Insect Pests Are Located in Blaine

HAYLEY, July 3—James Wheeler, Blaine county agricultural agent, brought in specimen of caterpillars from the desert this week. Wheeler says they are plentiful in the sage brush land of the county and can be found on the ground underneath the brush. They are harmless, he said, living on a wire weed found in sagebrush land. Wheeler also reports that approximately 7,500 acres in the county are affected by crickets but that no material damage is expected. Grasshoppers will cause some damage, he said, as there are many more than usual. The Kilpatrick ranch in the Pico area already has done considerable spraying for the pest, he added.

HOUSTON, Tex., July 3—The first of 35,000 small children queued up outside eight clinics here to begin a mass test of a serum which may help poliovirus of its punch—death and paralysis. Meanwhile, the nation's worst polio epidemic raged unabated in Houston. On the eve of the first big experiment with the unproved serum, gamma globulin, which doctors hope will prevent paralysis and death in polio, the Texas health department reported that polio cases skyrocketed last week in Texas to a second record high within 14 days. There were 206 cases reported.

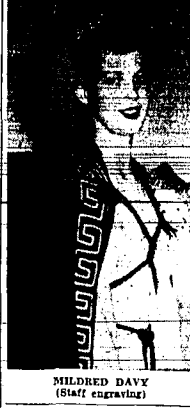

Referring back to Harold Ickes and "Cap" Krug as non-westerners, Horsley says that even the present secretary, Oscar Chapman, "doesn't really speak for the west." Chapman is a native of Virginia who spent several years in Denver for his health as a young man.

Horsley has been visiting with the four members of the Idaho constitutional delegation and reports: "I find complete harmony and unity between them, and I feel the state of Idaho is represented by one of the strongest delegations in history."

"I'm very proud of our delegation because of its stand on Helms canyon. The Republican administration in Idaho is vitally interested in preserving the use of Snake river water for our farmers and in having downer sites developed by private enterprise."

Mrs. Horsley is with him on the trip. They have a daughter, Mrs. Alfred C. Gordon, who is the wife of an attorney here.
