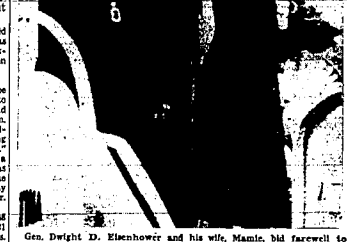

## Gooding LDS Ward Cares for Its Largest Welfare Project

GOODING, June 2—The largest welfare farm to be undertaken by members of the Gooding ward of the LDS church now is being cultivated. A 40 acre tract containing sugar beets was thinned Thursday by more than 40 men, women and young people.

The welfare farm, consisting of two tracts of land, one north of town and the other a 40-acre piece of land in the Shoshone area, southwest of Gooding, is under the direction of a committee consisting of E. W. Pond, chairman, and K. T. Miller and Allen Johnson.

Under the LDS welfare plan a certain percentage of the crops will be sent directly to the needy in Salt Lake City. The remainder of the crops will be sold and the money used for welfare work in the local church and for upkeep of the church.

Crops other than the beets include hay and grain. In the past only small welfare farms have been operated by the Gooding ward.

## GOP in Idaho Receives Bid To Meet 'Ike'

BOISE, June 2 (AP)—Idaho's delegation to the Republican-national convention has been invited to meet Gen. Dwight Eisenhower in Denver June 29 in an effort to crack the pro-Taft sentiment in the delegation.

W. D. Eberle, state Eisenhower-for-President chairman, said today that no money for the trip had come from the national organization.

Ben Robert Taft's campaign manager, David R. Ingalls, criticized the plan of "Ike" forces to invite chairmen of all GOP convention delegations to meet the general. Ingalls said the move to pay expenses of delegates to confer with the general "comes pretty close to a bribe."

Eberle said all money used to send Idaho delegates to Denver was being raised locally.

He explained that the Idaho delegates had been invited to meet Eisenhower so they "could judge more realistically about Eisenhower's merits if they have a chance to meet him personally."

Idaho's delegation to the GOP convention is "honored bound" to support Taft. It is also bound by the usual rule.

### U.S. Officials Still Hopeful On War Pact

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—American officials still are clinging to the hope that a truce can be negotiated to end the Korean conflict which began two years ago this month.

Persons in authority concede that to all outward appearances, the Pacific talks have been deadlocked on the question of forcing communist prisoners of war to return to their homelands against their will.

But they recall that several months ago the negotiations appeared to be hopelessly stalemated on the 25th parallel line. The communists—loudly proclaimed then that they would never agree to return to the North-South Korean border. But they did.

Officials believe there is at least a chance that the communists they captivate might consent to a similar arrangement should they have minked all possible propaganda advantages out of the incidents at the Kolo Island prison camp.

Current communist strategy, according to officials, is to try to get as many blood prisoners as possible in the hands of Kolo Island guards for use as a bargaining weapon at Panmunjom. Violence in the prison camps provides the reds with "evidence" that the United States is wrong when it says 100,000 prisoners do not want to go home.

The Kolo Island incident has not given the communists their desired propaganda advantage in the Korean war.

LAWRENCE, Kans., June 2 (AP)—A "serious back-door threat" to the free flow of news in the United States was cited today by Earl C. Johnson, vice president and general manager of the United Press, in a commencement work address at the University of Kansas.

The threat, Johnson said, is the growth of big government. Johnson said thousands of bureaucrats sit at the source of official news, and there are those who try to turn the flow off or slow it down.

### Spiritual Understanding Seen As Path for Safety, Security

BOSTON, June 3—Spiritual understanding also can pierce today's corruption and lead mankind to lasting safety and security. The Christian Science board of directors said today.

About 750 Christian Scientists from throughout the world heard the director's special message at the annual meeting of the Mother Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston.

The director said that human progress will never solve mankind's deepest problems. But they added that the means for right adjustment are spiritual and are immediately available to all.

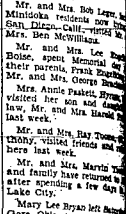
She added: "We rejoice in widely accumulating evidence, in terms of Christian healing, that the need of spiritual understanding is available to humanity today."

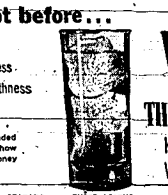

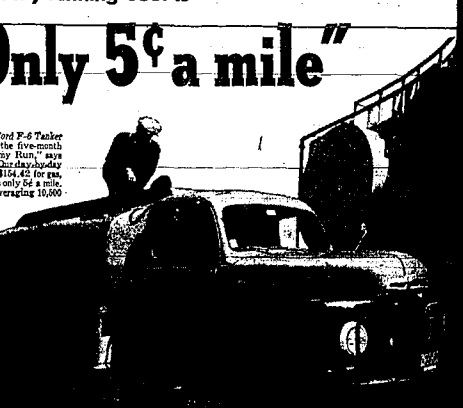
