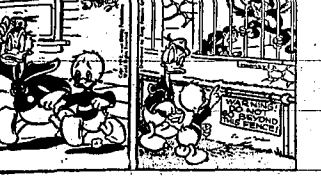

Steel Walkout Hits Nation at Critical Time

NEW YORK, June 4 (AP)—The steel strike comes at a critical time both in the civilian economy and the defense program.

The civilian economy is fairly balanced between the forces of inflation and deflation, with business and economists alike divided as to which way it is likely to tilt. A long steel strike could be a big factor in deciding.

The defense program has been reported both by industrialists and by the military as lagging behind schedules and behind Russian military production.

Armament Gaining

The American armament program is now on the threshold of what has been billed as its big step forward—looking toward the volume production in the office, but only if steel is available.

That is why the government immediately froze all steel stocks to end sales for civilian use.

Steelmen feel the civilian industries have steel inventory high enough to get by for two or three weeks. After that, if the strike continues, plant shutdowns and worker layoffs might become fairly widespread, right at the start layoffs in the coal mines and on the railroads are in the air.

Steel Supply Good

The steel supply situation is much better, however, than it was at the start of the year. Production in the first four months of this year was at an annual rate of 109,000,000 tons, a record.

At the same time demand for steel was easing noticeably.

Steelmen have been predicting that by fall demand and supply would be in full balance, and by the end of the year supply would exceed demand. That unrealistic now will depend, of course, on the length of the strike.

Talk was heard that steel controls would be lifted before year's end. But that will now go glimmering—if the strike goes on and steel supply once more lags far behind the accumulating demand.

CONDON Ore., June 4 (AP)—Farmers in three eastern Oregon counties will decide here Thursday whether to renew again rain-making contracts this year.

The farmers of Garfield, Gilliam and Morrow counties, organized as Tri-County Weather Research, have financed cloud seeding operations in the area in past years.

The group will hear a report by Robert Beumont, Oregon State college meteorologist. Beumont has been studying results of cloud-seeding for the past two years. His report also is expected to include an analysis of rain intensity—whether any rain produced by cloud-seeding is smaller drops and is more general.

Representatives from four weather control firms, including the Water Resources Development corporation, Denver, and the North American Weather Consultants, Pasadena, are expected at the meeting.

The Denver firm has done cloud-seeding for the tri-county group since it was organized.
