Of the total, 356 died in traffic, 176 drowned, seven died in plane crashes, two from fireworks and 72 in miscellaneous accidents.

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### New Uprising For Prison Is Over Quickly

JACKSON, Mich., July 7 (AP)—A new uprising was quelled quickly at Southern Michigan prison Sunday night after 150 rioting convicts seized two hostages and won concessions from prison officials.

One rioter was wounded by buckshot fired by state police, stationed at the prison since the wild revolt of three months ago. The rioters fired a few shotgun blasts into the rioting cellblock in their first move to restore order.

The hostages, both prison guards, were released unharmed after state police withdrew and prison authorities agreed to ease three restrictions in force since the previous mutiny.

It was in this same prison, the world's largest walled prison, that one convict was killed, eight others wounded and a million dollars worth of prison property destroyed by a four-day riot last April 20-24.

Fearful that the new riot might spread over the prison, Warden Julian Phillips ordered that all prisoners be fed in shifts, that all inmates be locked in their cells for the day and all prison industries be closed.

The April riot sparked a general revolt among the prisoners. But Sunday's riot was confined to only 140 of the 6,000 convicts in the huge institution.

The most tense moment in the new revolt came when rioters shouted they would throw the two hostage guards off a fifth story cellblock balcony to the concrete floor below if state police failed to yield. The rioters drew back.

Before that, in their first move into the cellblock of club-wielding inmates, they fired an estimated 50 to 100 shotgun blasts.

Convict Carl Bradford, 34, a Detroit Negro, serving one to four years for larceny, fell wounded.

He is survived by his widow; one daughter, Mrs. Bessie Johnson; two step-sons, Walter Johnson and George A. Johnson, both Buhl; one step-daughter, Mrs. Anne James, also Garfield, Utah, and two grandchildren, a sister, Mrs. Pearl Young, Lorenzo, also survives.

The body rests at the Albertson funeral home pending word from relatives.

### Boyle Opines Patton Tank Is Tops, Warns of Complacency

By HAL BOYLE

NEW YORK, July 7 (AP)—The boast of many an American soldier, going down from the tall tales of heroes, would have looked with wry amazement at a U. S. Army ceremony this week.

It was the demonstration of the mighty new Patton 48 tank.

"Gee, that was the kind of tank I had in mind when I used to dream of before I was killed in Tunisia," one soldier said.

"Yeah, we talked about having a tank like that before I died in the battle of the Belgian bulge," replies his spectral buddy. "Boy, look at that gun it packs—and its low silhouette."

"Yep," says the first soldier. "It's got almost the same lines as the German tank that ambushed the crate I got hit in back in 1942. And if the heroic dead bear any illwill, one couldn't blame the two spectral tankmen for resenting the fact their country gave them no such tank to fight in when they were among the living."

Army Secretary Frank C. Pace hailed the powerful new 48-ton Patton as "the finest medium tank in the world."

"If battle tests prove this claim true, it is encouraging. For many veteran tank men hold that American armor was inferior in design, crew protection, and hitting power, as compared to both German and Russian armor, in World War II.

But this brilliant new weapon is said to be put in real mass production, and it soon will be 11 years after Pearl Harbor.

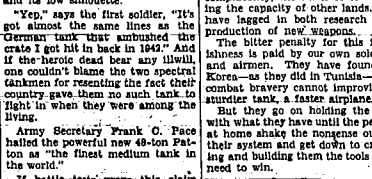
"This situation points up the danger of two civilian legends that have long hampered American military power—and cost us needless casualties."

1.—The squirrel gun legend—"It war comes 10,000,000 Americans will grab grandpa's old squirrel gun off the mantel, and repel the invader."

2.—The King-Kong legend—"We are the most inventive people in the world, and we can turn out newer and better weapons faster than any possible group of enemies."

Both of these legends are relics of America's bold frontier past, but neither holds true in the middle half of the twentieth century.

No civilian nation can spring its arms with squirrel guns any more and win a modern war. It is a



perilous tradition, this 19th century hangover in our thinking that we can hold off an enemy with out-of-date weapons while we quickly gear up and turn out better ones. Wars today move too fast.

As for the legend that Americans are the most inventive race, the facts simply don't bear it out—at least on the battlefield. The Germans produced the best submarines, tanks and all-purpose artillery guns in the last war. They put the first jet planes in the air, the first guided missiles—rockets and buzz bombs.

Our real genius has been in the field of mass production. But today the Russians have more and speedier jet planes in Korean skies than we have, prove that their industrial revolution has gone along perhaps as fast as their social revolution.

The greatest military enemy the American people have is their own complacency, the habit of low-raising the capacity of other lands. We have lagged in both research and production of new weapons.

The bitter penalty for this foolishness is paid by our own soldiers and airmen. They have found in Korea—as they did in Tunisia—that combat bravery cannot improvise a tank or a jet airplane.

But they go on holding the line with what they have until the people at home shake the nonsense out of their system and get down to creating and building them the tools they need to win.

### Greater Heat Predicted for Month of July

WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—That June heat wave really was almost branding the month one of the hottest in all history for many places.

And weathermen say all July likely will be hotter than normal in most of the nation.

Records of the U. S. weather bureau show that the average temperature in June was the hottest in history for a long list of areas. For a few it probably was the hottest 30 days, regardless of month, ever recorded. Also the last week in June, when heat reached its peak in most places, apparently set some new seven-day records for day-after-day heat.

The hottest time and place in the heat wave country was 108 at Malden, Mo., June 28, on the basis of official U. S. weather bureau temperatures that have reached the Washington weather office. There were higher readings in Death Valley and in Arizona and some other southwestern places. These were not normal for these regions, which weren't considered to be in the grip of the unusual heat wave. It was 111 at Yuma, Ariz., on June 18 and 112 at Presidio, Tex.

Most of the eastern United States felt the heat wave at some time in June.

These new high-reading records for June were reported: North Platte, Neb., 107, highest in 77 years; Wilmington, N. C., 104, highest in 85 years; New York, 101, highest in 21 years.

In St. Louis it was over 100 for six days and reached 104 on June 27 and 28.
