35 Planes, 125 Personnel Participate In CAP Air Search Maneuvers Sunday

Targets were located within six hours after takeoff time Sunday by Civil Air Patrol pilots who converged on Twin Falls Sunday to participate in practice CAP air search maneuvers over Magic Valley. The principal target was found in an isolated section north of Bliss.

The search drills attracted more than 35 planes from Hatley, Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Rupert, Idaho, American Falls, Buhl, Boise, Caldwell, Preston and Twin Falls. Some 125 CAP personnel participated in the maneuvers.

CAP personnel taking part in the practice received a grade of 92 per cent of the rating, made by the air rescue service of the U. S. air force, is considered an excellent performance.

The drills had been designated as "Operation Magic Valley." Object was to locate two "downed" aircraft. The "last plane" were represented by cloth targets secretly located Saturday night by a crew under Capt. E. F. Davis who was on hand from McChord air force base, Wash.

Position of the "last plane" was unknown to all CAP personnel when the drills began.

At 8 a. m. all CAP pilots, observers, ground support and communication units assembled for briefing at Justin field. The air search problem was presented.

The first plane left Justin field at 9:50 a. m. Forty air search missions were flown before the "last plane" was discovered in mountainous country northwest of Bliss near Hwy lake.

The "last plane" was discovered by Maj. Ernest Pyle and his observer, both of the Boise CAP wing.

Falls, was the mission commander in charge of the local operation. Lieut. John G. Elliott, Boise, air force liaison officer with the CAP, assisted in this general supervisory level.

Backing up the aerial search from the ground were communication, maintenance, clerical and interrogation units. Cooperating with the ground units were a national guard two-way radio jeep, state police radio car and a mobile ham radio station.

The women of the local CAP auxiliary provided meals for the CAP units participating in the drills.

Lee was elected governor in 1949, defeating Democrat Herbert B. Ma who was seeking a third term. A native of Price, Utah, Lee served six terms as mayor of his home town.

Firm Reports Progress for A-Sub Engine

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., June 29—Under contract with the atomic energy commission and the navy department, the Westinghouse Electric corporation is building both the nuclear reactor—under construction—and the associated propulsion equipment for the USS Nautilus, atomic-powered submarine whose keel was laid June 14 at Groton, Conn.

Although the work has been cloaked in secrecy, Westinghouse reports "considerable progress" in the atomic plant.

President Truman, Dwight D. Price, president of Westinghouse, and other distinguished guests attended the ceremony. The submarine will be built by the Electric Boat division of the General Dynamics corporation.

The key design came three and one-half years after Westinghouse was awarded the job of building the atomic engine for the U. S. Navy. The design is being carried out by the Atomic Energy National Laboratory of the commission and Westinghouse.

Research, design, and production work is going on today at the Groton plant. The reactor is a "land-based prototype" of the atomic engine is being built at the reactor location in Groton, Conn. This experimental model is the basic pattern for the unit to be installed in the Nautilus.

The land-based prototype consists of a reactor located in a building, the water for extracting heat from the reactor, and the means for converting this heat into electricity.

This steam propulsion system follows marine practice except for pressure taken to reduce dimensions and weight.

Work now already has produced a number of first-grade technical accomplishments that are side by side with the reactor. These include development of new materials, increased efficiency in the fields of corrosion and heat transmission.

One of the toughest problems of design of this nuclear power plant, was to find suitable materials that would stand up to the heat of the reactor. These materials must have the proper strength at the operating temperatures, they must not deteriorate under intense radiation, they must not be attacked by the products of the reaction. Every material used, every part built, must be examined with the light of the unusual operating conditions. This means that the behavior of conventional materials and also of strange new materials which they are exposed to nuclear radiation, and when they are subjected to other heretofore unknown conditions.

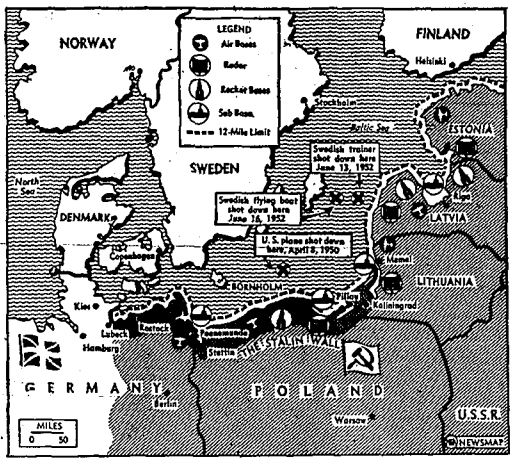

Russia's Aim: Baltic Sea Into Soviet Lake



The recent shooting down of two Swedish planes by Russian jet fighters underlines the long-reported efforts of Russia to turn the Baltic sea into a private Russian lake. Latest of these reports come from a Hamburg, Germany, newspaper, which says the Russians are constructing a tremendous "Stalin wall" (dark-shaded area) of military and naval bases along the coast east of Germany. In this heavily fortified zone are automatic, radar, rocket and aircraft installations. The Russians have also declared that Soviet territorial waters extend for 12 miles, in contrast to the internationally accepted three-mile limit.

Some Chain Stores Cashing in On "Easy" Installment Buying

NEW YORK, June 30—Some chain stores are cashing in on the free and easy installment buying made possible by the recent easing of government curbs on credit. Dealers in major appliances, furniture and late-model used cars report mildly gratifying results. Easy credit, however, has not been a great spur to the nation's big department stores.

