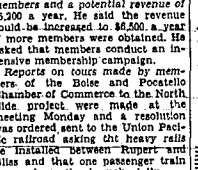

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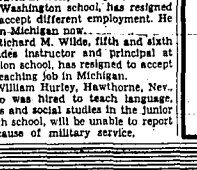
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### Doctor Given Jail Reprieve For Tax Case

### Cherished Convention Traditions Are Kept as '52 Version Opens 'Way Late

CONVENTION HALL, Chicago, July 8 (AP)—Two cherished political traditions have been preserved: The Republican national convention started way late, and the election came on "Dixie."

As the clock ticks away, politicians, who have four years to get ready for when this convention arrives, but they are not ready.

"This year, the Republicans said, would be different."

On the front of their program they bravely pronounced: "Because of radio and television commentaries, all sessions of convention must commence on time."

Just to illustrate how earnest they were, the starting time, 11:30 a. m., arrived and nobody made the slightest move to get the show going. There was only one false alarm. At 11:30 the sergeant-at-arms came racing down the long ramp that leads to the convention hall. Turned out all he wanted to do was show away some photographers.

As every musician knows, nothing makes a crowd like "Dixie." That goes double in corporate for politicians. It even will get a cheer from North Dakota Republicans.

But except for "Dixie" and "California, Here We Come" and the two organists, Bill McManis and Harold Anderson, mostly stayed away from cheer-making music, maybe they felt that with all the leading going on between Eisenhower and Taft supporters that the Republicans really need is something. Incidentally, you'll get some idea of the size of this huge gathering from the fact that the organ is at the far head of the hall, and the organists' spotlights, A. W. Harrison, keeps track of what's going on with binoculars. Anyone who has seen a circus will have a pretty good idea of how a convention is born.

An hour before the scheduled start the place was almost empty. Sen. Henry Cain, Wash., was running up and down the speaker's platform, a worrying. Speakers read their speeches from a gadget called a "teleprompter" which rolls it off in big type about four feet in front of the microphones.

THE STRIKE WEAPON

For some time we have been scripping along with a slim output of steel. Inevitably the nation will suffer. And that includes the steel workers themselves.

Every time a major strike occurs, some enterprising fellow always takes up the economic losses in output, wages, profits and so on. The bill is generally staggering.

Maybe the time will come when we will regard these losses as too great to bear. In the complex state of our industrial organization, in the precarious state of our relations with the communist world, time is of supreme value.

That time spells money in workers' pockets and in the balance sheets of business.

It spells in this instance steel for guns and tanks and automobiles and ice boxes. We will make these things again at the scheduled rates envisioned by our business and military leaders.

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TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

CHICAGO—Top Republican strategists here have awakened to the realization that their party must move slightly leftward, if it expects to survive by dislodging the Democrats from Washington next November.

Both the Taft and Eisenhower factions are agreed upon that general principle, although disagreeing on details. President Truman in their opinion has made a mistake.

BIGNIFICANCE—It is not without significance that Andrew Jackson's highest esteem was an other American President, and that the man in the white House is an authority on the "his which saw the birth of the theory that "the victors belong the spoils."

It is a belated recognition of Truman's plan which lies behind the solid and persistent opposition of southern conservative groups on Capitol Hill and to his continued control of the party.

Andrew Jackson destroyed the south's influence in congress and in the party by turning to the backwoods and artisans for support, so Truman has pitched his appeal to an even more motley but numerically powerful coalition of votes.

### Mathematical Wizard Can Extract Cube Roots, but Can't Balance Own Budget

By HARMAN W. NICHOLS  
WASHINGTON, July 8.—A smart photographer who claimed to know a lot about mathematics spent about an hour trying to figure out the cube root of 35,911.

Shankuntala Devi, a mathematical wizard from India, took one look at the "big figure" and said: "That's easy. The answer is 33."

The 21-year-old Indian girl has just returned from a tour of Europe where she astonished many minds with her genius. The other day, before she held her first press conference in this country, she stumped university mathematics experts in the Washington area.

She extracted cube roots of eight and 10 numbers in less than a second, and performed unusual multiplication feats—all without pencil or paper.

Tell her your birthday and the year—no matter how far back it goes, and she'll give you the day of the week.

Before she left India for a two-year trip through Europe, she had finished her sophomore year in college. She specialized in physics, chemistry, and mathematics (she failed in English, twice).

