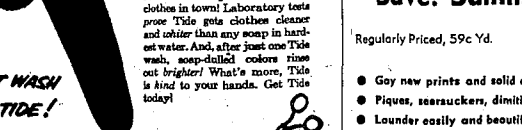

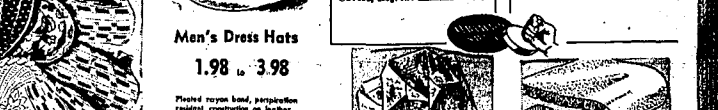

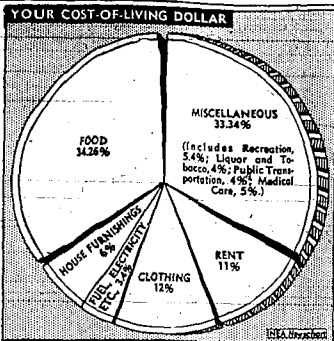

### Inventory of Air Reserve Due in Area

HAMILTON AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., June 18—An extensive inventory of the 48,087 air force reservists in California, Oregon, Washington, Utah, Idaho, Montana, Arizona and Nevada will be conducted by personal interviews over the next 12 months.  
 The announcement was made by Maj. Gen. William E. Hall, commanding the fourth air force, from his headquarters here.  
 Primary reason for this survey, known as "inventory of air force reserve personnel resources," is to bring individual records up-to-date and to establish the military potential of reservists in case of national emergency.  
 Information needed by the United States air force from every reservist covers changes in his status since he last was separated from active military service.

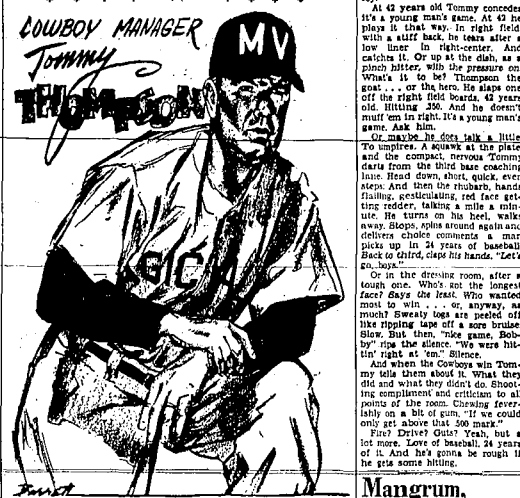

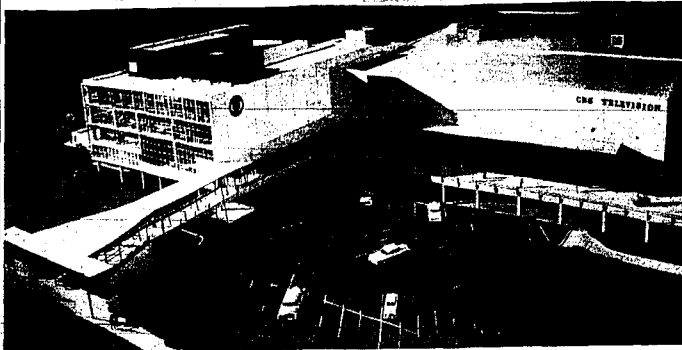

Clark, now 23, was born in Osborne, Kans., and raised in Twin Falls. He had his own model airplane store which he operated here before and during his high school years. He was graduated from Twin Falls high school in 1942.

Clark's "first" for model-making and industrial displays caught the attention of such leaders in industrial design as Norman Bel Geddes, Raymond Loewy and Henry Dreyfus. They hired him by day while he studied at night at New York City Cooper Union from which he graduated in 1947. He married Mildred (Mike) Bahulis, a fellow student.

Clark worked as an engineer at Lockheed Aircraft corporation in California and taught industrial design at the Chouinard Art Institute for another year before starting his business.

Prior to the TV model job, his largest project was a \$10,000-per-square-yard miniature refinery built for the Mobil Oil company. Other jobs include his smallest one, a one-inch square, complete with awnings, shutters and tiny plastic windows, assembled under a magnifying glass.

Mrs. Clark's activity is responsible for miniature figures, interior scenery and tiny dresses in her husband's models.

In their spare time, the Clarks use light driving gear equipped with a self-contained breathing apparatus to "walk" along the bottom of the sea. They own a 28-foot sailboat with which they hope to sail around the world someday.

The Clarks have three children—Barbara A. Gregory, 2 and Danny, 4 months.

Besides their diving and sailing hobbies, they like to soar aloft in a glider.

Some of the details of the TV City project are novel. Electric control lights roof, movie walls, and lights and equipment for the television production facilities. 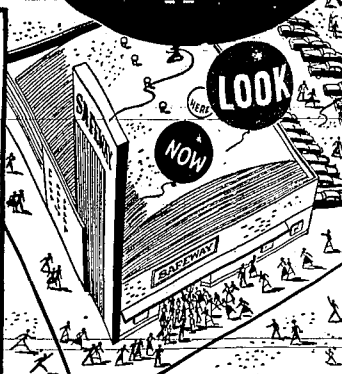
