# Planet Venus Bill Hidden, Expert Notes

 brilliant-planet Venus, which  
 disappeared in the rays of  
 the sun only a few minutes  
 after sunset and is still invis-  
 ible to us. It will be a few  
 weeks before it is seen again  
 in the western sky.  
 The planet Mercury is now sink-  
 ing into the horizon in the  
 west about an hour after the  
 sun disappears.  
 But it is not far  
 placed far observation. It  
 is a slightly better position  
 from now.  
 Planets Mars and Saturn are  
 also on each side of the  
 equator. Looking toward the  
 east at nightfall we see the  
 stars evenly spaced post-  
 most in a line. Saturn is  
 to the right, Spica next,  
 Mars farther to the right. But  
 the stars are of about equal  
 size. Mars is considerably  
 larger and of a distinctly reddish  
 color. The star Spica is still  
 close to Saturn.  
 Jupiter Visible  
 early rises the planet Jupi-  
 ter in the east north-  
 west three hours before the  
 sun by sunrise is high in the  
 east.

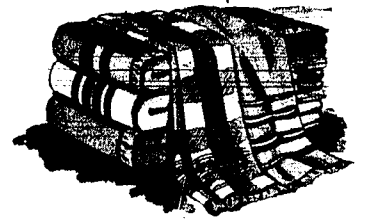

As applied to government we can find waste and corruption in small and decentralized systems. The "House" committee report on administrative management criticizes decentralized authority in the federal government and recommends "unbroken lines of command."
