First Mayor of Rupert Is Car Fatality

PERT, July 17—Magic Valley's 16th and Minidoka's third traffic fatality of the year came about as a result of an accident in Rupert Saturday.

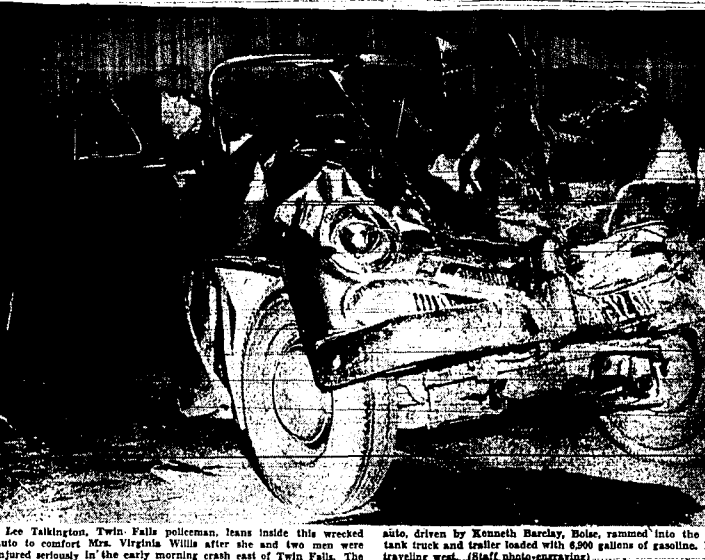

**Rules on Hospital Visitors Enforced; Two Permitted in Room at Same Time**

Two visitors to a patient. That's the ruling being enforced at the Magic Valley Memorial hospital. Mrs. C. E. Trout, acting director of nurses. The regulation isn't new. It's always been in the books. It just hasn't been enforced and patients frequently had too many visitors. Under the new program, only two persons will be allowed in the patient's room. Each visitor stops at the desk in the lobby near the elevator where visitor cards are issued. Members of the Magic Valley Memorial Hospital Guild are responsible for issuing the cards. The visitor states which patient he wishes to see. Guild members check their records to see if the patient has any visitors. If not, a card is issued. Five to ten minutes is the suggested visiting period. Close friends and relatives are exempt. They will be notified of each person arriving to visit the patient. The program was set up with the consent of hospital directors. Mrs. Trout is in charge of the program. All larger hospitals in the country have similar visitor programs.

EL FRANTONIO, Calif., July 17—Four persons were killed and an undetermined number injured today when a four-place private plane crashed into a crowded residential district shortly after takeoff.

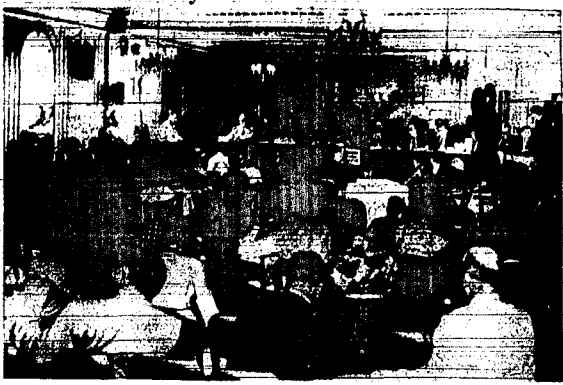

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### Auto Accident Toll Hits Idaho Drivers In New Area as Insurance Rates Gain

By TOM ADEN

BOISE, July 10.—The high cost of claims and the rising number of automobile accidents have hit Idaho motorists in the pocketbook in the form of higher liability rates.

The increased rates—88 per cent higher for bodily injury and 366 per cent higher for property damage for policies on private passenger cars—went into effect Monday.

They were announced by the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters, which computes the rates for the so-called member stock companies. Non-member companies which subscribe to it derive from its rates, but generally follow them up or down.

A third group of companies which doesn't belong, has been raising rates of its rates all along.

The reason is that so many motorists are having so many expensive accidents.

