Probe Sought In Cash Deal Of Legislator

WASHINGTON, July 4 (AP)—Sen. Herman Walker today demanded a full and complete senate investigation of a \$600 payment by the U.S. Treasury to Walter E. Coughlin.

The Idaho Republican, a member of the senate elections subcommittee, told members he will consult with Coughlin if that payment, which was revealed during the TREC inquiry last year by a senate banking subcommittee.

The subject was brought up yesterday by Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R. Wis., senate's chief foe, who mentioned the payment in charging before the subcommittee that Benton harbored and aided neo-fascist activities.

Benton denied all of McCarthy's charges in a public hearing session. He conceded that he did not receive the \$600 payment on his campaign contribution reports and acknowledged that it may not have been reported on his income tax returns.

Benton said Coughlin gave him the money to pay the public printer for reprints of Benton's speeches on issues in which Coughlin was interested, and wanted to have circulation.

Clear Reported But Coughlin, who claimed frequently that Benton was not satisfied with this explanation.

Benton's defense was admissible, he told newspaper, "a charge of unlawful campaign expenditure could never be proven."

Benton conceded that Coughlin had the \$600 as a campaign contribution. He noted that Coughlin made the statement at the end of a hard day on the witness stand.

McCarthy's testimony stemmed from his resolution calling for a full-scale inquiry into Benton's activities during the long term of his senate career.

### Better Check on Your Precinct Before Aug. 9; Many Changed Under New Laws

 "BOYS," July 4.—Are you registered to vote in Idaho's Aug. 12 primary? Don't be too sure. Your precinct may have moved.

Atty.-Gen. Robert E. Smylie, Thursday said a new law passed by the 1951 legislature requiring county commissioners to redefine precinct boundaries so each contains no more than 600 registered voters has necessitated widespread changes in nearly every county.

Previous laws set 600 as the limit for each precinct, but left the redefining to the discretion of the county commissioners. The new law makes the redefinition of precinct boundaries mandatory.

Smylie said as a result many people who have lived in the same precinct for several years and were previously registered under Idaho's confusing registration system are now in different precincts. Consequently they are eligible to vote until registered in their new precinct.

Smylie urged all Idahoans to check before the Aug. 9 registration deadline to make sure they are properly registered in their correct precinct.

He estimated that the new boundary changes would result in addition of 100 or more precincts in the state. Ada county, for example, was increased by nearly 20 precincts.

The 1951 legislature "made probably more changes in election laws than any other recent legislature," Smylie said.

As a result counties will be required to obtain a host of new ballot boxes. Because of a contest in sealing a Kootenai county representative in 1951, a special house committee recommended that election judges be responsible for delivering sealed ballots to county clerks who are required to keep them sealed in a secure place for eight months.

"This means, Smylie said, that

each county will have to have a duplicate set of ballot boxes—one for the primary election and one for the general election. There's only three months difference between the two elections, and the primary ballots will have to be retained until after the general election.

The perforated ballot, established by the 1931 legislature for the primary election, also will require additional ballot boxes. Voters will be given a ballot perforated down the center with Democratic candidates on one side and Republicans on the other.

He is to vote for candidates on only one side of the perforation, but is required to drop both halves of the ballot in separate boxes—one to be counted and the other to be discarded.

Smylie advised voters to use caution to make sure they don't discard the wrong half of the ballot. Those deposited in one ballot box will not be counted, even though they may be marked, Smylie said.

"The perforated ballot will have the effect of disenfranchising a lot of voters," Smylie said. A 1949 change in the election laws also is causing considerable confusion among some registrars, Smylie said. The 1949 legislature provided that a man or his wife could register for both. Some registrars are still refusing to register both voters, Smylie said.

Election judges will go to school this year and be briefed on election procedures, he said. They will be paid \$3 for attending the school to be conducted by prosecuting attorneys of each county.

Smylie said his office is preparing a pamphlet explaining the laws. It will be used by prosecutors as a guide in informing election judges. Another 1951 change in the election laws provides that the precinct name and number must be marked clearly on each ballot box.

### 35 New Autos Recovered by Salvage Diver

GOLCONDA, Ill., July 4 (AP)—The boxes of a major salvage operation said today some of the 35 new autos recovered from the Ohio river depth have been "put in good running shape" and are being driven to a Detroit buyer.

The salvaged autos were among 150 Plymouth, Dodge and Lincoln cars which sank with a transport barge during a storm last December.

Thomas Strickland, sr., whose construction company is handling the job, said an auto refurbisher in Detroit has agreed to buy every car recovered. He said he expected to receive about \$800 a car.

"A local garage has cleaned up the water damage and oiled about 4 cars," he said. "They may not look like much but the engines run like a charm. A couple of the cars are towing some of the others to Detroit."

Under the direction of Strickland, who has been blind for 14 years, and his diver, Bert Cutting, also sightless for 43 of his 83 years, the job was started three weeks ago.

Another company abandoned the first salvage attempt last February after hoisting one battered, water-logged and mud-filled Dodge sedan.

### Cassia Benefits In Water Plans

SHRUBOAK, July 4.—Here in Cassia county conservation of water resources is being increasingly recognized as an essential part of soil conservation. Ralph Goring, chairman of the Cassia county PMA committee, reports. Farmers who have carried out water conserving practices under the agricultural conservation program find that measuring tanks to make better use of available water adds up to better land use and increased production.

Although no figures are available on the exact increases to production resulting from water conserving practices, there are enough examples of increased yields to show that results are significant, Goring said.

He points out that experience indicates conservation is more than just keeping land from washing and blowing away and water from being wasted. The aim is to protect and improve the sources of food supplies just to maintain present levels of production, to keep the land from becoming less productive through erosion and depletion, is not enough, he said. That would mean that new land would have to be brought into use to take care of increase in population.

Since there isn't that much new land the increase in production must come from the land now being farmed.

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Price Drop Is Predicted for Fruit in U.S.

WASHINGTON, July 4 (AP)—The U.S. fruit industry is in for up and down this year.

The agriculture department predicted yesterday that the non-citrus fruit crop will be slightly smaller than last year, and that prices to growers will decline.

But it said a record amount of frozen citrus fruits will be canned in California.

Meanwhile, Sen. Sprossard is holding a hearing on the citrus industry and it will be impossible to get action on legislation granting funds for such an inquiry.

The agriculture department said large backlogs of canned fruits and reduction in military demand are expected to reduce local demand for non-citrus products from canners.

This will result, the department says, in somewhat lower prices for most major domestic fruits and a probable small reduction in the total amount canned, despite the forecast decline in the citrus crop.

But the department said the sweet cherry crop will be "much larger" than last year's and the pear crop "greatly larger" and the pear crop "about the same."

Conservationist Says Lincoln County "Fortunate" for Light Flood Damages

SHOSHONE, July 4.—Lincoln county residents can consider themselves fortunate in not having more flood damage when it is estimated that over 2,500 acres were covered with water.

Most of this area was rough, lava-flow land used for range and was benefited by the deposit of silt and mud.
