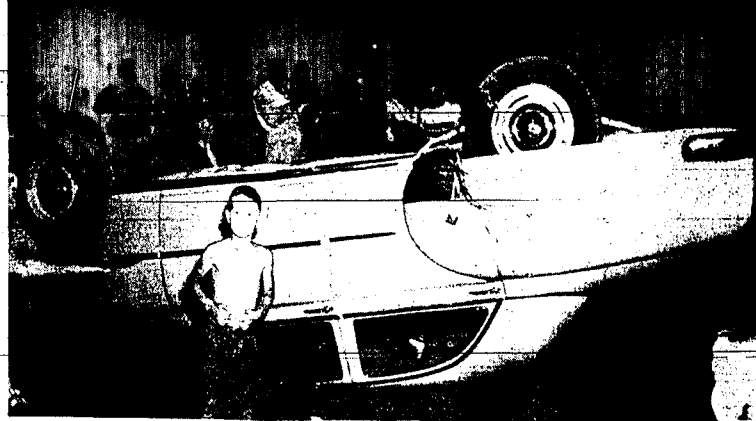
McNary said during the election year that the GOP platform "takes us back to the beginning of the republic" and "is the only one that has stood the test of time."

Considerable Space Is Given West Area in Report by AEC

By PAT MUNROE (Washington Staff Correspondent)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (Special)—The atomic energy commission devotes quite a bit of space in its newest report to Congress on the contributions of the mountain west to its growing program.

The most up-to-date item is the increasing interest of the agency in setting up a power-producing reactor for commercial use. Mining claims near Eureka in the central part of Nevada and phosphate deposits near Pocatello, Ida., have been listed as prime sites for such an installation.

The AEC also notes: "The progress of power reactor development and of power production, along with the mounting interest of atomic energy progress upon the industrial community of the nation, led to the establishment of an office of industrial development. . . ."

"Final reports were received from the four industrial groups that have been surveying reactor technology in search of ways for industrial uses to have a larger share in development, building and operating reactors and nuclear power plants."

On the subject of the Colorado plateau uranium production, it says: "Several of the existing ore processing plants on the Colorado plateau enlarged their facilities during the first half of 1952 and further expansion is planned."

"The new ore-buying station at Shiprock, N. M., . . . is providing a convenient market for the ores produced in the Llanokuchil area. A processing plant to treat these ores is now contemplated at Shiprock. Metallurgical research on these ores was done at the Watkinson, Mass. laboratory and by the bureau of mines at Salt Lake City."

"SAC Grants, N. M., the Anacosta Copper Mining company is constructing an ore-buying depot, sampling plant and processing mill to treat the ores produced in that area."

"The site for an ore-buying station at Overriver, Utah, has been selected and construction of the depot is scheduled to begin this year."

"Assistance was given uranium ore producers of the Colorado plateau in opening up new uranium producing districts. . . . Construction of 783 miles of access roads costing nearly \$4,200,000 has been started and additional projects are planned."

"Other assistance, such as bonus payments for initial production, has provided substantial incentives. Over \$100,000 has been paid since this bonus was announced early in 1951. More than 420 uranium mill permits have been certified for these payments."

Officials Plan Campaign for Soil Election

Aug. 1—A meeting to discuss an educational program for the formation of a soil conservation district in Blaine was held in Pocatello Tuesday.

Keith Rhodes, organization chairman, is to help farmers understand a soil conservation district. He represents the committee that is studying the proposed district and will be mailed to all landowners in the county last week and that they may wish to mail to him this week.

The letters being mailed this week will list the farmers' names and will contain technical information through the soil conservation district.

James, soil conservation officer, Twin Falls, showed pictures illustrating the chain of reactions leading to the formation of a soil conservation district. He also presented a report on the boundaries of the proposed Blaine county soil conservation district as given by Keith Rhodes, secretary. The district will include the present boundaries of Blaine county, the lands within the corporate boundaries of the city of Blaine and Sun Valley and the present area commonly called the Blaine of Carey.

A referendum vote on the proposition of the district will be held Aug. 9. Rhodes stated that the district will be formed in the event of a vote. Polling places will be at Carey high school, the store and the courthouse in Twin Falls will be open from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Ballots Mailed