Shankuntala discovered she could handle figures and that she had photographic memory when she was 17 years old.

The "marvel" newspaper men, most of whom can't add up an expense account, teled in vain to stump the girl with high figures.

When she was in Britain, the British broadcasting company put her on a television show. The interviewer, one Leslie Mitchell, asked her to give the roots of a number of figures, which she did accurately.

The BBC had figured out some dances for her. She protested a couple on the grounds that the answers figured out laboriously in advance by broadcasting "experts" were not correct. They weren't, either.

Later the BBC admitted that its math men had gotten most of their figures from a reckoner. These were correct. The ones they thought up were wrong.

She has no trouble juggling figures, but she is a little puzzled when a reporter asked her if she thought she could halve the "United States budget."

She said she wouldn't like to tackle anything that difficult.

"I'll stick to the roots," she added.

"How about a decontrolled grocery bill?" another reporter asked her. "I can't figure out my own bank account," she confessed.

The 20th root of a 42-digit figure is just play for the girl from India.

### Expert Notes U. S. Uranium Supply Okay

POCAATELLO, July 8 (AP)—The United States has the uranium and the capacity available for carrying out a four billion dollar expansion in atomic energy development, an atomic energy seminar was told Tuesday.

Morse Salisbury, director of information for the atomic energy commission, said "through a number of recent developments, we have assured ourselves of a uranium ore supply sufficient to support an expansion of this magnitude."

He also told the seminar that studies by the department of defense have assured that a real military need exists for atomic weapons which would be produced by the expansion. The proposed expansion would double the existing AEC program.

Salisbury said uranium is not a rare element as it is several times more plentiful than gold. However, it does not occur frequently in concentrated deposits. He said new finds keep turning up in Colorado, Utah, New Mexico and Arizona.

He said research is being conducted to extract uranium as a by-product of lead and zinc production. There are vast phosphate beds in southeastern Idaho.

Salisbury lauded the AEC's procurement program and praised cooperation of the federal bureau of investigation in preventing a leak of atomic secrets to enemy countries.

He said the U. S. is still proposing to bring atomic energy under international control. However, the cause of peace and safety, the threat of catastrophic war. We have been unsuccessful so far because of Soviet intransigence. We continue to hope that reason will prevail; that a fool-proof, rascal-proof, enforceable system of control will be adopted and put into effect."

The doctors tell us that we grow fat when we eat more than we need and we are among the heaviest. We know this is true for most people, for all except the few who have defective nutritional systems.

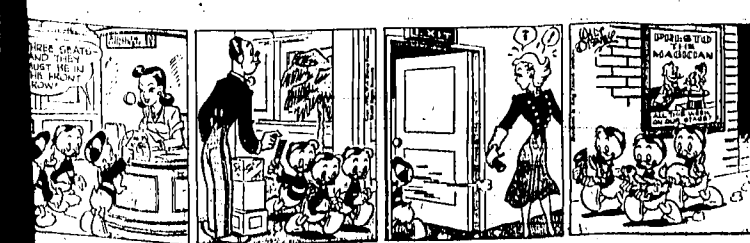

grim warnings of the disaster of a possible total war.

They witness, instead, only a ceaseless effort to spend and spend, to tax and tax, only a callous indifference to mounting disclosures of graft and corruption and waste in the public administration.

The religious devotion of the American people which has produced the universal respect for the spirit of the American has been outraged by the materialism and selfishness which dominates the national administration.

That party (the Democratic party) of noble heritage has become captive to the schemers and plotters who have infiltrated its ranks of leadership to set the national course unerringly toward scientific regimentation of a totalitarian state.

Foreign policy has been as tragically in error as has domestic policy. We practically invited Soviet domination over the free peoples of eastern Europe through strategic dispositions of Soviet force at the close of the European war. . . . In the east, we gave over to Soviet control the industrial resources of Manchuria, the area of North Korea and the territories pointed at the heart of the Japanese home islands. We condemned our faithful wartime ally, the Chinese people, to the subjugation of a communist tyranny. It is fatal to enter any war without the will to win it.

We defeated the North Korean army; but when the communist armies of China struck our leaders lacked the courage to fight to a military decision, even though victory was then readily within our grasp.

