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## 1000 Eligible Voters in Valley Failed to Cast Ballots in 1950

The last general election in the valley had more than 20,000 eligible voters cast ballots, but only 1000 of these voters actually voted, according to the county clerk's office. This was only while the returns were in the other counties.

In the 1950 census there were 20,000 in the valley over 21 years of age. But not all of them were eligible to vote. Only 10,000 were eligible to vote. But when the election was held only 1000 of these voters actually voted.

The county clerk's office said that the 1000 voters who did vote were the 35,671 ballots to be cast.

## Temblors Continue On Coast

TEHACHAPI, Calif., July 23 (AP)—For the third day earthquake shocks continued in southern California, with a fairly strong one coming at 12:53 a. m. today and lasting for about 20 seconds in this devastated community.

Freeman Robert Opely said this one was the strongest shock since the big one Monday morning that left 11 dead in Tehachapi and damaged estimated at 24 million dollars. More bricks were shaken down from wrecked buildings and dishes were broken.

15-Second Tremor  
In the Los Angeles area this last tremor lasted about 15 seconds and was felt widely throughout the area. At Bakerfield the sheriff's office reported the quake was "probably the strongest" since the main shock. It rattled windows but no further damage was reported.

"People are getting pretty used to it now," he said. "They don't get excited anymore."

Building Checked  
In the meantime inspectors are making a building by building check of the city. They are expected to condemn most of the downtown businesses and many homes as well. Townspeople here face weeks of hardship, even though relief organizations have provided food and temporary shelter.

The town is literally without business. One small grocery was selling its stock. No restaurants were open. The 30-odd other business houses were roped off.

## Convention Vote OK's Seating of 'Regulars'

CONVENTION HALL, Chicago, July 23 (AP)—The Democratic national convention, by overwhelming voice vote, today adopted a credentials committee report seating all delegates, including those from three states refusing to adhere to a convention "loyalty" pledge—but it was in doubt whether those three delegations would be permitted to vote.

Gov. Paul Dever, Massachusetts, temporary chairman of the convention, called the three—Louisiana, Virginia and South Carolina—delegations from voting on adoption of the committee report.

Dever declined to say whether his ruling—also applied to other convention issues.

Sen. Blair Moody, chairman of the credentials committee and sponsor of the loyalty pledge, said the non-signers would be subject to a point of order every time they tried to vote.

The Virginia delegation said it considered itself excluded from voting.

Miss T. Louisiana Signs  
After the convention acted, Louisiana, at the urging of National Committee Chairman Frank B. Rowland, unanimously agreed to sign the pledge with the reservation:

"We will abide by the rules of the convention and by the resolutions on us by the democratic central committee of Louisiana."

The Louisiana delegation said it considered a satisfactory pledge.

By its action approving the credentials committee report, the convention also acted on the resignation of the Louisiana delegation from Texas and Mississippi. The 52-vote Texas "regulars" position, which was considered a satisfactory pledge.

## Stevens Piling up New Support for Nomination; Fight Begins

CONVENTION HALL, Chicago, July 23 (AP)—Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson piled up new support today as managers of the Democratic national convention strove to prevent party-splitting floor fights over credentials and civil rights.

The convention pushed into its third day with peacekeepers hopeful that seating of disputed delegations and adoption of rules could be accomplished without warfare. There was less hope of peace tonight when the resolutions committee presents its platform.

Meanwhile, opponents of Stevenson tried to build up a drive to stop him. The campaign to stop the mushrooming drive to draft the Illinois governor was commanded by Sen. Estes Kefauver, Tennessee, who wants the nomination for himself.

But the powers that be were looking toward Adlai, now Estes, Secretary of Interior Oscar L. Chapman, a big wheel in the administration and the party, asked Stevenson for a breakfast meeting and got it.

Stevenson said afterward that he and Chapman—who has been mentioned as a possible vice presidential running mate for the governor—"talked about the convention" but not "too much."

Chapman said he did not carry any message to Stevenson from President Truman. But the word already had been passed that the President thinks Stevenson will be nominated.

Kefauver accused National Committeeman Jacob M. Aron, Illinois, of "convincing and scheming" to put Stevenson across with a "synthetic drive" added by forces who, the Tennessee said, "are out to get me."

As the Democratic national convention pushed into its third day, Stevenson seemed headed for the nomination.

If he gets it, Kefauver is all the way out. In his longest speech to date, Kefauver said that if Stevenson were elected, he would "not accept or compromise" the vice presidential nomination.

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## Idahoans Hint Follow of Tide To Stevenson

CHICAGO, July 23 (AP)—Idaho's delegation to the Democratic national convention today showed signs of swinging along with the "draft Stevenson" movement—after they cast their votes for Stevenson.

