Coup Forces Egypt Ruler To Abdicate

Cairo, July 26 (AP)—King Farouk I abdicated the Egyptian throne today at the climax of a tank-squadron-led campaign and sailed away in the Mediterranean aboard his royal yacht. The army said his family fled for exile in Italy.

It had meanwhile proclaimed Farouk's baby son, 7-year-old Crown Prince Ahmed, to be King Fuad II of Egypt. Lieut.-Gen. Mohammed Naguib Bey, a young army man and leader of the virtually bloodless

army coup, surrounded the royal palaces with a 7,000-man force. Soldiers arrested several royal guard officers in the show-down at Ras el Tin palace in Alexandria, Egypt's summer capital.

In addition to 16-year-old Queen Narriman and the baby, Farouk's three daughters by former Queen Feriha—Princesses Ferial, Fadia, and Fawzia—accompanied him into exile.

Gen. Naguib shook hands with the ousted monarch and saluted him while the band played the royal anthem. Farouk, wearing the uniform of a captain in the Egyptian army, said his last words were a goodbye with his cap as a 21-gun salute was fired.

Belgrin Ends The abdication of Farouk fabulously wealthy Egyptian monarch at the end of a reign of 16 troubled years highlighted by World War II and his country's position in a strategically important and by a postwar dispute with a former ally, Britain.

First reports quoted Queen Narriman as having said that she had wanted to accompany her husband but she was prevented from doing so because she "must take care of the baby crown prince and help bring him up."

Appeal for Calm Late Saturday night Premier Aly Maher Pasha and Naguib made nationwide appeals by radio for tranquility and calm in the future of the country.

Maher Pasha said Farouk abdicated according to the will of the people. Naguib disclosed that Farouk had promoted him to lieutenant general and given him the salary of a cabinet minister after the coup.

"I did not reject this royal offer," he said. "I am not a man who wants to hand over a greater project. The general obviously was referring to the present situation."

Death Ends Eva Peron's Stormy Life

BUENOS AIRES, July 26 (AP)—Mrs. Eva Peron, Argentina's blond first lady and non-official political power in the regime of President Juan D. Peron, died tonight after a lingering illness. Her age was listed officially as 30.

She never recovered fully from an operation performed here last November with a New York cancer specialist in attendance. The cause of death was not confirmed as cancer, however. The Argentina's national radio announced in a nationwide broadcast that she died at 8:25 p.m.

President Peron, members of his family, cabinet ministers and other high public officials were gathered at the presidential mansion when Mrs. Peron died.

Mrs. Peron provided the greatest thrill to her direct contact with the leaders of the powerful General Confederation of Labor, who claimed that one-million members provided the basis for Peronista electoral strength.

Powerful Woman The dynamic wife of President Peron who worked hard to be being glamorous and at the same time the nation's "descamisado" (shirtless man) was perhaps the most powerful woman in western hemisphere domestic politics. Argentina's first lady challenged Argentine tradition that the woman's place was in the home, but was woman-like enough to conceal her age. She was born on May 7, 1912, but she was believed to be three years older than that.

Born in Poverty A poor, untutored provincial girl whose romance blossomed into political power, she was a real-life Cinderella for millions of workers, nursing mothers and hotel workers. Her soaring rise was cut short last fall by an illness described by her doctors as acute anemia.

Demos Choose Stevenson As Presidential Nominee, Sparkman for No. 2 Spot

CONVENTION HALL, Chicago, July 26 (AP)—The Democratic presidential nomination went to reluctant Adlai Stevenson in a breathtaking three-ballot finish early today and Sen. John J. Sparkman was nominated as Stevenson's running mate.

Stevenson, who said he had accepted the nomination humbly in the belief that a better man could have been found for it, promised that "I will fight to win... with all my heart and soul."

Stevenson's nomination climaxed a day of slow and painful balloting during which Kefauver's fortunes rose only to crash to earth in an after-recesses third ballot.

The Illinois chief executive got the nomination after a three-day struggle with Sen. John J. Sparkman, who was nominated as his running mate.

