Truman Rips Utility Firms' Propaganda

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—President Truman lashed out at the utility industry today, declaring they are spreading much more in a drive to "frighten, threaten and confuse the people" about public power. In a speech to a conference of the American Public Power Association, Truman accused the utilities of spending millions of dollars on propaganda and advertising. He said the power monopolists were "using the same old, same old propaganda" to "frighten and confuse the people."

Officers Selected by Telegraphers End Tieup of Wire Service

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—The 82-day Western Union strike ended today as workers' leaders here agreed to a new contract with the company. The new contract provides for a 10 percent raise in wages and a 40-hour work week. The strike had caused a major disruption in telegraph and telephone service across the country.

LEAND, Nev., May 28 (AP)—A court here today executed 15 men for various crimes. The executions were carried out by a firing squad. The men were convicted of a variety of offenses, including murder and armed robbery.

Atomic Blast Effects Eyed; Another Due

LAS VEGAS, Nev., May 28 (AP)—Atomic scientists and military leaders here today said they expect another atomic blast to be tested in the Nevada desert. The tests are part of a series of experiments designed to study the effects of nuclear weapons. Scientists are particularly concerned about the potential for radioactive fallout.

Final Airline Hearings Set

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—The civil aeronautics board is scheduled to hold final public hearings today to determine the status of open-airline service in the Pacific northwest. The hearings will focus on the proposed merger between Northwest Airlines and Western Air Lines. The board is also expected to hear testimony from other airlines and industry groups.

Numbers of Beet Leafhoppers Are Predicted for Annual Invasion of Area

Connally argued that such a move would be a "policy of inactivity" and would harm the interests of the United States. He emphasized the importance of maintaining a strong and consistent foreign aid program.

BOISE, May 25 (Special)—Crop with a gross value of \$1,700,000 were grown during 1931 by farmers on the Owyhee federal reclamation project, the regional office of the bureau of reclamation reported today.

The gross was realized from 111,800 acres under cultivation on the Idaho-Oregon project, or a per-acre return of \$15.10. The project's all-time high per-acre return of \$18.27 was set in 1927.

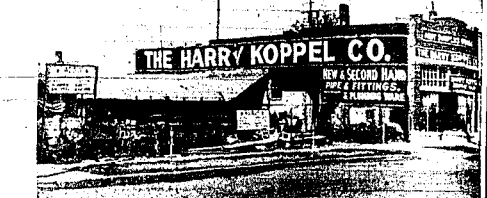

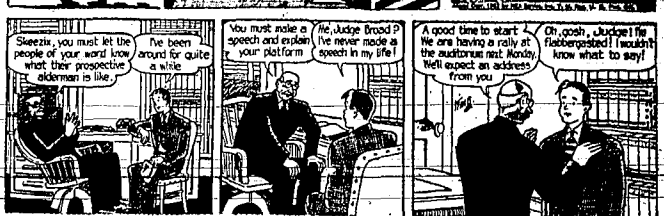
