, who announced them in the most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, apostolic delegate. Bishop Dwyer has been rector of the Cathedral of the Madeleine in his native Lake City. He also is a former diocesan superintendent and member of the National Council and was pastor of the Catholic cathedral there. Bishop Cousins succeeded Bishop Thomas K. Corran, who recently was transferred to Dallas, Tex.

### Gain Noted in Research for Better Potato

**MOSCOW, May 21 (AP)**— Idaho breeding program to develop disease-resistant potato is making rapid progress, Dr. George W. Woodbury, head of the University of Idaho horticulture department, said Tuesday.

The goal of the program being carried out by the Aberdeen experiment station is to develop a new type of potato similar to the Russett Burbank, but having resistance to diseases such as verticillium wilt, early dying and late blight.

**For Breeder**  
The Russett, until Dr. John McLean began working on the potato in 1924, was considered a good potato breeding variety. The fruits are good haulers of the Russett usually drop off and contain no seed.

But McLean found that by breeding the stems with a knife or piece of copper wire he could produce fruits at will.

From the Russett Burbank are usually sterile, but some varieties do produce root pollen. Both the pollen-producing plants have been used as male parents and crossed with the female parent.

**Method Practiced**  
Dr. Woodbury said this method worked out by McLean is a simple one in the history of potato breeding and opens up a whole new field of endeavor.

He said a few crosses of this nature had been made prior to Dr. McLean's work, but they were more or less by chance. Through his cross-breeding, Dr. McLean now has several hundred seedlings which have the Russett potato as one parent.

Dr. Woodbury said with the probability of being able to use the Russett Burbank as a cross in a cross, the prospects for early results of developing a disease-resistant spud are "much better than fair."

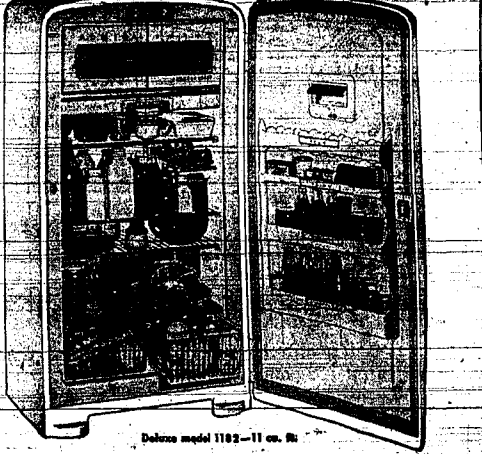

"Dear Sir:

"I have a problem. My boss bawled me out last week, and I have a feeling he's going to bawl me out again this week.

"I would quit and get me another job except it's such a nice place to work. The management even puts me in the rest-room cooler. What can I do? I'm nervous when the boss bawls me out.

"Signed A Terrified Young Man."

Well, dear terrified, your problem was so unusual I took it up with all the oldtimers I know who still can remember being bawled out by their boss (there are only a few of them left). Here is the summary of their advice:

Build up the drama of the situation. When the summons comes to go see the boss, walk into his office with a look of utter happiness.

Let your boss think you have no idea of what is going to happen. He feels like a cat playing with a misaligned mouse.

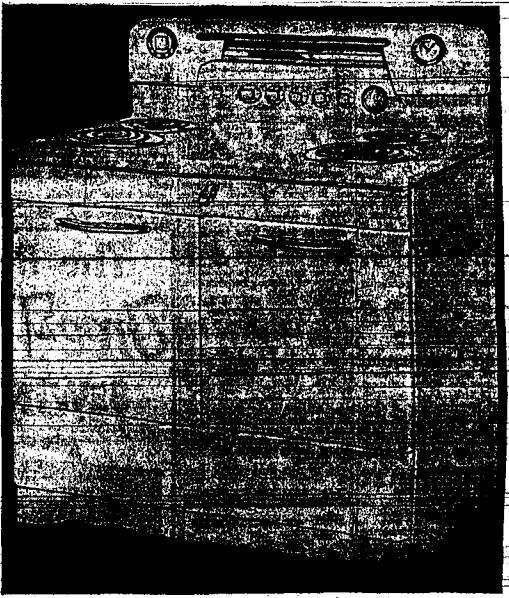

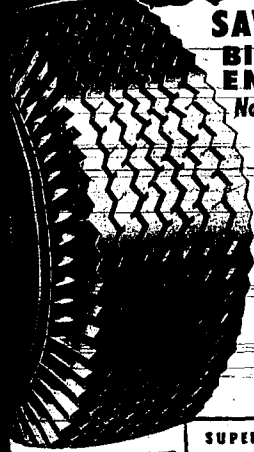

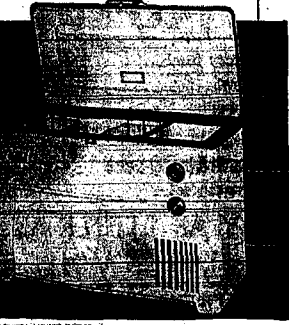
