Rejecting all proposed bills for the same past year, the senate approved a bill providing \$567,327,164 for the project. This is \$81,978,911 more than \$485,248,253 previously allowed by the senate.

House Confirms Previous Tentative Vote on Ending Of Most Controls Monday

WASHINGTON, June 26—The house confirmed today its earlier tentative vote to end practically all price controls at midnight Monday. The 1912-1913 recall vote, it approved the so-called Talle amendment to its economic controls bill. The amendment would remove price ceilings on all items not rationed or allocated. No consumer goods are rationed now, and only a few metals are allocated. The action, however, does not necessarily mean this provision will become law. The final controls legislation will be a compromise between the house bill and a senate-approved measure which provides for an eight-month extension of price-wage-rates control, just about their present form.

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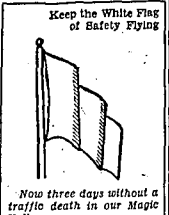

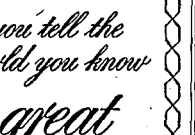

ANTI-INFLATION WEAPONS

Evidently we are on our way out of a period of fairly rigid economic controls, and responsible leaders both in congress and the business world sketch out plans that would open the door to a return to normalcy.

Controls on allocation of materials like rubber, lead, zinc and hides have been either lifted or relaxed. Price limits have been taken off a score of commodities including wool and cotton, which were selling below ceilings. Installation credit restrictions have been wiped out, and similar controls on housing credit have been relaxed.

In this situation, why not abolish controls altogether? The senate recently faced that question and decided against such a course as it would be financially and politically unwise. Defense spending is still rising, and could push prices upward markedly. In an election year, this kind of thing would be hard to explain.

The senate also rejected the "no control" forces and voted an extension of the government machinery until March 1, 1953. They were helped in this action by the fact that the administration has not taken undertaken so many de-control measures; the feeling was widespread that in the succeeding interval the machinery will be used as sparingly as possible.

On this juncture, the Committee for Economic Development, an enlightened business research group whose name was set by Paul Hoffman, now a top adviser to General Eisenhower, has come up with a set of carefully worked-out proposals.

The CED recommends Dec. 31, 1952, as the expiration date for controls authority. It seems to be a reasonable compromise, and its earlier date should not prevail, provided that another CED plan be adopted by congress as a safeguard.

That plan calls upon congress to approve a wide resolution authorizing the president to impose a 90-day freeze of wages and prices whenever a sudden new inflationary crisis should arise. In this manner, believes the CED, the nation could avoid any further or any disastrous upward spirals. In the 90-day period, congress could consider carefully whether to re-establish regular controls machinery.

While the CED's suggested earlier expiration date makes its program more conservative than the senate's, the stop-gap emergency freeze proposed is beyond congressional thinking at this moment. Regardless of the terminal date finally fixed, the 90-day freeze authority would seem to have substantial merit.

The CED's report is useful, too, for the healthy stress it places upon anti-inflationary devices, including a sound tax program, reduced governmental expenditures and especially managed monetary and credit policies. A balance of factors is needed to combat inflation, and too often the fight in congress narrows down to a scrap over wage and price controls.

The important thing, apparently, is to have a veritable arsenal of anti-inflation weapons handy, but not to be trigger-happy.

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TO BAD NEWS FOR SOVIET

From George Sloan, head of the U. S. council of the International Chamber of Commerce, we get a refreshingly optimistic report of the economic condition of western Europe.

Just back from a meeting with foreign businessmen in Paris, Sloan says only Greece and Austria are currently plagued by a critical inflation. In other countries, the new element of stability seems to have entered the picture.

France especially is adjudged to have moved several steps ahead toward a sounder economy. And Sloan found that even Britain was not so bad off as some recent glossy accounts have suggested.

He found a general mood of confidence, a belief that real progress had been made and more soon would be. He discovered, too, that emphasis had been shifted from production to consumption. In other countries, the reconstruction of the need for a broadly stable economic life.

What does Sloan ascribe this improvement?

Primarily to the cumulative effects of American assistance, which has proved sturdy and steady and ample to convince most Europeans that to insure their recovery and to assist them in their real defense against communism.

In this regard, Sloan learned that General Eisenhower had been a great asset. He strengthened morale. He breathed optimism and confidence, and it was infectious.

Sloan indicated, too, that we have been helping out policy in Europe with a sharper aim in recent months. That has been done by deeper understanding of what needed to be done to produce lasting gains in the European economy.

Naturally the continent has benefited also from new leadership among the recipient countries, most particularly from the program of Premier Pinay in France. There are signs, Sloan says, that France is the best government since the war ended.

