Weekend Jitters Growing West Berlin as Soviets Cut Off Two Parts of City

May 31 (AP)—A new red squeeze tightened on West Berlin today. The German people's police lopped off two little islands of freedom on the outskirts of the city. The worst case of jitters since the Russian blockade of 1948-49, said a German newspaper, was the Soviet program to seal off the city from the allied sectors and all West Germany. A police move from Burgerberg, just inside the Russian zone but administered by the West, cut off two parts of the city from the rest of West Berlin.

Census Shows Idaho Population Increase Led by Cities in State

WASHINGTON, May 31 (AP)—Idaho's population of 688,637, as recorded in 1950, showed the greatest increase in its cities, the bureau of census reported today. Urban population increased by 32.6 per cent over 1940. The rural non-farm population increased by 27.3 per cent and the rural farm population decreased by 17.1 per cent. The bureau's final summary also showed: Median dollar income of families and unrelated individuals in Idaho was \$2,838. Highest median income was in the urban population—\$2,971. It was \$2,862 in the rural non-farm group and \$2,284 in the rural farm.

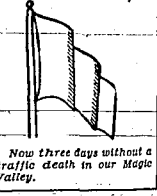

Report Shows How Prisoner Riots Started

The friction inside the barred wire fences quickly led to bloody struggles between the POWs. A day rarely went by when prisoners were not killed inside the compounds and many of them were buried there. Communist leaders were in control. Opposition was not tolerated. Prisoners were hanged or their throats were cut or they were beheaded to death. Similar discipline was enforced by anti-rod leaders.

From the beginning camp officials worked with the prisoners through leaders elected by the POWs themselves. The compound leaders then chose their own subchiefs. The system has continued right up to the present. Another cause for much of Koje's trouble was the fact that many of the guards were poorly disciplined, bitter-happy South Korean soldiers.

Conditions on Koje went from bad to worse during a five-day period last September, when the compounds and guards sent 100 prisoners and a dozen U. N. guards to the hospital. Many of those hospitalized, including 15 who were freed on arrival, had been beaten severely by their fellow-prisoners. Forced by Japanese soldiers on the spot, the U. N. command officers and commanders would send troops in to regain control.

One guard officer who has been on Koje for months said in the beginning, "I was cracked down in the beginning, but we would have been too and there would have been no trouble now."

Whatever the reason, the fact is that Koje's commanders have fled from toughness to weakness and back again throughout the 16-month history of the Koje camp. And there have been at least 100 commanders during that period.

A salute to the dead was fired by an honor guard from the 116th armored cavalry regiment of the Idaho national guard. The program was concluded with the band playing the national anthem.





Shoshone Club Reminisces On History of 50 Years

MEMPHIS, May 29—July 30, 1902—19 years after the first train arrived in Shoshone—15 women, feeling a need for civic and cultural organizations in the community, gathered in the McCall hotel to organize a club. The result was the Shoshone civic club which this month celebrated a meeting to a review of the half-century of club-sponsored civic and community projects.

Two birthday cakes, baked by Mrs. Ella Vredenburg, observed not only the 50th anniversary, but the club's two major community projects, the founding of the city library and the Shoshone Civic Club.

According to the club history written by Mrs. D. Sidney Smith, a present member of 15 members of the new Shoshone civic club passed a resolution in 1902: "Resolved, that it be the sense of this meeting that a women's club for mutual improvement" to maintain a fine reading room and to take up any other line of work which shall be designed to promote the highest interest of the community, shall be formed in this city."

True, with a desire for a reading room, was born the present club and the idea for a future public library had its inception. The civic club became a growing organization and soon affiliated with the Idaho Federation of Women's Clubs.

A thorough study of the Victorian period, "White Servants" was undertaken and the length and scope of the early programs is considered a marvel.

Programs such as were used in those days would today be an invitation to bring a cot and bed-jackets. "Teecees declare" is a phrase appearing often in the old minutes.

In 1902 the Bay View reading room, which featured the history, art and literature of the leading nations of the older and new world, was adopted and continued to be the basis of study for 10 years.

After the club became a member of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, programs were formulated to meet the plans of the department by the general organization. Thus, a study of civic problems was encouraged and much of the active cooperation in civic at-

tempts of a city park. The need of a swimming pool for youngsters was the motivating force behind the more. Through the assistance of various community organizations, the grounds were enlarged and landscaped, a swimming pool was built, outdoor fireplace erected and picnic tables purchased. In May, 1929, the park was presented to the village board and the park board membership still includes representatives of the club.

Among other projects of the club are conducting operation of the city cemetery for 16 years, street markings, installation of fountains, gifts to the public school system, sponsoring health surveys and holding health day festivals, in addition to countless donations made to local, state and national projects.

Mrs. Frank Grose and Mrs. Paul Haddock are among the oldest members of the club. Mrs. Grose, a charter member, claims she is the only present day member "living in captivity"—or still active as she explained it.

Back in the days when there was such a need for club funds, the library and park promotion, members always brought an extra donation to each club meeting and it was the rule to tell the members where they got the money. She confided to have told the club one day that her 25 cents was found in her husband's pants when she was pressing them.

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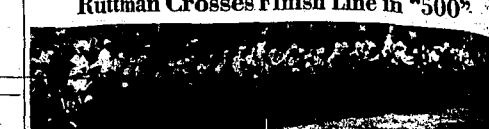

Exhibit to Aid 'Rock Hounds' In Searchings

IDAHO FALLS, May 31 (Special)— Idaho "rock hounds" will get some pointers on identifying uranium and thorium ore at the atomic energy exhibit at the local armory Sunday, Monday and Tuesday.

