### Clark Asserts Bombings Not Policy Revise

TOKYO, June 27 (AP)—The U. S. commander-in-chief, Gen. Mark W. Clark, said today the attacks on the communists' Yalu River power plants represented "no change in policy" in the conduct of the Korean war.

In a speech before the Japanese-American society, Clark said the bombings were "military action, resulting from a military decision based on established military policy."

Emphasizing that the targets were in North Korea and the attacks on them represented nothing more than a continuing effort to destroy the military potential of the communist forces in North Korea, he said, he said now "almost 1,000,000."

General Clark departed from his prepared speech to emphasize this point about the Yalu attacks which have created a considerable stir in some London circles.

U. N. Also Girds

The general said that while the communists have used the one-year armistice negotiations to build up their forces and lick their wounds, the U. N. has done the same.

If the communists attack again, he said, "they will regret it."

He said the two years of Korean fighting as "asserted unmistakably to the communists that we are prepared to strike flesh and treasure on stopping aggression."

"We have thrown them out of the territory they coveted to have convenient bases for pressure against Japan," he said.