DR. CARTER'S MENTAL PILLS

Biological man has reached the limit and the line. He can expect no further physical improvement hereafter the road will be running downhill. This new contribution of Dr. George H. Apparently, all the vitamins, amino acids, and other oils, tonics and other modern pharmaceutical compounds will be of no avail against the general degeneration.

What makes these pills particularly hard is the way Dr. Carter stresses the failure of man to get better before reaching his turning-point. Compared with other mammals, homo sapiens has wasted hundreds of thousands of years of evolution. He is still stalling. Take his skin, for example. Man ought to be ashamed of it. Devoid of hair and toughness, it serves neither as clothing nor armor. His teeth are pitifully poor. And his vital organs do not close until he is well along in years.

The cheerful Dr. Carter does not find a bit of hope in the last item. It leaves the animal half retained. He can't continue to develop—for whatever good that may bring.

But the doctor has got some policies mixed up with his science. He says man was doing all right until he had adopted warfare legislation a few years since. Now he is using better food and improved housing, not to mention pills, medicine and surgery, to prolong his useless existence. He is especially negligent in the process of natural selection. That is where the other animals are especially negligent. They pull the rug out from under Dr. Carter. The line has been nearly about for such a drastic change.

ANTI-INFLATION WEAPONS

Evidently we are on our way out of a period of fairly rigid economic controls, and responsible leaders both in congress and the business world sketch out plans that would open the door to a return to normalcy.

Controls on allocation of materials like rubber, lead, zinc and hides have been either lifted or relaxed. Price limits have been taken off a score of commodities including wool and cotton, which were selling below ceilings. Installation credit restrictions have been wiped out, and similar controls on housing credit have been relaxed.

In this situation, why not abolish controls altogether? The senate recently faced that question and decided against such a course as it would be financially and politically unwise. Defense spending is still rising, and could push prices upward markedly. In an election year, this kind of thing would be hard to explain.

The senate also rejected the "no control" forces and voted an extension of the government machinery until March 1, 1953. They were helped in this action by the fact that the administration has not taken undertaken so many de-control measures; the feeling was widespread that in the succeeding interval the machinery will be used as sparingly as possible.

On this juncture, the Committee for Economic Development, an enlightened business research group whose name was set by Paul Hoffman, now a top adviser to General Eisenhower, has come up with a set of carefully worked-out proposals.

The CED recommends Dec. 31, 1952, as the expiration date for controls authority. It seems to be a reasonable compromise, and its earlier date should not prevail, provided that another CED plan be adopted by congress as a safeguard.

That plan calls upon congress to approve a wide resolution authorizing the president to impose a 90-day freeze of wages and prices whenever a sudden new inflationary crisis should arise. In this manner, believes the CED, the nation could avoid any further or any disastrous upward spirals. In the 90-day period, congress could consider carefully whether to re-establish regular controls machinery.

While the CED's suggested earlier expiration date makes its program more conservative than the senate's, the stop-gap emergency freeze proposed is beyond congressional thinking at this moment. Regardless of the terminal date finally fixed, the 90-day freeze authority would seem to have substantial merit.

The CED's report is useful, too, for the healthy stress it places upon anti-inflationary devices, including a sound tax program, reduced governmental expenditures and especially managed monetary and credit policies. A balance of factors is needed to combat inflation, and too often the fight in congress narrows down to a scrap over wage and price controls.

The important thing, apparently, is to have a veritable arsenal of anti-inflation weapons handy, but not to be trigger-happy.

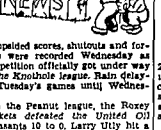

Conclave Site Air Is Posing Hard Problem

By HARMAN W. NICHOLS
WASHINGTON, June 23.—Those political conventions in Chicago next month will be hot affairs, but the air cooling follow-up they have the all-time record.

Never before for a political convention has the air conditioning been a problem. The conditioning people will be pretty hard to calculate the amount of steam coming out of 12,000 persons.

But one outfit, the Carrier corporation, has made a job of it.

The Carrier experts, who provided the cooling system at the International amphitheater, where the meetings will be held, have done some figuring.

They estimate that the body heat let off by the 12,000 persons per second has to be enough to cook more than 15,000 hot dogs an hour. That would be more than enough hot dogs to make it once around.

Could Stale Breathe? The human holoplate, it is estimated, each hour can produce enough heat to make more than 18,000 15-cup steaks.

The engineers have rigged up machines to control humidity as well as cooling comfort.

They estimate that the 12,000 people attending each session for a week would evaporate more than 20,000 gallons of water, which is really sweating it out.

There will be a complete change of air every hour on the hour through the cooling system. That's going to knock relatives away from one of their best chiches—the one about the "smoke-filled hall."

Booms BAH HA! The caucus rooms, though likely to be smoke-filled and also awfully hot, also the great cooling air in some of the ducts carrying air in and out of the place are so large that our sky-high ball-and-socket ball players could walk through the things, side by side, without crowding one another or smothering.

