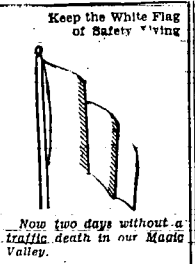

Report Given Local Nurses On U. S. Meet

June Wirsching, Idaho delegate to the American Nurses association convention, reported on the meeting Wednesday at the annual meeting of the Idaho Nurses Association at the Memorial hospital.

Wirsching said acceptance of the national association of nurses in place of four separate groups was the most important item on the convention's agenda.

A memorial convention held in June of last month was a success, she said. Wirsching said Idaho delegates represented Idaho hospitals.

Wirsching reported the new league will replace four separate groups: the National League of Nursing Education, National League of Schools of Public Health, National Association of Nurses and National Association of Colored Graduate Nurses.

Wirsching said the new league will have nursing, education and non-nurse members.

She also approved a draft resolution in case of national emergency for men nurses. The resolution provides for adequate pay for emergency and continued support of military nurses and special health organizations.

Wirsching also recommended better group relationships with nursing, reserving the right of nurses to make their own decisions individually regarding insurance plans.

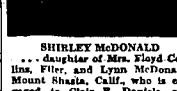

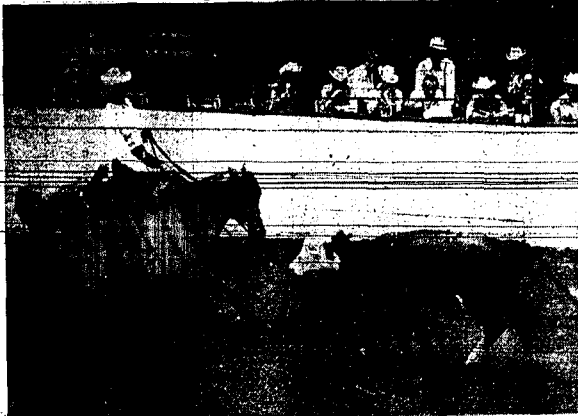
