H10 Made Ill By Fumes of Smelter Fire

PHILADELPHIA, July 16 (AP)—More than 110 persons were overcome or made ill by acid fumes which seeped through a northeast Philadelphia neighborhood from a smelter fire in a smelting plant today.

Some 60 persons were treated at Northwestern hospital, and 50 fumes were taken but stayed on the job at the General Smelting company plant where the fire burned for seven hours in a huge tin of zinc oxide powder.

The blaze broke out in the 30-foot long, half-story high bin shortly after 12:30 a. m. Police ran a shuttle service to the hospital, and evacuated the immediate neighborhood around the plant. In addition, Police Inspector William O'Brien toured the area in a squad car and warned residents over a seven-hour period to remove members of their families suffering from heart ailments or asthma.

Report Given For Loans to Nation's Vets

More than three million loans totaling 16 million dollars have been obtained by World War II veterans under the GI bill of rights since it was signed into law June 22, 1944, reports Arnold Helwege, Twin Falls veterans administrator.

The GI loan program has five more years to run, ending July 25, 1949, for most veterans.

Ninety per cent of the loans made to veterans have been to buy or build homes. Veterans have proved good loan risks, Helwege declares. Only one-half of one per cent of the home loans have defaulted.

Free education and training and allowances for unemployment and self employment were the other features of the bill.

The GI bill's education and training program ended for most veterans July 25, 1945. More than half of the nation's 12,500,000 World War II veterans have taken some form of education under the bill.

Readjustment allowances for unemployment and self employment ended for most veterans July 25, 1946. However, a few applications are still being received from the few remaining eligible veterans.

Thus far, about nine million veterans have drawn over six billion dollars for unemployment and six hundred million for self employment.