As announced by the Idaho Association of Insurance Agents, the new rates for all the state except Ada county compared with the old ones for the basic \$5,000 to \$10,000 bodily injury and \$5,000 property damage are:

Class 1—No drivers under 25, car used for non-business only—Bodily injury, \$15, \$14; property damage, \$15, \$11.50.

Class 2—Drivers under 25 years,

car used for business and non-business—Bodily injury, \$24, \$23; property damage, \$24, \$16.50.

Class 3—No drivers under 25 years; car used for business and non-business—Bodily injury, \$21, \$20; property damage, \$21, \$14.50.

The new rates also set up Ada county as a "separate territory at a higher rate. Under the old rates, Ada county motorists paid the same for property damage, but 12 1/2% higher for bodily injury in class 1 and 33% higher in classes 2 and 3.

Leo O'Connell, state insurance commissioner, said he didn't consider the rate increase "out of line from an over-all standpoint."

The Insurance Agents association said the increases were brought about by mounting accident frequency and increasing claim costs.

"There has been a steady upward trend in the average cost of claims and no evidence of any apparent leveling off in the future."

Unless there is a substantial decrease in the number of accidents, he said, the inflationary trend will continue and liability rates will go on higher.

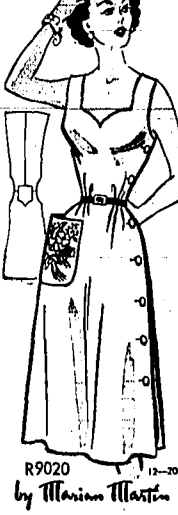

### Higher Price Trends Noted For Business

NEW YORK, July 17 (AP)—Higher prices are being talked of in a number of fields where the trend until recently has been all the other way. Textile prices are firming here and there, with scattered price hikes announced in synthetic wool and cotton yarns and fabrics. Steel price boosts are widely expected to follow the end of the next strike.

### Triplate Short

A triplate shortage—due to the steel strike—could make canned fruits and vegetables scarce this fall and send their prices up. Merchants are watching the new fair trade law, just signed by the President, to see if it heralds the end of the cut-rate bargains you've been able to find on brand name appliances and drugs in some departments and drug stores during the past year—after the old fair trade law was outlawed by the supreme court.

Price controls are about to be dropped on almost everything department stores stock and upon still more foods, the office of price stabilization indicates. It says congress clipped its wings so that it won't have enough employees left to do a policeman job on the prices of many consumer goods.

### Food Boosts Seen

The grocery trade scouts the notion that the decontrol of prices of canned fruits and vegetables will hike their price tags. But they worry about the possibility that tincan shortages during the packing season may cut drastically the volume of this year's crop to be put inside tin.

And this—especially now that congress has smothered price controls on canned fruits and vegetables—could send prices up this fall in the grocery store.

The turnabout of prices in the textile field is hailed widely in the industry as signaling the end of its long depression. The scattered price hikes of the basic fibers are not likely to show up in the stores for some time to come, the trade says.

### Idaho Federal Employees Top Teacher Total, Report Shows

Idaho has more federal employees than public school teachers, according to a survey by the Northwest regional office of the National Association of Manufacturers. John McGraw, NAM regional manager, explained in a press release from Portland, Ore., that the survey was designed to illustrate the vast number of civilian employees on the government payroll.

Idaho, McGraw pointed out, has 4,760 federal employees, compared to 5,836 federal employees, according to the civil service commission. A further breakdown shows one school teacher for every 124 persons in the state and one federal civilian employee for every 101 of the state's population.

"At the time when many national organizations have recognized the critical need for expanded educational facilities, the increasing obligations of our federal government are taking nearly 74 per cent of the total collection of taxes," McGraw explained.

"This leaves only 26 per cent of the tax collections for state and local needs. This is a reversal of the period prior to 1940. The tremendous burdens and responsibilities of the federal government have made it much more difficult to finance local and state responsibilities."

"The fact that the number of federal civilian employees in the country today stands at over 2,000,000 compared to under 1,000,000 in 1939 is just one indication of the extravagant spending policies of the government," McGraw said.