And home builders and real estate brokers are far from happy about the new and less stringent federal brakes on mortgage lending. They don't think the modification was broad enough.

That's the picture shown by an Associated Press survey of business reaction in 15 major cities to the lifting of regulation W and the relaxation of regulation X. Regulation W, which controls installment credit, was suspended May 2. Regulation X, which determines how big a down payment you must make on a new house, was liberalized June 1. The two moves were widely interpreted as an economic shock-in-the-arm for lagging sales.

seen hesitant about taking full advantage of their new freedom from credit curbs. Under "W" purchasers of post-war cars had to plunk down one third in cash, with 18 months to pay. Today, although the new limit, finance companies and most dealers are still demanding 25 to 30 per cent down and 24 months to pay.

Home builders and real estate people, who have been complaining of slow sales for several months, apparently expect little help from the recent easing of regulation X. Many complain that the effect has been practically nil on the type of housing in greatest demand—homes in the \$8,000 to \$10,000 range.

Roland Thompson, a director of the St. Paul, Minn., board of realtors, says: "In this part of the country you just can't build a house worth enough to live in for less than \$10,000."

The new rule on regulation X provides for a substantial reduction in the required down payment on a new house costing \$7,000 or less. In the case of a \$12,000 house, the reduction amounts to only a few dollars. New homes are reported showing scant and unaided in Atlanta. Roy Carey, executive vice president of the Los Angeles Builders Institute, comments: "There hasn't been any increase in sales and we don't expect any."

New Idaho Highway Board Looks Back Over First Year, Finds Results Good

By TOM ADAMS
 June 29 (AP)—Idaho's highway board is one year old Tuesday.

The three-man board—directed by Legislature to keep politics out of highway building—look over its job today. One of the first things it was to do was to halt some projects which the Legislature had authorized and better roads.

Highway Engineer Zarin Miller thinks the incident illustrates the difference a year can make. The board found many state projects being spent on so many different roads that it was in danger of losing the money. If the funds are spent within three years after state sets them, they revert to the federal aid program.

The board shifts state government funds 60 per cent of the money to highway projects.

Miller says, Idaho's roads being built on a long range plan. It will remain a 10-year program since it is projected to cost \$147,000,000 worth of roads being built in the next 10 years.

The board's immediate concern has been building roads, the plan it has seen it also make these changes in the department, according to Miller.

The department has been reorganized under five headings: Planning, administration, engineering, construction and maintenance. Within this framework, jobs have been defined and classified and salaries set under a merit system. Miller says salaries are increased on merit only. One of the chief reasons for the merit system with set salaries is to attract young engineers to the department.

A permit engineer has been designated to issue permits for overweight and overwidth loads. Previously, any secretary who happened to be at the desk gave the permits. All district offices have been linked by radio and the different offices in the department, once scattered all over the state, have been consolidated in a downtown building.

Counties have been asked to do their own engineering work on county roads, and some have employed consulting engineers to work on state roads.

The first contract has been let for maintenance work. If this experiment proves successful, more maintenance contracts will be let. Miller says the roads are in such bad shape that state crews can't do all the repair work.

Outside technical help has been employed. The state now has some engineers studying the geology of the country near Horseshoe bend to try and find the answer to shifts in the earth which knock out large sections of highway each year.

Aerial photography is being used on a larger scale. A thousand miles of highway routes will be photographed this year.

A safety engineer has been hired. Miller thinks he will more than pay his salary in fewer accidents, that by lowering insurance costs.

Although the study isn't followed to the letter, the program is aimed at bringing that 50 per cent of the mileage up to "reasonable" standards. That does not mean just those 1,301 miles will be constructed in the next 10 years. Other stretches undoubtedly will become more critical and require attention first.

The board—Chairman Roscoe Rich, Burley; Leonard Pison, Orofino; and Fletcher Ellsworth, Idaho Falls—meets once a month. When a delegation tells it about the poor condition of a certain stretch of road, the board can refer to the sufficiency report and either agree or point out that others are in a lot worse shape.

Using the study, road needs and long range program as a guide, the board draws up its program a year in advance.

The board is primarily a policy-making board. Miller handles the day-to-day administration.

While the board's immediate concern has been building roads, the plan it has seen it also make these changes in the department, according to Miller.

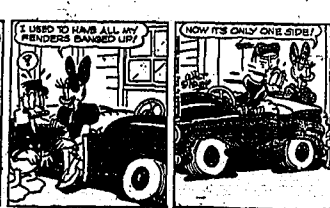

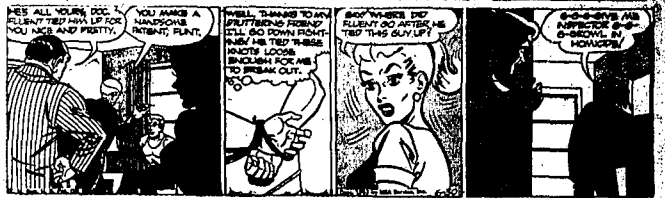

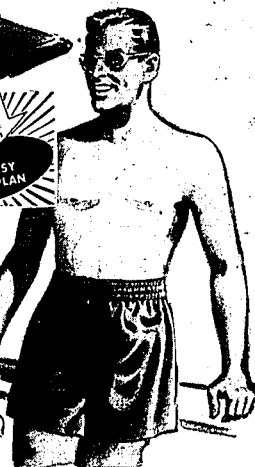