Delegation Chairman R. W. Rider, Jr., of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, said there is a definite shift of the vote to Stevenson, but we don't know what the Idaho delegation will do.

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## Rights Plank 'Compromise' Dodges Fight

CHICAGO, July 23 (AP)—The Democratic platform committee today dodged a fight with the southern states over a civil rights plank.

The committee reached agreement on their recommendations for the platform after 10 consecutive hours of shouting, letter-dumping argument among the 10 members over the civil rights issue.

The full 108-member platform committee planned to meet later today to take formal action on the party's "declaration of principles" with which it hopes to defeat Dwight D. Eisenhower, the Republican nominee, in November.

Although the text of the civil rights plank remained a closely guarded secret, it was understood to meet the four basic "irreducible minima" laid down by new deal supporters as their price for party harmony.

Put on Record  
The platform committee would put the party on record calling upon congress, the federal, state and local governments to guarantee to every citizen regardless of race, color or creed:

1. Equal opportunity for employment.
2. Equal rights to participate in the national economy.

## Bureau Notes Rise in State Tax Receipts

BOISE, July 23 (AP)—Idaho tax receipts for the first six months of 1952 climbed two and a quarter million dollars over the previous year to \$28,126,271, State tax officials reported today.

The total represents the "usable" taxes collected by the state and does not include \$1,057,000 in non-usable taxes which are later refunded to non-highway users.

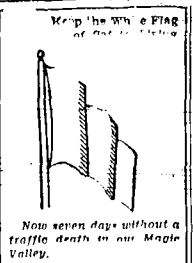

### Dams Blocked Spring Floods

BOISE, July 22 (AP)—Regional Director Harold T. Nelson of the bureau of reclamation said Tuesday flood control operations at Arrowrock and Anderson Ranch dams prevented the Boise river from spilling over its banks this year and flooding some farm lands.

The river's runoff for the year ending Sept. 30 will be the fourth highest in the 57-year recorded history of the Magic Valley. It is expected, he said, to top runoff on record occurred in 1943. During that year's 3,560,000 runoff peak flow past Boise, about 1,600 cubic feet per second, flooding 1,000 cubic feet per second.

Nelson said that without the storage reservoirs to hold in check the big runoff from snow melt this year, water would have been flowing past Boise at an average rate of about 1,600 cubic feet per second throughout May. This is 7,000 greater than the amount that can be carried safely, he said.

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# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

**CHICAGO**—Politicians are politicians. Although neither starting nor original, that observation is provided by the Democratic presidential nomination fight. It is the convention favor of President Truman, scheduled to arrive here today and remain through the night.

## TRUMANCRATS—Most of the potential nominees, are "Trumancrats," believing in his domestic and foreign programs. His pre-convention legislative behavior gave a wide and deep support to his party's 20-year program led them to renew their feuds of jealousy.

### Burley Resident, 80, Says He Never Felt Better in His Life

BURLEY, July 22.—"Never felt better in my life," Frank B. Wilson, who recently celebrated his 80th birthday anniversary, claims "wouldn't do it differently, had you your life to live over again?" Wilson was asked, "I wouldn't change one minute of it. Every-thing has been just fine." This outlook is typical of the long-time resident of Burley, known throughout Cassia county for his optimism, his even disposition and friendliness during his many years of teaching and his 14 years as Cassia county auditor.

Wilson was born July 15, 1872, at Eden, Ogden Valley, Utah, a member of a family of 12 brothers and sisters. When he was 4 months old, his family moved to Harrisville, Utah, and on June 19, 1892, they moved to Oakley where he attended grade school and was graduated from the old Cassia academy in 1901.

Following graduation, he taught summer school at Cassia creek and, in the fall of that year, taught at the Oakley city schools. For a year he attended the LDS Business college at Salt Lake City. He also attended Brigham Young university for three years.

On Sept. 8, 1904, he married Rebecca Hawkins. For one year he served as principal of Vineland school on the mesa of Le Ferry, in the spring of 1906 he and his wife moved to Oakley where he was principal of North Oakley schools for four years and principal of Oakley city schools for two years.

In 1911 he and his wife attended summer school at the University of Utah. In 1912 Wilson attended summer school at Albion and from 1913 to 1917, he again filled the position of principal at North Oakley schools.

In August, 1917, the Wilsons moved to Burley, where he served as mail carrier until November, 1918, when he was elected county auditor. In 1920 they moved to a acreage where he raised foxes and mink. After four years they moved back into their home in town at 424 West Seventeenth street. In 1943, Wilson was appointed registrar of births and deaths in Cassia county, which office he still occupies.

An active member of the LDS church, he has led groups and taught Sunday school classes from 1914 to 1917, has been bishop of the Third ward LDS church.