Korea stands today as the hallowed graveyard for countless American dead. We must not let it become as well a graveyard for American honor.

In Europe, and indeed throughout the world, our foreign policy approach has been equally as vacillating and negative and, for the most part, sad indeed to relate, under the domination of others.

"Our 'good neighbor' policy with respect to the peoples of Central and South America of greater strategic concern than all others—has been largely subordinated to the materialistic attitude which has dominated our material

for the Russians and setting this nation's course unerringly toward the scientific regimentation of a totalitarian state.

2. The Republicans have a golden opportunity in the November election to elect Americans with no distinctions of race, creed or political affiliation in a crusade for peace, prosperity and tranquility.

And, said MacArthur, "if the Republicans will do it, we have God's blessing."

The general came before the second session of the party's angrily split nominating convention with political overtones crackling around him.

Though he decries he wants no office himself, he has been mentioned as a possible compromise candidate for the presidency should Taft and Eisenhower knock each other out. He's also been talked of as a vice presidential candidate, should Taft win the top spot, the ticket.

MacArthur has declared his support of Taft and has backed out indirectly at Eisenhower.

But MacArthur carefully avoided assistance abroad, we have promoted as much weakness as strength, as much resentment as friendship.

The administration is obsessed by the idea that we can spend ourselves into a position of leadership abroad, just as it believes we can spend ourselves into prosperity at home.

Rarely has the present administration made a major move calculated to strengthen the fabric of world peace. To the contrary, it has done much to advance the danger of global strife. . . .

This is the greatest tragedy of all—that a national administration could have so yielded to the disease of power as to betray the youth of America.

In particular he hit at what he called the administration's "pattern of security agreements."

"These, he said, have divided the world into armed camps and have left this country dependent on the foreign policy and diplomatic moves of its allies 'without as yet having mounted either the will or the physical power to successfully meet aggression.'"

Eisenhower is a champion of collective security and until recently headed the combined U. S. European defense force in Europe.

Taft has urged reliance on development of U. S. air power and the so-called too many generals depend too much on ground troops. But MacArthur did not name either Eisenhower or Taft. Nor did he refer to the bitter fight between the two for the nomination—a fight that receded only a short time before the general spoke.

Instead his keynote scorched the Truman administration on domestic and foreign political alike. It was President Truman who fired him more than a year ago as supreme commander in the far east.

MacArthur has five delegate votes for the GOP presidential nomination himself and has been mentioned as a possible running mate for Taft, if the Ohio senator wins the top spot later.

In his address, MacArthur predicted victory for the Republicans in "the coming crusade to rechart

the nation's course toward peace and security and prosperity" through "a reformation of its willard faith."

Therein, he cried, "lies the Republican party's challenge to leadership."

The five-star general was relentless and detailed in his attack on the administration.

He said resentment at its actions is pouring from the hearts of the American people from north to south, east to west, with no distinction of race, creed, color or political affiliation.

He blamed the label of "the war party" on the Democrats, then assailed them for falling even to seek in Korea this country's traditional military goal of victory.

"Our people," MacArthur said, "are desperate for a plan which will revive hope and restore faith as they feel the oppressive burden of the tax levy upon every source of revenue and upon every property transaction; as they see the astronomical rising public debt heavily mortgaging the industry, the well-being and the opportunity of our children and our children's children; as they observe the rising costs of the necessities of life impairing the effectiveness of pensions, insurance and other fixed incomes and reducing the aged and infirm to appalling circumstances."

MacArthur's words grew more impassioned and other fixed incomes and more castigating as he went on.

The American people, he said, ask for leadership and wise counsel but they witness instead only a ceaseless effort to spend and spend, to tax and tax, only a callous indifference to mounting disclosures of graft and corruption and waste in the public administration.

Then he said, after paying tribute to what he called the high principles of the Democratic party of the past:

"That party of noble heritage has become captive of the schemers and plotters who have infiltrated its ranks of leadership to set the national course unerringly toward the scientific regimentation of a totalitarian state."

MacArthur blasted Truman specifically for asserting what the general called fictitious inherent powers—the claim Truman used in seizing the steel industry. The supreme court later ruled Truman acted without authority in the steel seizure.

MacArthur, who once described himself as an old soldier about to fade away, used possibly his sharpest language in condemning the administration's handling of the defense buildup and of foreign relations.

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
