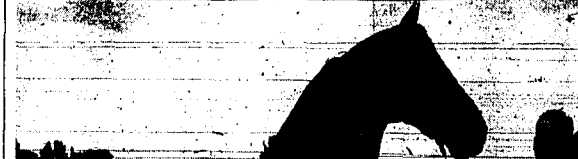

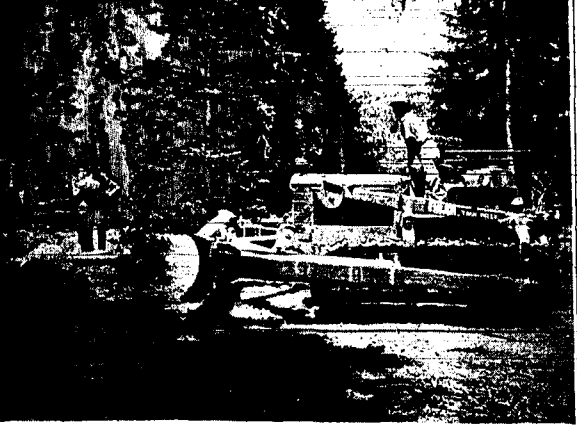

Work Is Started on Permanent Camp in South Hills for T. F. Camp Fire Girls

Permanent camp facilities are being established in Minidoka national forest for the Twin Falls council of Camp Fire Girls. It is announced by Mrs. L. E. Hinton, council president.

The present schedule calls for the camp to be used the first time next summer. Meanwhile, work parties are expected to complete work this fall on water supply development and installation of sanitary facilities.

Immediate goal of the project is completion of one main building, says Mrs. Hinton. The structure would be a large hall providing facilities for eating and sleeping, a kitchen and two small office rooms. Present plans call for the use of tents over frames as sleeping quarters.

In past years, Twin Falls Camp Fire Girls have used the Presbyterian campground north of Ketchikan. This year, the girls are sharing use of the Porcupine Springs camp with Boy Scout groups.

Mrs. Hinton points out that establishment of a camp near Twin Falls will reduce expenses materially and probably will permit more girls to participate in outings.

The site is located at Buchanan springs, about a mile south of the Rock Creek ranger station. It is used by the Porcupine Springs camp with Boy Scout groups.

Plans for Checks On Air Reservist Status Are Noted

Major W. M. Thompson, recently assigned as liaison man for the Magic Valley volunteer air reserve squadron, announced Saturday the plans for a census of air force reserve personnel are progressing.

Sergeant Thompson has been assigned here to assist in administrative details of the air force reserve organization. The fourth air reserve census headquarters at Hamilton field, Calif., has jurisdiction over volunteer air reservists in this area.

Sergeant Thompson said a survey group is being sent to this area soon to obtain current information on reservists. This data will include occupational qualifications, physical conditions, dependency status and relative availability in the event of a new national emergency.

As a result of the studies the individual, his family, his employer and the air force will be able to gauge more accurately the possibility of the person's being taken into active service in case of emergency.

The survey is not connected with immediate recall of individual reserve personnel to active duty, Sergeant Thompson stressed.

WHAT WILL THE OLD GUARD DO?

Old guard stalwarts in the Republican party, like did soldiers, never die. Whether they will fade away for good, now that they have suffered another defeat in national convention, remains to be seen.

The old guard was previously defeated twice by Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York and once by Wendell Willkie of Indiana and "Wall Street." After these candidates were defeated, the old guard serenely moved back into place and took over control of the Republican party machinery again.

The only sensible course now being recommended to the old guard is to join what Eisenhower calls his new "great crusade." The alternative is to go off in a corner and sulk, continue its mad, take no part in the campaign, not the old guard, the president of the Democrats—again—by default, in November.

Some of the die-hards, as they left the Chicago convention, are reported to have threatened "to take a good look at the candidate to be chosen by the Democrats."

This hangover of despair in defeat must finally melt away. The old guard, 66 years of age, goes on. The prospect of Senators Dirksen, Ericker, Kem, Cahn, McCarthy and Representatives Clarence Brown of Ohio and Carroll Reece of Tennessee ever voting Democratic is impossible to conceive.

What the group could become, however, is one General Eisenhower should wish the election. Is a hard core of "Northern Dixiecrats" for lack of a better name.

They would be the opposition, within the party, to the program which General Eisenhower called for in his speech accepting the nomination. This Republican opposition, voting with the Democrats, could completely stymie the Eisenhower program.

