FOR THE COMMUNISTS this is obviously a bitter pill. They cannot bring themselves to do so before the world that there are 60,000 people familiar with communist life who do not care to enjoy it "benefit" again.

Yet they will have to concede that there is a truce. For we will not yield this point, and there is nothing else on which we can give way.

SUPPOSE THE ANSWER IS "NO." What the military sequel will be is anybody's guess. Certainly we will try to keep the Korean war on a limited footing, even though we may adopt new measures not heretofore tried. Our commanders insist, too, that we have the right to continue the war.

Despite the big build-up the communists have managed during the protracted truce talks, it would be foolish to pretend that we would be "better off" under the Korean armistices. Almost nothing related to the Korean situation, either existing or foreseeable, is a subject for American concern.

WHAT, FOR INSTANCE, would be the outlook for the 12,000 to 14,000 U. N. and allied prisoners who are still in the hands of the communists?

We need not fear that they would be executed, for the representatives of the Russian-Korean forces, massed of Polish soldiers and Chinese soldiers, are well known to the Kremlin that would option cannot be ignored. Yet there is no denying it would require long and painful negotiations—under new circumstances.

THEY AND THEIR RELATIVES at home would have to sweat out more months of what is unquestionably a nightmare ordeal. Short of a general armistice or a total truce, there is no reasonable alternative.

If we were to hand the reds the prisoners who don't want to go back, we would suffer an eventual wave of desertions. The communists ever would surrender again, since they would simply be faced with the choice of death at any time.

SECONDLY, would be committing a crime against humanity, since the world, and especially the Atlantic world, would never forgive us. Who would believe American talk of freedom if we were unwilling to protect men who had to be?

The possible breakdown of truce talks is not something we can contemplate with satisfaction. But if these 300-day days of indecision are purely a delaying tactic, it is better that they be dashed. It is better to know the truth than to dream widely of that day that may be far off.

FROM ALL APPEARANCES the Koje generals will be made the "scapegoats" for events which have given the United States such a black eye around the world, especially among neutral and satellite peoples, and even with anti-American factions in England, France, Germany and Italy.

It is understandable that the offending commanders were instructed to treat Communist prisoners with extraordinary kindness, and not to subject them to the penalties of the Geneva convention. This applies to food, camp discipline and special privileges.

2 Big Grocery Chains Facing Trust Charges

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—The federal trade commission has filed suits against two of the nation's largest grocery chains—Safeway stores, Inc., and the Kroger company—charging the trust-law violation.

The FTC said in a formal complaint filed in the U.S. district court in Portland that the two companies knowingly obtained illegal price cuttings from their suppliers, and that their competitors could not compete with them.

Products involved in the suit included canned goods, fruit juices, bakery products, dairy products, sugar and coffee.

Many Safeway and Kroger rank second and third respectively among national grocery chains. Each operates several hundred stores and has an annual sales volume of about \$1,000,000,000.

The biggest grocery chain, the A. P. & C. is already locked in an anti-trust suit with the federal government.

Raps Charge

Safeway President Ligan A. Warren immediately termed the FTC charges "completely unjustified," in a statement released at the company's headquarters in Oakland, Calif.

"Safeway has no knowledge of any violation of the anti-trust laws, and we are confident that the evidence will show the guilt of the commission's charges," Warren said.

The suit was filed in the U.S. district court in Portland, Ore., on May 25.

Special Tax Aid OK'd on Projects

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—The government said Monday special tax allowances have been approved for the construction of 470 new or expanded defense production plants at \$49,121,821.

The allowances cover a period of 10 years for a tax write-off within five years for that part of the cost. These projects are to be financed by the production administration to be in contact with defense agencies with normal depreciation over a period of 20 years. The aim is to encourage expansion or production of new plants.

With the new certifications through May 25, 222 such projects are now being approved for part of the cost of \$10,000,000.

The projects are included: Salt Lake Pipe Line company, from Salt Lake City to Boise; refined petroleum pipeline, \$200,000.

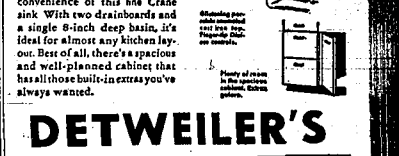

It was the beginning of the final week of the Columbia basin festival. In two more days, a reclamation commission will close the waters of Grand Coulee dam reservoir into a semi-artificial desert—and more than 1,000,000 acres of fertile farmland.

The winding of desert and water is expected to bring about 50,000 new settlers—pioneers in the truest sense—to the Columbia basin this year.

Like New State

Experts say such an increase of population with the attendant influx of new business will have a beneficial economic effect of adding a new state to the union.

Farm plots varying in size from 10 to 100 acres will be sold to a homestead preference basis in Washington and other eligible farm units will be sold with more to go each year. U. S. Interior department officials have called it the greatest land rush in history.

marked vote in the discarded box, Smythe replied, "I think not."

Change Outlined

He outlined the election changes passed following a 1931 Kootenai county contest which, he said, had shown the need for election regulations.

At that time, when there was doubt as to who had the vote, election judges dug to the bottom of the ballot box and found votes dating back as far as 1913.

Smythe said the 1931 legislature forbade the straight ballot, made necessary that precinct names and numbers be on all ballot boxes, ruled that after the counting all ballot boxes be sealed and delivered to the county judge who must keep them in a safe—keeping for at least eight months, required adequate rules that after the counting all the judges of large population precincts, registration urged.

Because there has been alteration in some of the precincts, he recommended that "all voters" check with an election school for all election regulations to be certain that they are registered.

Registration schools should have more than 400 persons—more than 100 in some areas, particularly in Boise, precincts have shrank to 1,500.

In conclusion, Smythe told the Republican women that as far as elections go "there are a number of things different but the main difference is that we're going to win." He referred to the Twin Falls county group as "the most ambitious and aggressive club in Idaho."
