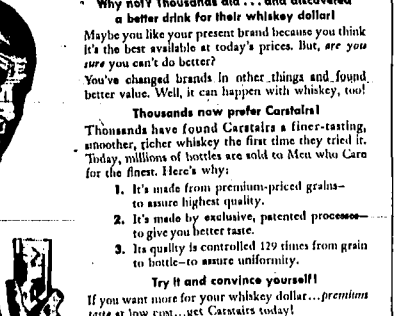

### Park and Shop Project Turns Into Game; Problems Solved

ALLENTOWN, Pa. (AP)—Out in this eastern Pennsylvania city, they've put the hoop-de-do in a box. Actually, the box is a game called "Park and Shop" but it's really a way of popularizing the city's solution to its parking problem.

Park and shop (the game) is modeled after park and shop (the actual parking plan). Both are clear, and both are easy to operate. And behind both is the dynamic, clear-thinking general manager of Allentown's Call-Chronicle newspaper, Donald P. Miller.

In 1944, Miller began thinking about parking in his city, like most in America, had too many cars for the parking space available. There was danger of business moving out to the suburbs. Out of his research, persuasiveness and eight years of work came a master plan which today makes it cheap and easy to park in the heart of Allentown's business area.

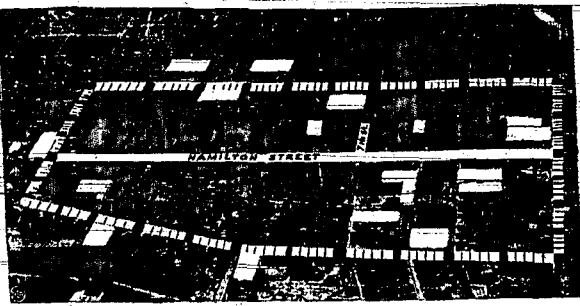
There are three types of parking, and three types of parking facilities, in Allentown. For the all-day parker, the Allentown parking authority runs lots on the fringe of the shopping district, but still within easy walking distance. There are 100 such lots, each 100 to 150 ft. or \$5 a month or \$50 a year to keep your car there.

For the short-stopper, the streets are metered. But there's an intermediate group, and a large one, that is virtually ignored in many cities. That's the motorist who only spends a few hours downtown on a variety of shopping and business errands.

These people are considered in Miller's park and shop plan. The city's merchants, besides shopping, like to be in the center of the city, and began operating privately-owned park and shop lots. As their ads say, it's as easy as one-two-three.

You pull into a park and shop lot, one of 10 in the business area. They're easily identified by big blue signs. You give the operator—who issues the lot from Park and Shop, the motorist who only spends a few hours downtown on a variety of shopping and business errands.

Secondly you go shopping. In any of the park and shop member stores—and the 72 stores represent nearly all Allentown merchants—you make your purchase. If it is over one dollar, the merchant stamps your ticket.

to a park and shop lot. Then you do your shopping (moving a pedestrian-figure-of-matching-color) go back to the lot, pick up your car and drive home.

The stores correspond almost directly to the real Allentown stores, although they're not named. The lots are located almost exactly where they're located in full-size Allentown. And there are penalty and bonus cards to imitate the unexpected incidents of a real shopping trip.

Although it's been incorporated and is a definite profit-making enterprise, the game has the secondary aim of driving home one message: it's faster to park in a lot and walk to the store. To emphasize this, you only roll one die while you're in your car, but two while you're a pedestrian.

"The game," says Miller, "adds the color and hoop-de-do" the day when the game was introduced. Allentown's schools closed, its merchants ran big sales, and the park and shop game was played in store windows up and down Hamilton street, the main thoroughfare. The city was flooded with shoppers.

But there was plenty of room to park.

### Both Marriages, Divorces Decline

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—The American mating club was muted last year. Marriages were away down. So were divorces.

The public health service says the 1957 marriage rate apparently dipped to the lowest point since 1938—1,594,900 marriages, 10.4 per thousand population, and a reduction of 72,300 from 1956.

The 1957 total is 37 per cent below the record set in 1948.

There were an estimated 371,000 divorces in 1957—2.4 per every 1,000 persons—compared with 385,100 in 1956.

The 1957 divorce total was 44 per cent below the 1948 record.

### Queen Urged to Fire "Red Dean"

LONDON, July 10 (AP)—Miss conservatives introduced a motion in common asking Queen Elizabeth II to fire the "red dean" of Canterbury, Dr. Jewett Johnson.

### Scientists Have New Method of Treating Burns

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—Three Detroit scientists report tests pointing to quick new methods of diagnosing and treating severe burns.

Dr. John J. Prendergast and two associates of Chrysler corporation's medical department reported in the Archives of Surgery that the test of burn severity centers around the blood protein called gamma globulin.

