### 2 Complaints On 17 Causes Ask Payment

Two civil complaints for 17 causes for action totaling \$842.19, plus interest, costs and attorney fees were filed in Justice court Saturday by the Professional Adjustments Bureau against James H. Hopper. The bureau's attorney is J. H. Barnes.

Pearson, California, 159.97; Dr. E. W. McBratney, 81; Dr. R. L. White, 230.50; Dr. C. C. Johnson, 1750; Dr. Arthur Racine, dentist, 815; and Drs. Fletcher, McKean and Schweitzer, 817.

Other creditors are Abbott Plumbing and Heating company, 1311; Magic City Roofing company, 12; Pelarian Laundry, 818; and Standard Printing company, 1153, letterheads and envelopes. One complaint asks \$395.22, plus interest—costs and attorney—fee, while the other asks \$173.73 plus interest and costs.

### Serious Crop Damage, Bee Losses Noted

at 25 pounds per acre or any of the new mixtures will prevent such losses as has occurred in recent years.

Also of grave concern to the bureau of entomology is the unintentional destruction of honey bees and wild pollinating insects. This has occurred when farmers use insecticides such as tetrathion, chloroform, lindane, parathion and DDT on crops. All such insecticides are extremely toxic to pollinating insects. Fortman said.

To remedy the situation, farmers are urged to treat their fields in the evening hours, when bees and other wild pollinating insects are not working the fields. At this time the bees are usually calm and more complete coverage and control can be obtained.

For spraying, five per cent DDT dust at 30 pounds per acre for lygus and for control of a five per cent DDT plus 50 to 70 per cent sulphur dust at 30 pounds per acre is recommended.

By using such mixtures at the proper times, beneficial pollinating insects can be protected and a better crop yield obtained.

### Big House Built in 1907 Being Moved To New Location After Sale by Church

There was little room for traffic on Fifth avenue north as workmen for 300-ft. building began moving the 11-room former Presbyterian manse to 264 Harrison street where Abney Mays will remodel it for a 12-room dwelling.

The building was constructed about 1907 by Mark Pelt for the late District Judge W. A. Babcock, according to the latter's son, Edward Babcock. About 1911, the house was sold to the church and was used as a manse for many years. Recently it was used as a church school.

The need for the old structure was eliminated with completion of a new building for the church school. The land will be landscaped and future building plans call for some form of recreation hall for young people of the church.

The old building had a small cellar, barely large enough for the furnace and a few other items. Mays has excavated a 28-by-30-foot basement to accommodate the structure. He will remove his own three-room house.

Mays plans to put two rooms in the attic, making a total of 12 rooms. It will be used for a home, for himself, his wife and their three children. Considerable redecoration is planned. A single car garage was removed from the building before the moving started, and Mays plans to build a two-car garage.

Preparations for the move started Monday. The building was hauled into the street Thursday and moved over to the junior high school playground. It will remain there until the Idaho Power company can raise its lines and the Mountain States Telephone company can move its lines along the route.

A five-ton tandem six by six, which pulls with all six wheels, is expected to be sufficient to move the building which weighs between 40 and 50 tons, according to Mays.

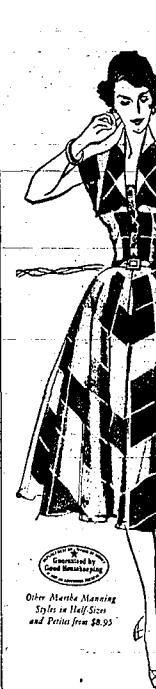

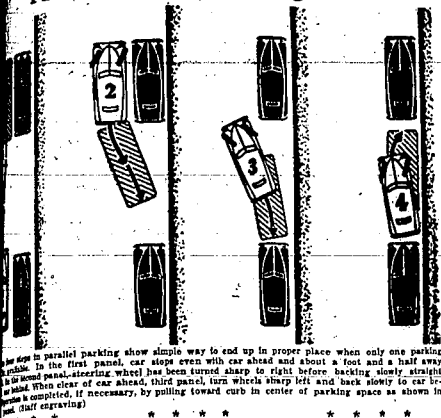

### Parallel Parking? Nothing to It!



...to parallel parking show simple way to end up in proper place when only one parking space is available. In the first panel, car stops even with car ahead and about a foot and a half way behind. When clear of car ahead, shift panel, turn wheel sharply left and back slowly to car behind. If necessary, by pulling toward curb in center of parking space as shown in last diagram.

