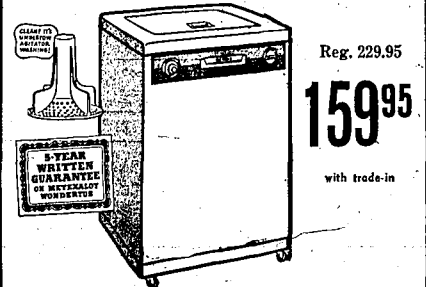

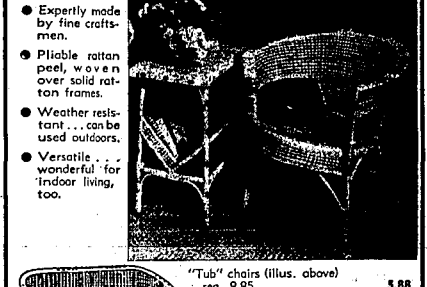

41 Farmers Turn Out to Bale Hay for Farmer Injured Seriously in Machine

Forty-one farmers, neighbors and friends of Harold Brown, who resides southwest of Jerome, left their own busy farms Tuesday and baled and stacked 35 acres of hay at the Brown farm. Brown was injured seriously when his right arm was caught in a hay baler.

Brown has farmed in what is known as Orchard valley three years and farmed north of Gooding since 1928. He was working with his hired man, Lonnie Walker, northwest of the house Sunday afternoon. Brown attempted to insert a string through the rollers and pulled his arm through.

It required about two hours for neighbors to remove Brown's arm from the baler so he could be taken to St. Benedict's hospital, Jerome. It was almost necessary to disassemble the baler to remove the crushed arm from between the rollers which farmers say has a pressure of 2000 pounds. Brown was taken to the hospital in an ambulance.

X-ray pictures of the injured arm were made by a bone specialist at a physicians convention in Sun Valley for examination Tuesday. Brown was reported in fair condition by Mrs. Brown.

Workers on hand Tuesday included at least one man from Hagerman and another from Twin Falls, a fireman on vacation. The hay had already been cut and raked by Brown, his hired man and Brown's daughter, Edna. About 17 women from the area were on hand Tuesday to serve a potluck dinner supplied by most of the women in the area. "Dinner" was served on the lawn.

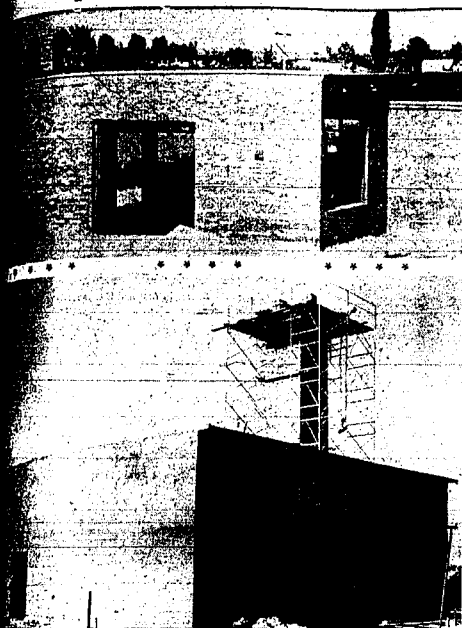

will nearly complete the job. Ninety per cent of the work has been finished on the boiler house. The boilers and hot water generator have been connected. Twenty-five more feet of boiler house chimney remains to be completed. When finished the chimney will tower 66 feet above ground.

Upright concrete foundations for the main buildings are 90 per cent completed. The structural steel is already up for one wing of the main building.

All buildings will be constructed of red and tan brick resulting in a "mottled" effect. Entrances will be done in Utah sandstone. Sun shields will be provided on south elevations to dissipate sun glare.

Plans call for four wings branching off from the main administration building. The structures will extend for approximately three city blocks at the longest point east to west.

Heating will be supplied by a forced hot air system from overhead and a radiant heating system concealed in the floors. The overhead heating systems will double as air conditioning units in warm weather. Various units of the project are

under construction simultaneously. Roofers, masons, plumbers, electricians, steel workers, carpenters, concrete finishers and laborers are employed presently. As many as 60 men have been employed at one time.

Bevan said the contractors have 35 working days in which to finish the project, but hope to finish that considerably. Holmes G. Lash is project architect. T. C. Sorenson is general building superintendent.

House Okays Plan to Ease Radio Ruling

WASHINGTON, June 13.—The house has passed and sent to the senate a bill relieving of defamatory speeches political candidates may make on the radio.

Passage was by voice vote after the house specifically rejected a proposal to let radio stations partly censor political speeches and to hold the radio license for defamatory statements made in such speeches.

The house also refused to approve a bill to let radio stations provide a platform for a candidate associated with one shall not be permitted to deny him a permit to operate a radio station.

Numerous Changes The legislation passed makes numerous changes in the federal communications laws. It is similar to a bill previously passed by the senate but must go back to the senate for action on those changes.

Earl A. Minton, chairman of the Federal Communications commission, said the provisions of the bill would apply to television as well as to radio.

The amendment relieving radio stations from civil or criminal liability for statements made by political candidates was offered by Rep. Howard W. Webb, and adopted by a standing vote of 93 to 27.

Equal Time The amendment also provides that if a station allows radio time to one candidate, it must give comparable time to rival candidates.

There is nothing in the Horgan amendment prohibiting radio stations from refusing time to all candidates.

It prohibits stations from charging more for political speeches than they charge for non-political programs.

Representative O'Hara, R., Minn., questioned whether the senate could nullify the libel laws of the various states by exempting radio stations from them in the case of political speeches.

Sightless Men Try to Regain 146 Lost Cars

GOLCONDA, Ill., June 13.—A blind diver and his sightless steers today sought to raise 146 sunken automobiles from the bottom of the Ohio river.

Diver Bert Cutting and salvage expert Thomas Strickland, both blind—argued they faced "several" miles of dangerous and back-breaking work.

But they were happy and encouraged by their success yesterday when they managed to lift three cars out of the river to dry land.

Part of 150-Car Cargo The three autos were part of a cargo of 150 cars lost during a storm last December when the barge carrying them foundered and wrecked the bottom.

Cutting, a veteran river diver, counted his diving logs and helmet and was lowered into the river where he made his way to the sunken cars, and the triple-deck barge.

He hooked heavy lines onto the sunken cars and the salvage crew, with the aid of a series of blocks and tackle—hoisted them onto a derrick and hauled them ashore.

Thomas Strickland, Jr., who is working with his father to raise the lost cars, said Cutting's blindness made little difference in his underwater work.

"You can't see down there anyway," he said.

Strickland said the steers of the three autos recovered yesterday were in "perfect condition" and could easily be put in running order.

Water pumps were used to flush all air and mud out of the cars, all Plymouths. Their roofs were caved in and upholstery rotted but the tires appeared to be in good shape.