They said there is a great increase in gamma globulin in the blood of severely-burned patients, a slight increase in patients with minor burns. G. O. content can be determined by a new electrical test.

### British Appear to Be Winning Anti-Communist War in Malaya

The British seem to have hit a winning stride in the third of the wild wars against the communists in southeast Asia.

The news is brighter from Malaya, even as stalemate lags down the larger-scale struggles in Indo-China and Korea.

But the Malayan war differs from the fighting further north in that it is a struggle against a scattered band of terrorists who altogether probably total no more than 5,000 rather than against organized armies.

The Malayan reds' principal weapon of terror: their principal ally, the almost impregnable jungle which covers four-fifths of the Malayan peninsula; their tactics, murder, pillage, sabotage and ambush. They hit and run, fading back into the jungle.

For four years, they have murdered 1,947 persons—most of them, like the raiders themselves, Chinese. Only 88 of their victims have been British, but these include British High Commissioner Sir Henry Gurney killed in an ambush last year.

Hunting down the will-o-the-wisp raiders is like searching for a needle in a haystack. Except that a haystack would seem like paradise to searching troops who cut their way through the green hell of the jungle and wade through malarial swamps with death constantly at their elbow.

Altogether, Britain has mobilized a police army of 300,000 against the estimated 3,000 to 5,000 reds. There are nearly 40,000 regular army troops, including 25,000 from Britain itself, plus 60,000 full-time Malayan police and 200,000 home guards.

Backed by these forces, British High Commissioner Gen. Sir Gerald Templer's new "get-tough" policy has begun to pay dividends. Templer not only harried the reds with direct action, and rewards for informers, but strikes at the communists' source of supply by cracking down on villages which shelter or otherwise aid them. He imposes

a drastic 24-hour curfew and other security measures on such villages until they mend their ways.

As a result, the British and their native allies have boosted their monthly killing rate of reds to 82, and it's still increasing steadily. At the same time, the death rate among the hunters has dropped 30 per cent and communist raids are down 18 per cent.

Only this week, authorities reported a British patrol had killed 100 reds. Gen. Hin, most notorious bandit in the Kajang area of Selangor state with a price of \$20,000 on his head.

The U. S. has a vital stake in the battle, as vital perhaps as in the Korean struggle—Malaya is the world's biggest single source of rubber and tin, and America is its biggest customer.

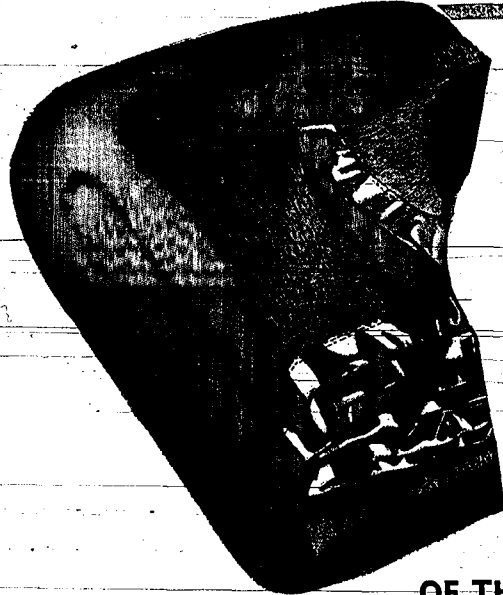

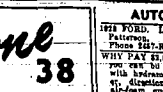

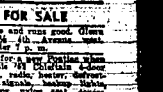

### Law Explains Active Status For Reserves

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—President Truman signed into law today a bill curbing his powers to call all military reserve forces to active duty.

The law divides reserve components into a 1,500,000-man "ready" reserve and a "stand-by" force which includes all other reserves.

The President, in a national emergency which he declares, could call only "ready" reserves. Congress would have to approve how many "standbys" would be called.

**Defines Powers**

The legislation was intended to end confusion over how far the President's powers extend. Heretofore he could call up as many as will, the standbys would be liable for service only in time of war or emergency declared by congress, and only when the "ready" reserve was exhausted.

**Congress, in passing the bill, expressed its intent that Korean veterans should not be recalled for emergency service unless no other qualified reserves are available.**

Men who enter the armed services under the present draft law owe the government eight years service—active and reserve.

**Law Outlined**

Ben. Harry P. Cain, R., Wash., said the law will work this way:

1. A draftee, returning from the present two-year active service goes into the ready reserve.
2. If he joined an organized reserve unit, attended drills and kept up his membership, he can go after three additional years into the standby reserve.
3. If he does not join an organized unit he will serve out his six years additional obligation in the "ready" category.
4. Men who have five years active service, or those who served a year in World War II and a year during the Korean emergency, will go directly into the "standby" category.