### Honorary Degree Is Awarded To Baptist Minister by College

The Rev. Herman C. Rice, pastor of the Twin Falls First Baptist church, was awarded an honorary doctor of divinity degree Sunday by Linfield college, McMinnville, Ore. Announcement of the award was received in Twin Falls Saturday from the college's president, Harry L. Dilling. Dr. Dilling made the award at the 45th annual commencement exercises for the school. It was given for the local pastor's wide range of activities and interests, even outside the role of church pastor, the citation explained. The Rev. He graduated in 1923 from the Colgate-Rochester Divinity school and served his first pastorate in Grinnell, Ia. He also served at the same time as the pastor of the Peoples' union of Iowa and was on the national board of the union. After four years at Grinnell, he moved to Boone, Ia., where he remained until going to Montana in 1928. The Rev. Mr. Rice has been more than just a pastor of a church; his citation reads: "His service on the state convention boards in Iowa, Montana and Idaho. His interest in music has been keen, and he has directed the music for three different state summer assemblies. While in Mississippi and later for a time in Twin Falls he directed the church choir." The citation continues. For two years he led the Idaho Baptist convention as its president. For the past several years he has represented the foreign mission societies on the Idaho State convention board. It adds: The citation read at the Linfield college service by Dr. Dilling also lauded the Rev. Mr. Rice's leadership in finance and promotion board. Construction of the new Twin Falls Baptist church building, directed by the Rev. Mr. Rice, also is noted. His work in community activities also was lauded and his membership on the Twin Falls federal housing and city recreation commissions noted. "The progress of the man has been more than matched by the progress of his pastorate," the citation asserts. "In every case his church has shown a gain in membership, in attendance, and in giving. ### Farmers View Bumper Crops Of Hay and Bless Last Winter

ASHOSHOKE, June 1—Farmers in Lincoln county still haven't forgotten the inconvenience and, in many instances, losses in stock and profits caused by the long, hard winter just passed. The curings old man winter got from those farmers have turned to blessings these last spring days, however, as hay crops are viewed with anticipation. Some farmers say they never have seen such good hay. Most of the farmers in North Ashoshoke will begin cutting their hay next week. A few began cutting hay as early as a week ago. One-hundred-fifty of the three-hundred-sixty acres on W. M. Simpson's farm in Dietrich have been cut. Simpson said he has found that in most years the best time for cutting the first crop of hay on his farm is between June 1 and June 15. Other farmers claim the hay season this year has come from 10 days to two weeks earlier than usual. They all generally agree that the hay made is much finer growing this year than usual and credited it to the "mild" winter "bleacher" which followed the late snow. Some of the farmers have put off planting their bean and potato seed until after the first hay crop is cut. Some farmers have noted a yellowing of leaves in alfalfa plants this spring. Two types of symptoms have appeared. Some plants show almost white scorched streaks on the leaves while others gradually turn yellow. In the gradual change, a dense midrib may be found on the underside of the leaves. There has been a purple color cast noted in many instances. In some fields several square rods have turned yellow from the midrib down. In other fields infected leaves may be found throughout but none of the plants affected so seriously. J. M. Reader, associate plant pathologist at the University of Idaho, in reporting on a specimen sent to him, said the midrib in common on first cuttings where there is high humidity and low temperatures. There is no practical remedy, he added. Losses are seldom serious from the frobbly feeder and, it decreases as the temperatures rise and the humidity becomes lower. Referring to the scorched-leaf symptom, the plant pathologist said a very similar condition has been produced experimentally on alfalfa by supplying too much moisture following a drought. It is not really a disease, but is tied in with moisture availability, he explained. It appears that alfalfa troubles can be blamed on a peculiar season, he said, although the snow stayed on the ground late this spring, warm weather came with a dash and the alfalfa grew unusually fast. Among the most serious losses reported by the hog winter and damp spring weather was in sheep and calf deaths. The weather has been blamed for the losses although some farmers believe their newborn calves died from scours, which they said, is caused by over-eating or by milk that is too rich. Others claim the deaths were caused by a disease that came with the damp weather and was picked up from the barn.

# Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Although employed by Thole Ham as a mail carrier, Charles W. McBride, TWINS FALLS, not infrequently is seen examining water sprinklers and explaining their performance to some housewife obviously distressed over her garden or on the lawn.

McBride is not talking on a subject about which he knows nothing. He has perfected a sprinkler on which a patent has been granted recently. "I'll tell you the reason—the honest reason—I decided to construct a sprinkler," McBride said. "I've been carrying mail in Burley for 21 years and I got so tired hearing women complain about their sprinklers that I decided to find a remedy for the difficulties causing the complaint."

This decision was made 18 years ago. With no previous knowledge of invention, McBride began paying more attention to the mechanical structure of sprinklers and their performance. He came to the conclusion that the basic design of many sprinklers follows a wrong principle. The arms on twisting sprayer point up, throwing too much water on the outside of an area, causing unfair distribution. McBride spent his evenings developing and perfecting a new type of sprinkler called the "Pulsing" for a patent. The unit he developed is a rotary sprinkler, consisting of a rotary head mounted on a vertical axis with three tubular sprayer arms curved downward in an arc. In each arm, holes are drilled toward a radius point in the center of the arc and as water appears to effect even distribution according to the area served and the pressure used.

At the end of 18 years, feeling certain that his sprinkler was novel, he applied for a patent. His application was accepted May 3, 1946, and on May 12, just four years and eight days later, the patent was granted. Before granting the patent, it was necessary for the United States patent office to conduct 10 U. S. and one German patent.

McBride's factory, in the basement of his home at 810 Oakley avenue, is equipped with pipe benders, wrenches and jigs. He says he can drill 108 holes in one hour. He has assembled, boxed and made ready for delivery as many as 100 units in one day.

Mrs. McBride and their three children have shown an active interest in their father's enterprise. McBride says they can do every phase of the work he does. Born June 8, 1902, at OAKLEY, McBride comes from a family of deers. His family moved to Twin Falls when he was 4 years old. They grubbed off scruboak on the 27 acres where the municipal golf course now is located. The eight children helped their father farm the land. Soon they devised a method to chop ice from Snake river, which bordered their property. This they stored for summer delivery. And