In one of the exhibits 30 displays, samples of radioactive material are mounted on a disk which carries a meter with a pointer and a scale for the greater counter registering the radioactivity of the sample.

Deposit uranium. In addition to a map showing known deposits of uranium and thorium throughout the world, with large deposits shown by means of electric lights.

Fluorescent minerals are mounted in a box where they may be seen fluorescing under black light. On the same panel the "radioactive heat test" is shown in photographs with explanatory labels.

Ores containing radioactive materials are shown in a showcase and identified. A block of uranium metal also is shown. Push buttons on the showcase to "turn on" the ores activate small lights which show where they are found in the world. These push buttons are operated by visitors.

Joint Venture. The traveling atomic energy display is a joint venture of the American museum of atomic energy and the National University Extension Association. Members of the Atomic Energy club, Idaho Falls, are making arrangements for its appearance locally.

The exhibit describes all aspects of the atomic energy program. It will be open afternoons and evenings Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday.

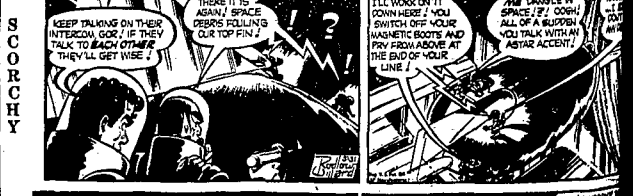

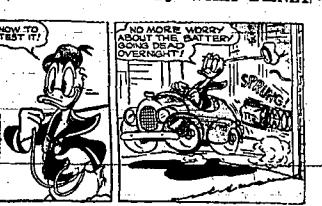

Respect of church attendance is one of the first steps taken toward living out together in the Christian life. Both for our own sakes and the life of the church we ought to be faithful in observing its duties. How can we hope to bring others in if we confess by our actions what we find at church is not worth our time and attention. We cannot. Loyalty is another responsibility we owe the church. Be a booster, not a smokes. The member who goes about criticizing the minister, his brethren, the church, and its work does nothing to help it. On the other hand the one who lends a hand in the work of the church and goes about with a good word for it is a help to the church. If there are weaknesses in the church that need correction it is the duty of every member to do what he can to correct them. But nothing is gained by "running down" the church.

They say animals always think the grass is greener on the other side of the fence. Some people are like that about the church. The minister of some other congregation on the other side of town is so much better than their own—the people are more friendly—the congregation is more progressive. The fact is, if they went to that congregation regularly for a while they would find fault with it too, and perhaps go back to the original one. There is no place in the church for a religious hobo who drifts from one congregation to another. He is of no value to any. What the church needs is people who will settle down in the center where they happen to be, and do their level best to make that corner the best in the world. That is loyalty.

By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye love one another.

A cold pulpit is bad, but cold pews are worse. Empty pews are poor advertisements for the church and the gospel it preaches. Church attendance is necessary for the promotion of the kingdom of God, and for the spiritual growth of the Christian as well. In church we are most conscious of the presence of God. We are in fellowship with the best people. We hear the most important subjects discussed. We get new visions of the soul's possibilities, higher standards of character, a greater vision of the world's need, and inspiration for service. And by our presence and participation we help others to get these things, too.

We could not live the Christian life without worship. We can worship God anywhere, but it is easier to worship God in church than anywhere else. Most of us learned to worship God in the church services. We can always worship better when we worship in company and in fellowship with others. How much we worship God in our homes, and among the beauties of nature de-

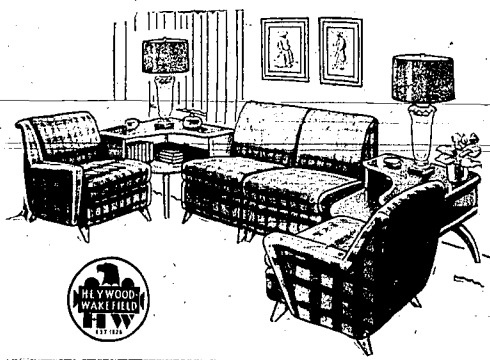

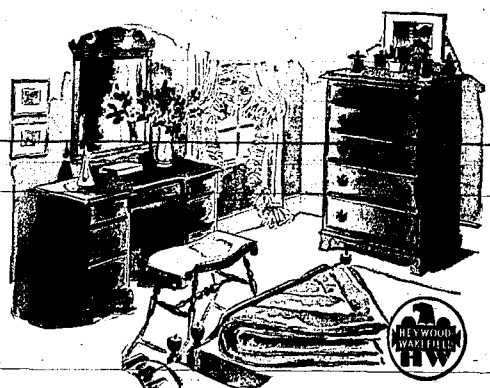

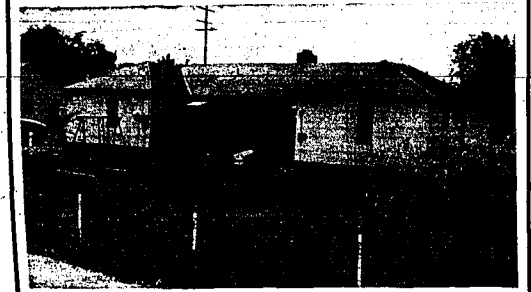