But the group, as they talk, any such stand, however, now that General Eisenhower heads up the campaign to bring about a complete change in national administration, is nothing more than selfish short-sightedness.

Now is no time for anyone in the Republican party to be giving precedence to any of his resentments. There is a far greater issue at stake and that's the welfare of our country.

There is even some significance in General Eisenhower's selection of Sen. Richard Nixon of California, as his running mate.

The convention would probably never have thought of Senator Nixon if it had been left to its own strange devices. While Senator Nixon has been described as a "nice young guy," it is the opinion of many political observers that he does not strengthen the ticket.

The story behind the selection of Nixon, however, is that Paul Hoffman, one of the general's closest advisers, is a strong believer in youth. He has a great enthusiasm for the young people of today and he has imparted much of this feeling to General Eisenhower. Senator Nixon was picked because the general regarded him as a symbol behind which the young folks could be recruited into the Republican party, as replacements for the old guard.

CONGRESS AND HAND-OUTS

There is good reason to question the motives of congress now and then. As they have pointed out numerous times. All the emphasis that is placed upon the importance of economy, for instance, serves as a good example.

To follow the deliberations of congress in the apparent attempt to trim appropriations leads one to believe a conscientious effort is being made to get this country back on a sound financial basis. But by some hook, crook, after the plan has been made for its effect on the public, the appropriations usually are granted, or the money provided by some other method.

Congress would like to have us all believe that it's paring appropriations to the very bone, but it usually hesitates to do anything of the kind for fear of incurring the political animosities of those who seek and benefit from such appropriations.

It is when members of congress grant themselves tax exemptions and the like, however, that the indignant American people have reason to suspect the sincerity of their representatives in Washington.

As one of our readers has pointed out in a letter written in this latter connection: "It's very interesting, don't you think (tax deductions, for congressmen) especially in view of the fact that taxes are withheld from our poor men in service in Iraq and elsewhere, who receive such meager pay?"

"Please, please," asked this same reader, "tell me how would one go about voting for the proper man for any office?"

Our only reply is that instead of despising our such salaries on, the average American citizen should take a greater interest in public, to the point of making his wants known to his representatives in Washington, and then following up, either by commending or condemning these representatives for their actions.

When it becomes apparent to congress that the American people actually are more interested in rigid economy, than in receiving continued hand-outs from the government, there will be a change, and you may be sure of that.

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HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

CHICAGO—A member of the Republican national committee remarked with a touch of concern in a private gathering a few nights ago that actually there was no Republican party in the country. But that, in his opinion, the country was being run by a few men in New York, Governor Dewey put through a so-called fair employment law. He explained as background information to mollify the true Republicans of his following that he did this only because he knew that if he didn't, the Democrats, who were really Marxist socialists of varying hues, would pass a worse one.

The only remedy is federal but now that is unthinkable. The fact that few cases have arisen does not mean the employers like it or the law would be constitutional and genuine Republican when if they did.

The likes and dislikes of citizens have been consulted too often, and often to their detriment and the irreparable injury of future generations, who, of course, are not consulted in these momentary crises of the present public.

The fact that few cases have arisen simply means the employers have given docile compliance in the belief they can't win. They are right. They can't.

The entire civil rights program concocted by the socialist society called Americans for Democratic Action, or ADA, is unwarranted, although more fascistic than socialism.

Indeed, in their official report presenting and urging the enactment of these infringements of the national constitution, the committee made the inquiry "frankly anticipated objections on constitutional grounds but expressed confidence that the supreme court will now packed by Roosevelt and Truman, would ratify these heresies.

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Junkert heard the story about the South American, from his brother and was so intrigued by it he set out to see what he could do with his own imagination.

Junkert's clock, built on a somewhat smaller scale than the South American's, cost only \$5.72 to make. He purchased a piece of window glass from the hardware store for \$1.50, bought a new watch for \$4.00, allowing \$3.50 difference, paid 42 cents for the hands and 30 cents for the numerals. To complete his materials he used a watch found in the street.

The secret of Junkert's clock lies in the two watch movements. Each is housed inside little tin cases in which materials are received by jewelers. The hands are made of brass rod and steel brass, and are balanced by weights in the cases containing the watch movements.

The balance is variable, depending on the movement of the watch, while the balance in the longer part of the hand beyond the center post remains constant.

The weights in the heavier side of the watch are shifted by the watch, thus changing the balance between the two ends of the hands and causing them to turn about the face of the clock at an accurate rate of speed.

