# Army Okays GO Speech Of McArthur

WASHINGTON, June 17 (AP)—The army announced today that it has approved the speech of Gen. Douglas MacArthur for delivery at the annual convention of the Republican national party at San Francisco.

The army's finding was based on the technicality that a five-star general, is not on specific assignment and is not in active duty and has been drawing pay since President Truman relieved him of his far eastern command more than a year ago.

The army's formal announcement did not mention MacArthur by name, but it was an answer to a question received on MacArthur's status.

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# Ired Sweden Seeking Lost Plane at Sea

STOCKHOLM, June 17 (AP)—Injured Sweden kept up her search over the Baltic today for a missing fighter plane and sent along jet fighters with orders to shoot if the Russians attacked.

The traditionally neutral nation's stern action reflected the anger expressed by the government, press and people over the shooting down Monday of an unarmed Swedish flying boat by a Soviet MIG-10 fighter plane.

The seven crew members—two of them wounded—were taken aboard a small German freighter and taken to Sweden.

They had been searching for a Swedish transport DC-3 missing Friday with eight men aboard. It was assumed here the Russians had shot down that craft also, but the search continued.

A Swedish air force spokesman announced Tuesday that jet fighters had been supplied with jet fighter control. He said the fighters had been told to return fire if attacked. Some 1000 fusible fighters, he added, "we will see strengthened," and "down with the communist warplanes," demonstrated in front of the Russian embassy in protest against Monday's attack.

# Russians Accused On Ships Return

WASHINGTON, June 17 (AP)—American officials charged today that Russia of short-changing the United States in the return of 100,000 tons of 100 of 700-lead ships.

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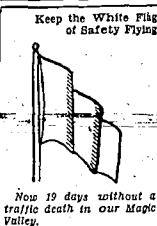

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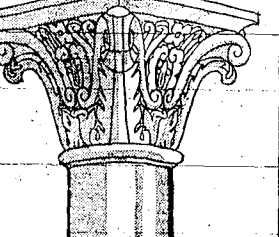

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### Soviet Agrees To Give Back U. S. Vessels

WASHINGTON, June 1—(AP)—Russia agreed Monday to return 100 vessels she got from the United States during World War II and made a bid to buy 107 others, but the purchase offer was rejected.

The offer was the only new proposal injected into talks, rejected Monday after a 10-member United States settlement of the old lend-lease program.

Gen. G. B. Hays, the Russian representative, said the 100 vessels were worth \$1,000,000, including 60 ships. The U. S. is in line with a policy of collecting old vessels of the peacetime value of goods which were not destroyed, has offered to settle for \$500,000.

When the talks resumed after a break-off since last August, the Soviet representative brought his best money offer to \$300,000,000. The U. S. previously had rejected the offer, while promising to scale down its demand if the Russians would agree to return 100 ships.

As for the 107 ships, the Soviets said 146 had been accepted or otherwise lost and 171 were unusable for navigation. They offered to return 186 ships.

The Russians rejected a proposal for adjudication by the international court of an American contention that Moscow is in default of the 1946 agreement. The U. S. previously had turned down an earlier American proposal for international arbitration of the entire lend-lease dispute.
