No Hope Simpson wrote to the Indian bureau officials for persons in the way of federal aid to schools with Indian pupils is planned for 1935 and "only a faint hope exists for anything to be done in 1935."





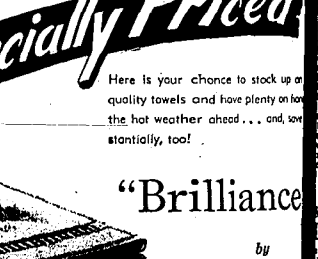

Idaho's Fruit Crop Is Good

BOISE, June 19 (AP)—Idaho peach, pear and cherry production is expected to be larger than last year, the USDA crop reporting service said today.

No spring frost damage and no winter injury to fruit trees was noted this year, the service said. However, considerable rodent damage of Adams county orchards was reported.

Idaho's sweet cherry output is estimated at 4,650 tons, compared with 3,525 tons last year. The sour cherry crop is estimated at 810 tons, compared with 610 in 1951. Idaho and Montana are the only states producing an increased sour cherry production.

The USDA estimated the state's peach crop at 369,000 bushels, only 19,000 bushels more than a year ago, and the pear crop at 75,000 bushels, compared with 56,000 a year ago.

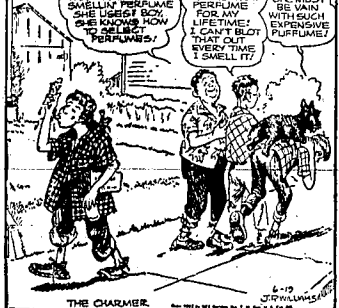

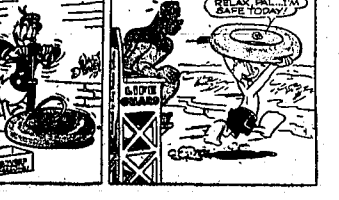

Benefits From Program Seen

BURLINGAME, June 10—Doing their part to back the nation's defense efforts and provide food and fiber for a rapidly increasing population are the stockwater, dust sprays and wells which Casala county stockmen have developed under the conservation program.

In addition to checking erosion and conserving moisture, they are helping to put on more pounds of beef, lamb and wool. Additional watering places result in the animal drinking more water. This increases the rate of gain. There is less trampling, which means more time for grazing and more feed going into grasses rather than being used on the field.

With better distribution of grazing, grass and other forage plants have a better chance to provide adequate range coverage.

One of the best ways to protect soil from washing or blowing is an adequate cover of grass and other plants. Grasses prevent a good vegetative cover breaks the fall of raindrops and keeps them from beating up the surface of the soil. This is known as "splash erosion." There is less puddling of the surface soil and more of the moisture goes into the ground. This in turn helps to increase the growth of the feed on the range.

More water in the ground provides underground sources for springs and seeps. This means more water during times when supplies are short.

All this combines to protect soil against erosion and to build up soil for later production of feed.