Built on a larger scale with more expensive movements in the "cases," the servicing or winding of the clock, Junkert's clock will not be done more often than every eight to 15 days.

Starting his project last January in his basement, Junkert made his clock for radio to decoration and placed the hands behind the glass to be out of reach of children's inquisitive fingers. He placed his finished piece on a wood base.

As with the South American clock, Junkert's clock will correct to the correct time after spinning the hands because the balance must hold true as on a weigh scale.

Magic Valley farmers, with beans, wheat, beef, wool and a score or more of other products, have been making out pretty well for years. But they've been overlooking another cash crop, one that requires no special handling—only harvesting.

No special machinery is required for this new crop, you can use almost anything at hand: a broom, a pall, a couple of old broken, beat-up shovels, rakes, hoes and burlap bags—all will serve.

This new crop, right now, is worth more than beetseed. Prices for the ordinary variety run as high as \$1 a pound to the farmer. Compare that with around 30 cents a pound for wheat on the hoof, 22 cents a pound for hogs, 24 cents a pound for lambs, 10 cents a pound for wheat and seven cents a pound for beans.

And this year, in places, this new crop is reported exceptionally plentiful. Farmers in Cassia county could really clean up and those in Cassia county could do right well on another variety that's selling for 10 cents a pound.

The one climatic in the whole deal is that the wholesaler wants only 5,000 and 6,000 pounds of the Cassia variety and 2,000 pounds of the Cassia species. That's for the whole United States, so if you want to make a killing, now's the time. All you have to do is to go out and gather up those grasshoppers and crickets that have been pestering you this season and send them

to the Day-Belt company, Fort Huron, Mich. The company is paying \$1 a pound for preserved crickets and 70 cents a pound for small crickets.

Rock fences, windbreaks and an occasional rock building are proof that some Magic Valley farmers have put this crop of rocks to good use. The farm of Mrs. Elizabeth Houlsting, two and one-half miles southeast of Buhl, probably boasts more buildings constructed of rock than any other in the area. Although only six of the 80 acres on the ranch are "afflicted" with rock, four buildings on the place have been constructed mainly from this native building material.

Gustav Mals, who was a neighbor to Houlsting in Estonia before either of them immigrated to America, did the masonry on all of the buildings. He had masonry experience working with his father and brother in Estonia.

Houlsting homesteaded part of the place, then in sagebrush, and bought the remainder from the original homesteader in 1907. Clearing of the land and getting it under cultivation was the most urgent task. When the more pressing work was out of the way some of the rocks were

hauled from the six-acre tract and taken to what was then the rear of the ranch. Mals came from Estonia in 1914 and in 1918 he began work on the house. He completed it in 1928. The 26-by-46-foot house has rock walls nine feet high. The large basement, also constructed of rock, has seven-foot walls.

A storage building 100-by-64 feet with 10-foot high walls was the next one to be constructed. Corners on all of the buildings are as strong and straight as in a building of brick or cinderblocks. The entire constant measuring and considerable chiseling of rock to the necessary size and shape, Mals said. A large barn was begun before Houlsting's death and rock again was the main building material.

Two years ago, with no sign of running out of building supplies, Mals constructed a 24-by-24-foot garage. He plans a 16-by-16-foot addition to the house in the near future.

There will have to be another season of "rock picking" on the place first though, Mals said.

Some blankets are still sized in "spots," going back to the days when they were traded for beaver skins according to a point system of value.

Judgment Favors Bank in New York

Judgment was entered in district court Friday by Judge Hugh A. Baker in favor of the Chase National bank, New York, against John J. Wolfe, Twin Falls. Baker and Langleigh represented the bank, but Wolfe was not present.

The judgment pointed out that on Aug. 10, 1949, in the circuit court in Virginia, judgment of \$11,884.27 plus interest was granted in favor of the bank against Wolfe. The judgment was not paid, so the court awarded the bank \$2,885 plus interest and costs.