And how much heat does the human body throw out, anyway? Well, the experts say that each person in the hall will throw off heat at the rate of 350 British thermal units per hour. BTU means the amount of heat required to raise the temperature of one pound of water one degree Fahrenheit. The British thought up the term, and our engineers use it now, too.

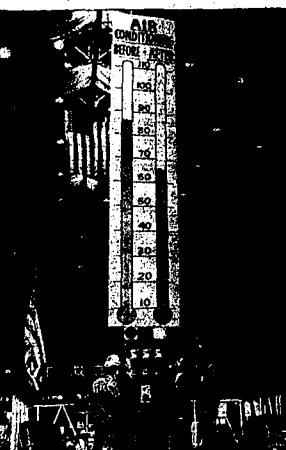

YAKIMA, Wash., June 28 (UP)—The weather was between cherry and what growers in central Washington was over Wednesday—but not the weather.

Only a few days after men quit trying to induce rain artificially, showers feared by cherry growers fell Wednesday, marring the ripe crops in the Yakima and Wenatchee valleys.

Little cherry damage was reported, however. The rain, which ends the cherry id in the fruit is wet too long, was light.

Anti-Rain Exert Works

But the showers sent the cherry men's anti-rain meteorologist, Jack M. Hubbard, Olympia, Wash., scurrying to the Yakima valley with an "anti-rain" which sent his "secret chemicals" spiraling into the sky.

Hubbard claimed that the rain in the heavy cloud formation and the rain on the cherry trees could harm the cherries.

He said he had showed away several other threatening storms the night before.

Elements Unstable

As the rains fell he said "the elements were very lively and posed 'the threat of rain at any moment.' Last week a heavy rain was predicted, but powerful enough to 'dry up the nation.'

The cherry growers here are worried to the heart's content as wheat growers in the Home Haven to the Big Bend country battle rain-making activities contracted with Dr. Irving Krick, Denver, who is conducting a series of tests on the water vapor in the Big Bend region east of Washington and Colorado, and Krick said Wednesday the moisture would increase the yield.

The rain was agreed generally to have been nature's own.

Warren Booklet Explains His Opinions on Major '52 Issues

SACRAMENTO, Calif., June 28 (UP)—Gov. Earl Warren outlined in a booklet today his stand on single party control, P.F.P.C. health insurance, U.M.T. and other major domestic and foreign issues.

With the July 1 Republican presidential nominating convention drawing near, Warren-for-President headquarters in California issued a booklet containing all of the governor's published campaign views.

Differences between Warren's beliefs and those of the two ranking candidates—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Sen. Robert A. Taft—were found in several places.

For example, Warren advocates a federal fair employment practices law while "Ike" has said he favors

determination not to include in deficit spending "except in times of grave national emergency, improved budget-making practices and reorganization of government to end duplication, overlapping and waste."

Warren's stand on other major issues included: Economic controls—The whole idea of artificial controls on the economy of our nation is abhorrent to me. However in times of grave national emergency, controls may be urgently required to maintain economic balance and prevent runaway inflation. We must have the determination and courage to end controls when the emergency ends.

United Nations—The U. N. should be the cornerstone of our foreign policy. Universal military training—Every young man should receive actual training and hold himself in readiness for active service during the

trial. I would not send him away from home to a training camp for a year, or even six months. I would have the program geared to a higher educational program so that in the event of a national emergency he could get back training. He could then return to his own community and receive the remainder of his training through the national guard or organized reserves.

Health insurance—There must be a way to bring good medical care within the economic reach of those people (families that are self-insuring on a modest income). I believe it can be done in each state on the insurance principle, whereby people can prepare for their medical care. The only variation from the (1944 Republican) platform in our proposal is that we did not seek federal aid. We proposed to finance it ourselves.

Federal aid to education—I believe in it. In my own state we have

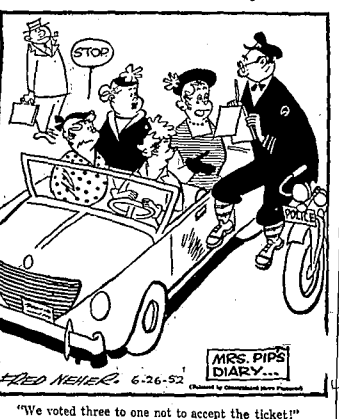

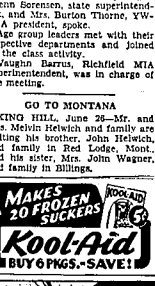

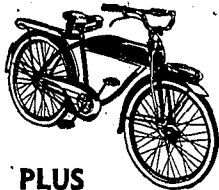