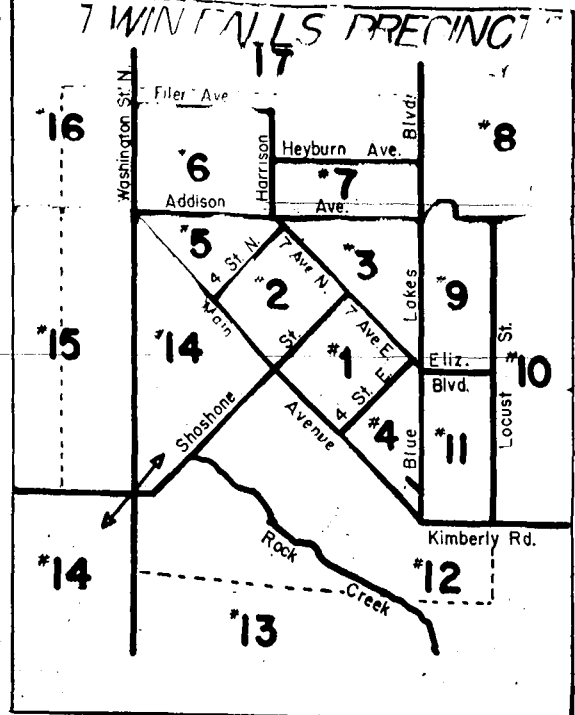

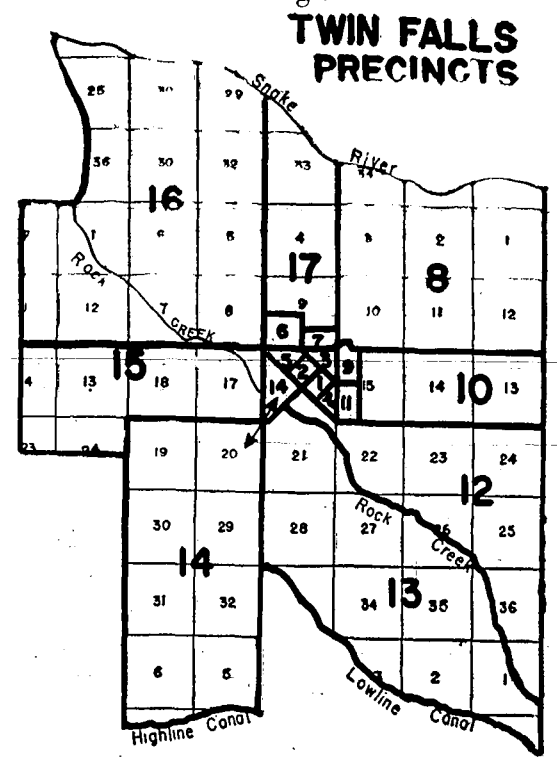

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Expansion on Forest Flame Threat Noted

BOISE, Aug. 1 (AP)—Idaho has had fewer forest fires in this year than last, but now that the critical season is approaching the very things that checked them up in 1951 are making the danger greater.

Federal and state forest officials said Thursday rains which continued through June kept the vegetation green and more fire-resistant. Now that it's beginning to dry out, however, there's more of it to burn.

No closure

State Forester Robert Guernsey said there have been fewer fires on state lands so far, and no areas have been closed by proclamation of the governor.

However, the forests, especially the southern exposures and slash areas, are beginning to dry out. He has received from Curt Curtis, fire warden for the Clearwater-Proteroch Timber Protection association, a list of areas east of Lewiston which will have to be closed if conditions continue to get worse.

Fewer storms

William Guernsey, head of the Boise national forest said fewer fires have been reported because of greater vegetation and fewer lightning storms. Those which have occurred have been spaced far enough apart for smoke-jumpers to get to them in plenty of time.

Wilfred Quinn, district head of the bureau of land management, said there have been about 60 acres more about the state this year but they have been extinguished before becoming wide-spread.

At least one fire, however, the vegetation is drying out at higher elevations where it will be harder to get at with the bureau's tankers.

Jordan Cites Top Issue of '52 Election

HOMELAND, Aug. 1 (AP)—"Shorn of all fog, confusion and personality," the main issue in the national election this year is whether the American people want a more centralized or less centralized federal government," Gov. Len Jordan said here last night.

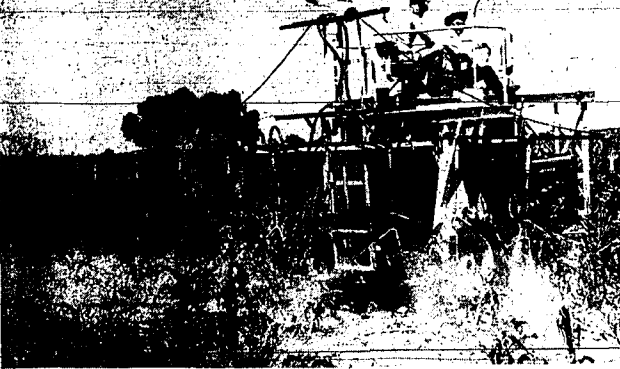

High Row Sprayers Are Tried On Corn Fields in Buhl Area

BUHL, Aug. 1.—Three new high row sprayers have been brought to the Buhl area by the Green Giant company from the midwest to help combat the ear worm infestation in corn in this area. Nozzles on the infestation is far worse this year than it has been the past several years.

Green Giant officials point out that the spraying is experimental and while they feel sure some control is being made to spray the fields at the start of the tassling stage. The three machines will cover from 125 to 150 acres a day.

Officials expect to be able to cover the major part of the 2,860 acres which are planted to sweet corn in the area.

The company is pioneering the field of high-row spraying with the machines in this area. Since they were not originally intended for use in irrigated fields, only time will tell how well they will stand up under this rougher treatment, officials said. Ability of the machine to straddle rows of corn four feet or more in early summer. Another theory is that since a blanket of snow covered the ground early last winter and remained most of the time, the insects were not frozen as they probably have been in past winters.

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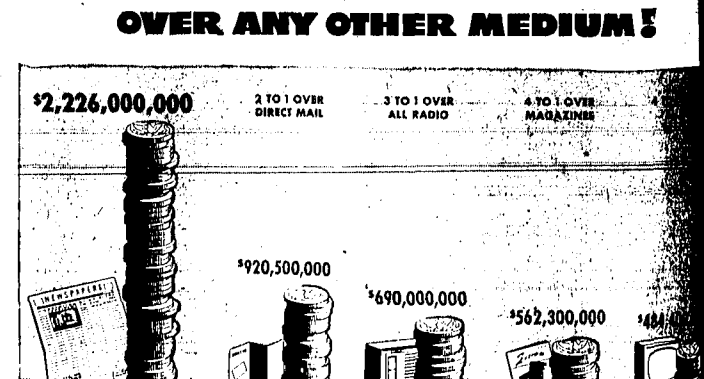
