Bean May Replace Corn in Bolivia Diet As Result of Agronomy Engineer's Visit

Ten years from now millions of Bolivians may be eating Idaho beans in place of the present staple, corn, because of the nine-day visit of Carlos Cosío, 29, agronomy engineer from Cochabamba, Bolivia, who substituted the more nutritious bean for corn in the national diet is one of the possible outcomes of his year of study at experiment stations throughout the country.

Cosío, a member of the staff of the experiment station at the American service, Cochabamba, was sent to the United States last November as a part of the point four program, aid to economically backward countries.

Since then he's followed an itinerary that led from Berkeley, Calif. to California to Idaho, and he'll wind up in Maine next November before he leaves for home. Field and vegetable breeding are the general subjects for study, with emphasis on Idaho staples, beans, potatoes and sugar beets.

His study at the Twin Falls experiment station has been under the direction of V. E. Wilson, geneticist and plant pathologist, and J. R. Douglas, in charge of Twin Falls branch of the bureau of entomology.

Shockingly, Cosío will go to Maine for concentrated study of potatoes. His explanation for the bit of treachery is that though the Idaho climate and Bolivian climate have much in common, the potatoes are different.

Cosío is one of several young Bolivian agriculturists studying in the United States under the point four collective aim and that of the government is to transform Bolivia from an agricultural country to a more self-sufficient farming and mining economy.

Cosío has the beginning of emphasis on agriculture in his country as late as 10 years ago. And five years ago the first agriculture experiment station was established, one for each zone, mountain, valley and tropics.

Even so, Cosío says, only a small portion of the arable land has been scratched, and the population of four million is only one-third that of the South American country can support.

Tripartite and the "California like climate" of the Twin Falls area are new to Cosío, Bolivia, which varies from the tropical sugar cane area near Brazil to rugged mountains has stretches of deep valleys similar to the Idaho country.

Cosío has only a few days of praise for the United States. The larger cities, such as San Francisco and Washington, D. C., have much in common with large cities in South America, but the small towns, he says, give the nation a unique flavor.

"You have all the commodities of the big cities, water, lights, drug stores and theaters, in no small town in America do we have these things. It is the small town that makes the country."

The agronomy engineer, who arrived in Twin Falls July 14 stops next to Greeley, Colo., and the experiment station there. Next stop is Madison, Wis., to visit Sturgeon Bay, Wis., and finally Presque Isle, Me.

Idaho School Panel to Hold Finance Talks

Alton B. Jones, state superintendent of public instruction, said the state education department will present three alternate plans to the board.

Plans vary

He declined to give the amount of aid they call for, since the matter still is in the discussion stage, but said they range from "the ultra-conservative to the ultra-liberal."

Each of the plans, he said, has taken into consideration the actual and basic increases in school population, increased costs and teachers' salaries.

No recommendation for the legislature will come out of this meeting. Final decisions will be made when the board meets Sept. 15.

Reports Expected

By then, Jones said, the board expects to receive reports from the governor's advisory committee on education, the Unified Action committee, State Parent-Teachers association, Idaho Education association and the Trustees association.

"This year's requests are going to be considered by more groups doing studying and pre-planning than ever before," he said.

The last legislature appropriated about \$4 million dollars for the minimum program for the current biennium.

U.P. Planning Plexiglas Car

OMAHA, July 21 (AP)—A plexiglas box car will be manufactured by Union Pacific railroad this summer—but it'll just be for show.

President A. E. Stuedemann said today the car will tour the company's line to show yard and train service employees the effect of switching and other impacts on loading. The idea is to reduce freight damage.

Only one side of the car will be plexiglas—just a show window. The rest will be steel with a plexiglas window to absorb its expansion under heat.

Lading will be kept from contacting the plexiglas by a network of metal. In addition, the car will have its own power and the interior will be illuminated by special electric lights set in shock proof sockets.

Another feature of the car will be a huge speedometer three feet in diameter. It will be mounted on the front of the car and will show several feet away may see how fast the car is moving during demonstrations.

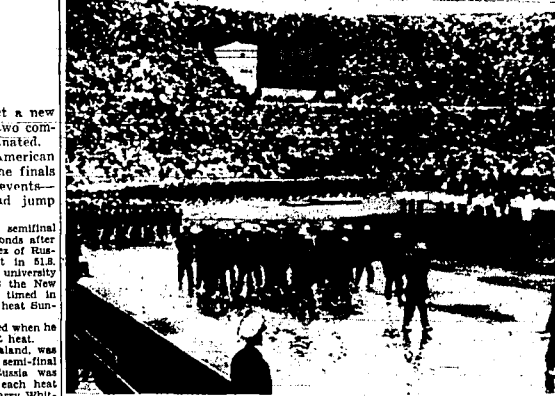

U. S. Benefits Hike Okayed For Millions

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—Millions of aged Americans, caught in the inflationary squeeze, are looking forward to a 20 percent increase in their social security and public assistance checks.

President Truman has signed legislation boosting benefits under both programs by \$140 million each, beginning Sept.

Lobby Blasted
Mr. Truman requested such an increase in his state of the union message, but in protecting the measure, he blasted "medical lobby" for blocking "insurance program for millions of disabled Americans."

The law will hike monthly payments to 4,000,000 persons receiving social security old-age and survivor's insurance by 45 month or 12 1/2 per cent—whichever is higher.

Minimum Boosted
The minimum payable to a retired person will be \$25 a month instead of the present \$20. The maximum monthly payment to an eligible family will be raised from \$150 to \$160 a month.

The measure also will boost state public assistance payments by about \$3 a month for dependent children and \$5 for the blind and newly aged.

Under the new law, servicemen will be able to accumulate social security credits while in service at a maximum rate of \$60 a month, starting with the outbreak of the Korea war.

Earnings Top Raised
Persons receiving old-age and survivor's benefits will be permitted to earn up to \$75 a month without losing government assistance. The maximum now is \$50.

The law will add \$300,000,000 a year to the \$2,000,000,000 now being paid out in social security retirement checks. But officials claim funds on deposit are large enough to absorb the increase without raising social security taxes.

It also increases by \$40,000,000 the annual federal contribution of \$1,200,000,000 made to the state public assistance (relief) programs.

Building Drop Halt Is Noted

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21 (AP)—Private building in the western states slumped badly in the first half of 1952, but a sharp pickup started in June when the government eased controls.

The Daily Pacific Builder, trade publication, reported today private building volume for the period an \$739,200,000, a decline of 12.3 per cent from the comparable 1951 period.

The stir of activity in June brought a total for that month of \$145,800,000, topping all other monthly volumes this year and 32.7 per cent ahead of June, 1951.

Oregon nearly held its own, declining 2.8 per cent from \$29,000,000 to \$28,300,000.

Declines in other states: Utah—\$8,800,000 against \$14,000,000, down 38.6 per cent.
Idaho—\$2,200,000 vs. \$2,800,000, off 21.5 per cent.
Washington—\$31,200,000 vs. \$61,800,000, off 48.5 per cent.

The eventual winner of the national rodeo will receive a \$1,000 scholarship, John Grant, Boise Jaycees vice president, said.