Democrat Standard Bearer and Mate Kefauver, who called himself the people's choice because he won most of the Democratic primary caucuses to a high-five mark of 35 1/2 votes on the second ballot.

At that point, Stevenson had reached 32 1/2 votes, Russell had 24 and Hartman brought up the rear with 12.

Sen. John J. Sparkman, Ala., was nominated as vice president on the Democratic ticket Saturday.

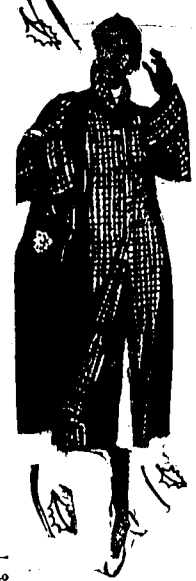

General Grant was graduated from West Point near the bottom of his class.

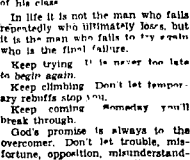

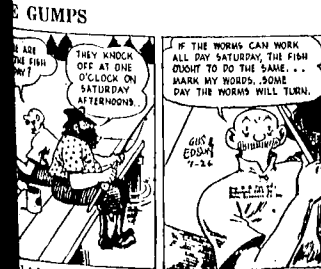

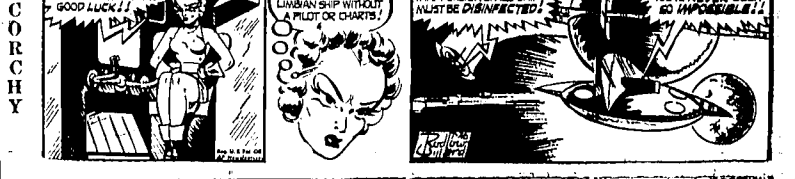

Jerome Slates Fund for City Hall Erection

JEROME, July 26—Jerome has set aside \$60,000 in its 1937 budget for the construction of a new city hall. The total budget amounts to \$334,000 as compared to \$294,800 last year. Estimated revenues have been set at \$334,000 as compared to \$300,000 last year.

No definite plans have been made for beginning construction, but tentative plans call for a start in 1937 and completion in 1938 with funds from that year's budget. If needed, present plans also call for erecting the building on the site of the present city hall. The building also will house the police department, fire department and public library, City Simons, city clerk, and.

Revenue for Jerome on a local basis climbed from \$166,753.33 in 1931 to \$176,264.91 in 1932. Fees from slot machines climbed from \$180,199.73 to \$163,882.83. Revenue from miscellaneous license collections, fines, building permits, sewer permits and electrical inspections all decreased, however.

The 1933 budget calls for an increase from \$12,000 to \$15,000 in administrative expenses; \$1,500 to \$2,000 in city hall expenses; \$4,500 to \$10,000 in fire department expenses; and \$10,000 to \$12,000 for garbage collections.

Maintenance of parks dropped from \$6,000 to \$4,000. The municipal band fund remains the same at \$1,000 and \$10,000 was added for the construction of a city barn. Another \$300 was added for civil defense.

The police force is receiving an increase from \$22,000 to \$27,000 but the sewer fund has been lowered from \$10,000 to \$5,000 for construction and \$12,000 to \$15,000 for maintenance. The total general fund was set at \$12,500; street equipment, \$20,000, and \$20,000 for maintenance. The total general fund was set at \$312,500 as compared with \$284,600 last year.

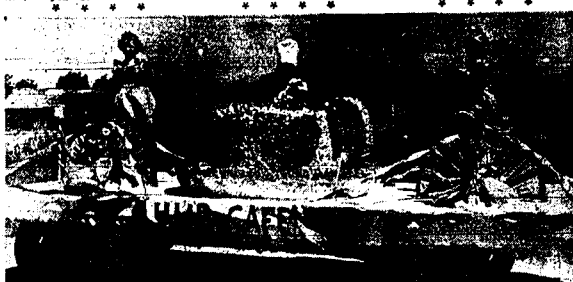
