### Wrecker Used to Lift Calf Out Of Crevice Near Canyon Edge

A 300-pound calf was raised without injury from a 35-foot deep crevice along Snake river canyon by Dean Myers, local wrecker operator, Thursday morning. The animal had fallen into the crevice late Wednesday.

OPHELIA THURMAN, owner of the calf, said he found the calf in the bottom of the crevice late Wednesday when he saw its mother running along the rim of the canyon. In previous incidents, several lambs and one calf have fallen into the crevice which separates part of the pasture from the canyon. None of the animals has been killed.

Myers, who hauled the other calf out of the crevice, said after he got the first animal out alive, he never thought it could happen a second time.

Myers has resumed other livestock, including a cow from a crevice and another from an eight-foot deep well.

The crevice in which the calf fell is from a few inches to about six feet wide. At the widest point, the bottom is virtually flat. Men went down with a ladder and tied ropes around the calf and it was ready to be lifted. The calf was raised straight up.

### GI Schooling Rush Ended, Leader Avers

MOSCOW, June 20 (AP)—Summer school enrollment at the University of Idaho reached 472 Thursday and President J. E. Buchanan said the postwar era of fast, non-stop education for the GI has ended.

The 472 figure is a 31 per cent drop from the same date a year ago. Enrollment is expected, however, to reach 500 by the end of the week.

Although the enrollment of regular students is down, it was noted that the university will serve about the same number of people as last year. A total number of more than 1,000 youths attended the GI and Future Farmer of America sessions on the campus.

Buchanan said that following World War II it was necessary to set up summer school with courses in all divisions so the GI in a hurry could continue where he left off in the regular sessions.

"Now," he explained, "the average student wants to work and earn money in the summer as he did in prewar years. Summer session enrollments are back to normal."