Boyle Finds College Students Taking Interest in Religion

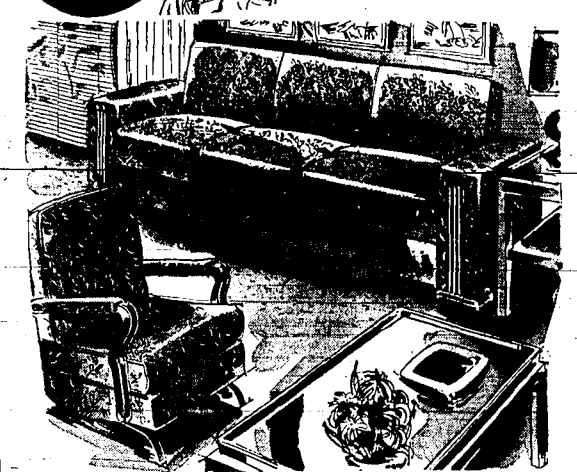

YOWA CITY, Ia., July 19 (AP)—College students are getting more God-minded. That is the conclusion of a pioneer religious educator of the University of Iowa. Interest in religion on the part of college students is rising, said Dr. M. Willard Lampe. "It is a questioning interest," he said, "but it is a real interest." "It doesn't take the form of a mass movement. It is more on an individual basis. Young people are searching for a philosophy of life that can give an inner peace and security against the outward confusion and turmoil of the times. The cynical point of view, as compared to a generation ago, has declined both among students and professors." Few educators in America are in a better position to assess the religious interest of college youth than Dr. Lampe, 68-year-old director of Iowa university's famous school of religion. "Twenty-five years ago, Dr. Lampe, a Presbyterian minister, conceived the idea that even in a lax-supported state university religion should be taught "not indirectly or surreptitiously, but unapologetically, comprehensively and in line with the best educational practice." Helped by a \$38,000 Rockefeller grant, Dr. Lampe worked for several years to get churches of different denominations to provide faculty members for his new school and underwrite their salaries. His idea was that in addition to stock courses in the history of comparative religions students at state colleges should be able to study the specific faith of their choice. Today the school has a seven-man faculty, including four Protestant, two Jewish and one Roman Catholic evangelist. It has become so popular that in a recent year more than 4,000 students—one fifth of the enrollment in the college of liberal arts—elected to attend religious classes. "Many of our students go on to become clergymen themselves," Dr. Lampe said. "There is a real interest on the part of students in finding out about the faiths of others as well as their own. Often they are less interested in orthodox forms of religion, however, than they are in finding the meaning of life in satisfying and positive ways. But to Dr. Lampe this eager student quest for a basic meaning to existence is a sure sign of the religious instinct. "Since he quietly instituted the 'choice plan' other tax-supported educational institutions across the country have adopted it as a pattern for their religious schools. He likes to feel that it has been a formula that has encouraged religious tolerance. "One of our former students has written a textbook on religion which he hopes will be acceptable to Jews, Protestants and Catholics," Dr. Lampe said. "We are living in a world where an idea like this, even when well started, will not perpetuate itself automatically," he added in discussing his school's first quarter term. "It will always have to fight its way against prejudice, against misunderstanding, against cynicism and indifference, even against a false sense of security on the part of its friends." He is sure of one thing: The student attitude is no longer an intellectual hero on the American college campus.

Estonians in Canada, Former Displaced Persons, Visit Here

SHOSHONE, July 19.—Among visitors to Magic Valley this month are Mrs. Rose Kurwitz and her daughter, Aly, Saskatchewan, Canada. They are visiting Mrs. Kurwitz's uncle, Gustav Mals, at the home of Mrs. Elizabeth Homling, Buhl. Mrs. Kurwitz and Aly would be termed displaced persons here, but really are "new Canadians," having lived there the last three years.

Estonians by birth, they fled to Czechoslovakia ahead of the Germans and then to Germany ahead of the Russians. Mrs. Kurwitz was serving in the guerrilla forces, an attempt to cross the Baltic sea to Sweden failed. He was executed along with 64 other "traitors" by the Russians.

Mrs. Kurwitz lived under Russian rule for a year and five months. She remembers the night when 20,000 Estonians were herded into cattle cars and hauled away for execution. She says it's possible that her profession of nursing saved her from a similar fate.

Among other harrowing experiences, Mrs. Kurwitz and Aly who then was only five years old, were forced to escape from an American POW camp. A number of refugees fleeing from the Russians in Czechoslovakia were brought to the camp where they were fed and given blankets and clothing.

When she was trying to go, she told them "Germany". "Have you friends or relatives here, or a job?" she was asked. When she replied that she did not, the major in charge insisted that she return to Czechoslovakia where she knew some people and had work.

Knowing what would be in store for her there if forced to return, she and her sister and daughters and another Estonian woman escaped from the camp and made their way to Germany.

The difference between working in Hitler-ruled Germany and communist Russia was that in Germany a person's time was his own when his day's work was done. If he worked and didn't talk about Hitler he could get along.