Wilson's children are Ronald Braxton, Idaho Falls; James P. and James F. Wilson, Boise. Another son, James F. Wilson, died June 7, 1917, at the age of nine years.

Mrs. Wilson is the owner and operator of the Burley-Rupert credit association.

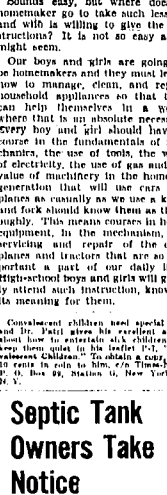

### Demos Cheer FDR's Widow On Her Talk

CONVENTION HALL, Chicago, July 23 (AP) Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, cheered to the echo in the greatest ovation of the Democratic national convention, stoutly defended the foreign policy of the Truman administration Tuesday night and pleaded for support of the Korean war.

"To the anti-peace sympathizers who react on an undelivered speech by my late husband, the world war is President. It is a plea for Americans to dedicate themselves to making an abiding peace."

**Must Keep Faith**  
Mrs. Roosevelt said: "I would say to you today—we must keep the faith, strive to strengthen the U. N. which is the one machine through which we must work for greater understanding and eventually we hope for a peaceful world."

The convention gave her a 15-minute demonstration when she came before it. And there was another ovation when she concluded. The band played "Happy Days Are Here Again" by the old Roosevelt campaign song, and "God Bless America."

The undelivered FDR speech from which Mrs. Roosevelt read was one she said he had prepared for a Jefferson day dinner in Washington, April 12, 1945. He died at Warm Springs, Ga., a few days before that date.

**"Last Message"**  
This "last message" as Mrs. Roosevelt termed it concluded with these words: "The only limit to our realization of tomorrow will be our doubts of today. Let us move forward with alacrity and active faith."

Mrs. Roosevelt called Korea "the first successful application of collective security on the part of the U. N. to stop aggression."

Mrs. Roosevelt said, it has stimulated the free world to build its defenses. She said the best answer to why Americans are fighting in Korea has been given by the late Sen. J. W. Eastland, Miss. He said: "I fought in Korea so I would not have to fight on Main street in Wichita."

"At the end of her talk, Mrs. Roosevelt was given a scroll for having become an American citizen of the world."

# Dam Project No Easy Task; Construction Poses Complex Problems

It is being handled largely by J. A. Kiehl Construction Company, Charlotte, N. C., and Seattle, and Charles H. Tompkins company, Washington, both now known as Pallades contractors, at myad in Idaho, Utah, Montana and other firms are subcontractors.

Excavating and rock blasting for the dam is the "big" part of the primary steps of construction—bringing through solid rock for three tunnels: One 1,400 feet long to carry water through a 26 foot diameter tunnel to the power turbines; another 1,744 by 28 feet for diversion of reservoir water; and a third above these, 1,850 by 28 feet to handle surplus flow of Snake river around the dam. With 15 drills and dynamite crews honing and blasting the two lower tunnels are about 30 feet into the canyon walls.

While this is under way the river's south fork must be picked up and moved aside temporarily to allow work on the dam. Four "borrow" roads from the dam site will give up most of the staggering total of earth needed for the dam's construction. When this is completed, the river will be hoisted back into place. The river will obtain its original course eventually, but highway 28 is going to be eliminated permanently.

The reservoir will cover nearly its entire length from the new stretch will skirt the northern hill of Swan valley, sucking in and out of Targhee forest. This involves the usual labor of road-building, plus the task of backing through rugged forest country and bowing over hills. J. A. Kiehl Construction of Seattle, Mont., will handle the major part of the road work, putting a stretch of the road over Elk Tree hill, among other tasks.

The power plant for Pallades will be erected on the south abutment of the dam. It will house four 28,126-kilowatt generators and four 39,500-horse-power turbines. Power transmission lines from the dam site to the power plant will be about 10 miles long.

Under the bureau's plan to build a dam after a 50-year period, the project is the largest in the world. It will cost about \$100 million.

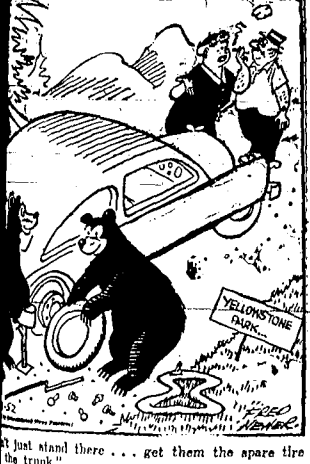

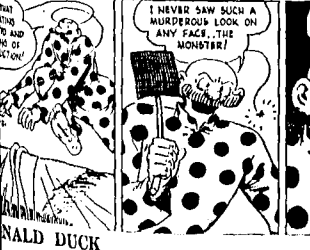
